DepPGM's Foreword



Brethren, the RW PGM's treatment is progressing well and he thanks you for the letters, cards and emails he has received since his diagnosis; they have provided a great lift for him and his family.

On 2nd March in the Grand Temple in London the RW PGM Consecrated the Essex Cornerstone Lodge No. 9968, the first 'young masons lodge' in the English Constitution. The RW AsstGM, Sir David Hugh Wootton, was present and commented that he had never seen so many Master Masons leave a meeting when I asked them to retire before I Installed W.Bro Elliott Chevin as Primus Master.

At the PGL meeting in March the brethren voted to replace the existing Essex Provincial Charity Fund with a modern EPCF charity and to set-up two new charities; the Essex Provincial Almoner's Fund and the Essex Freemasons' Community Fund. Articles by the ProvGChStwd and ProvGAIm in this issue of the magazine explain how they will enable the PGM to deliver his strategy for charitable giving in Essex.

In June Essex hosted the MCF Annual Ball, which was a sell-out, in London, with the RW PGM acting as President for the evening. The MCF Chairman, HHJ Richard Hone QC and many senior members of the charity were present and were astounded by the generosity of the brethren on the night, which enabled the RW PGM to present him with a cheque for £25,000!

In July I had the privilege of deputising for the RW PGM and Consecrating the Lodge of Daily Advancement No. 9979, a new research & demonstration lodge, at Saxon Hall. My thanks go to the Consecrating Party and the ProvGDC, W.Bro Geoff Turpin, and his well-drilled team of Founders for making it such an enjoyable occasion. W.Bro Peter Hollingsworth, as Installing Master, had the great pleasure of Installing W.Bro Alan Everard as Primus Master and I was delighted to be able to give W.Bro Lawrie Morrisson a well-earned field promotion to PPJGW for his tireless work over several years to bring the Consecration about.

On a personal note I was greatly honoured to be named as Master Elect of Essex Masters' Lodge for 2019-2020 and look forward to being Installed as Master of the largest masonic lodge in the English Constitution on 31st October and hope to see many of you there on the day. We currently have 910 subscribing members, wouldn't it be great to break 1,000?

But the team of volunteers, led by Association of Friends trustee Dennis May, who had put in so much hard work to prepare everything, needn't have worried: the crowds still came and the day proved a great success, raising almost £9,000 to support the work of the Friends in providing an amenity fund of more than £1,300 a month to provide entertainment, concerts and days out, as well as parties and gifts for the residents at Christmas and Easter, and on anniversaries and birthdays.



A breathtaking collection of classic cars welcomed the visitors coming to Stisted for the fete, which was opened by the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Rodney Lister Bass, OBE. Well, strictly speaking, as it was the 20th such event since the formation of the Association of Friends, the PGM invited Sir Neil Thorne, who as PGM himself had opened the home, to perform the official ceremony, accompanied by Clive Dunnico, chairman of the association, and its president, Alan Garner.

There were stalls and support from Lodges from all over the Province, including Southend, Upminster, Chelmsford, Braintree and Witham; 18 commercial stalls sold a wide range of products; stalls from the Essex Welfare Trust, Provincial Museum, Provincial Almoner, the Holy Royal Arch and Mark Masons.

A packed prgramme of entertainment included the Bocking Brass Band, song and dance from the Frederick Douglas Academy, dancing and acrobatics from White Court Dance Unlimited and singing from John Ellson. Thanks also to Essex Care Ltd, Roundwoods Garden Centre for running the BBQ, a large contingent from the Widows Sons, the inflatable rugby challenge from the Lodge of XV and sterling work from the Provincial Stewards of the year.

On the 28th March 2019, in recognition of his 52 years of dedicated and valued service to Freemasonry and the wider community the Provincial Grand Master on 28 March 2019 awarded John the 'Essex DSEM' (Distinguished Service to Essex Freemasonry). Initiated in 1967, from 1978 when appointed as a Provincial Grand Steward until retiring 41 years later as an Assistant Provincial Grand Master, after eleven years in that Office, John had held five Provincial Grand Ranks in Craft and two in Royal Arch.

Although the title 'Mentor' cannot be given to a lodge, John will do everything possible as Senior Warden of the newly consecrated Lodge Of Daily Advancement to help the members share his belief in helping others and continue the good work of 'Mentoring our Masons' for the benefit of all lodges and their members in the Province of Essex.

Essex Cornerstone Lodge No 9968 Historical Consecration

OVER 700 FREEMASONS PACKED THE MAGNIFICENT GRAND TEMPLE AT FREEMASONS' HALL TO WITNESS A WORLD FIRST CREATION OF A NEW LODGE FOR YOUNG FREEMASONS – ESSEX CORNERSTONE LODGE NO. 9968





A number of years ago, the Essex Cornerstone Club committee started to think about the formation of a new lodge, specifically for young Freemasons. They had a dream of what its purpose would be and what it might achieve. There followed a long period of planning and preparation and as time went by and progress was made, the realisation dawned that the lodge really would become a reality.

From then on, the excitement and anticipation built and reached their peak on Saturday 2nd March 2019 – the day Essex Cornerstone Lodge was Consecrated. The Grand Temple was the stage for this special occasion with over 700 Freemasons from across the English Constitution travelling to witness the ceremony.

The sponsoring lodge, Essex Provincial Grand Stewards' Lodge No. 8665, started the proceedings by opening the meeting. UGLE's Assistant Grand Master, Sir David Wootton, and the Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Rodney Bass OBE, were then welcomed into the Grand Temple to rapturous applause.

The main event, the Consecration ceremony, was beautifully and memorably delivered by Rodney Bass, who commented: 'This new lodge will encourage and support young Freemasons in their journey, providing a gathering place for young masons to increase their masonic knowledge and experience, and enabling Cornerstone Club Members to maintain strong relationships.'

The Founders of the lodge were presented to the Provincial Grand Master and reminded of their obligation to support and nurture their new lodge and uphold the values of Freemasonry for future generations.

Following this, those below the rank of Installed Master retired from the Temple which amounted to over 300 members. That included many from over 15 new and young masons' clubs across England, who came to show their support and demonstrate the very essence of new and young Freemasons.

The Deputy Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Paul Reeves, then installed the Primus Master, Elliott Chevin, who went on to invest his officers. The Address to members was delivered by Sir David Wootton.

The Essex Cornerstone Lodge then presented a cheque for £2,022 to the Essex Festival 2022, making them Vice Patrons of the Festival.

The Provincial Grand Master then presented the lodge with a set of gavels, commissioned from an acacia tree from his own grounds. Following the meeting, a spectacular Festive Board was held for nearly 600 Freemasons where they experienced a musical treat including trumpeters, a string quartet playing modern music, and a unique performance of the Masters' Song performed by a female singer acapella.



The members were also able to interact with a live photo mosaic display by uploading photos from the day and evening. The photos came alive culminating

in a large mosaic of the Cornerstone Lodge crest, which provided a magnificent background to the banquet capturing memories of the historic event.

Perhaps the most unexpected part of the evening was when the waiters pouring coffee began to bang on the tables, then their coffee pots and they miraculously turned into a most impressive drumming act. Not only that, all 600 diners were given their own drum kit and in unison, joined together and delighted in a memorable and incredibly fun act.

THE WISDOM OF SOLOMON Official Patron for TLC Appeal

Solomon, 'the man of sunset and shadows', King of Israel, whose wisdom is celebrated in both the Bible and in legend and it was during the Smiddle of his reign that he received a notable visit from the Queen of Sheba, who came from the 'ends of the earth' to hear his wisdom.

According to the Bible, the Queen bombarded him with questions and enigmas and all her questions, riddles and conundrums were so cleverly answered she finally exclaimed congratulatory words: 'happy are thy men, thy servants, which stand continually before thee and hear thy wisdom'.

Solomon the On-Line learning resource has been designed to support personal enquiry to help all those who want to learn more about their Masonry. Modern Speculative Freemasonry, is as we know, a peculiar system of morality, veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols; with the allegory of the building of the Temple of Solomon central to the ritual along with the symbolism and which can be found throughout, especially in the Working Tools.

Member surveys have highlighted learning as a major, un-met need and a potential reason why members leave and that most members seek a greater understanding of the ritual, symbolism, history and traditions of Freemasonry.

A greater understanding, it is believed, will go a long way to meet member's expectations and wishes, to enhance their enjoyment and create a greater interest, improve understanding and performance of the ritual, improve attendance and ultimately help with membership retention.

With the fostering of curiosity, the development of an understanding and assistance in the Masonic journey of learning and development, the Solomon Online Database, which is accessible through a variety of platforms, also compliments the Members Pathway.

Echoing the words in the FMT magazine , 'Solomon provides interesting and accessible material, if well-chosen and well delivered, will compliment or even replace a ceremony and it is designed to be popular, boosting attendance and interest' and ideally, as the article in that December issue stated; 'learning activities will become an appreciated and regular feature of Lodge and Chapter meetings."

The material in question; can either be a five to ten minute Talk, or a 'nugget' as it is referred to in the Solomon Project, or a longer Paper designed for further private research, but still suitable for delivery in Lodge or Chapter and both methods are designed to stimulate the minds of the audience.

These 'nuggets' the five to ten minute Talks, on a relevant subject, are ideal for the newer member to take from Solomon and deliver it in Lodge on a routine basis, so that it forms a part of the usual Lodge business.

These can also be used after a ceremony, where the Work of that Degree can be questioned in a little more depth and its; meaning, history or symbolic significance can be discussed, which will encourage a debate within the Lodge.

The Lodge of Instruction is also an ideal opportunity for the members, whether they are 'younger' members or not, for them to select a topic from one of the 'nuggets' of their choice, read about it, one week, for it to be discussed on the following week.

There are so many subjects contained within the 'nuggets' on Solomon, that the many questions that the 'younger' Mason want answers to, can be found there and there is more than enough 'food for thought."

A 'nugget' or a longer and more in depth Paper, which is also on Solomon, can be presented at a Meeting where there may be no ceremony, which could stimulate discussion and give an added dimension to the Meeting.

There is ample scope for the 'younger' Mason to be encouraged in his quest for answers and an understanding of what we do and how we do it, to conduct and to private research and Present the results to a Meeting.

The object of this exercise is to give each and every member a greater understanding of the ritual, its symbolism, history and the traditions of Freemasonry and the confidence to answer questions from prospective candidates, which will encourage the growth of Freemasonry.

TLC still has its roots firmly established in Essex and now, reinforced locally by the appointment of the PGM as Patron, will continue its good work across the Province, supplying teddies to all of our hospital units across the county.



Peter then joined the London Electric Wire Company as an accountant, rising to Director when it was taken over by The General Electric Company. He became Chairman of the Trade Council for the Wire & Cable Industry before becoming the founding Chairman of a European Council for the industry prior to the UK entering the Common Market. It was for his work in this area that he was awarded the OBE for Services to Industry. There is a lot more to W.Bro. Peter's life than can be put into a few short paragraphs and you can always be assured of an interesting chat over the festive board!



Lodge of XV A Fine Effort

nyone who has been lucky enough to visit a Lodge of XV 'fixture' over the past two years will know that whilst the work inside the Temple is typical of the majority of Lodges, the Festive Board, on the other hand, is a different matter altogether.



As the Rugby Lodge of Essex, the Brethren have adopted many of the customs and practices usually enjoyed at your local Rugby Club on a Saturday afternoon with a little more singing than usual – though not to Suffolk standards – and the levying of fines for a series of misdemeanours all expertly handed down by the Lodge ADC and Fines Master, Chris Lee.

"We have standard fines for things like which tie you wear – it has to match the style adopted by the Master (i.e. Provincial, Black, Rugby Club or International) – and as a Lodge Member you are awarded a Cap which you must wear at Festive Board and you have to be careful not to wear it during Grace or any other prayer or remove it at an inappropriate moment. Mistakes in the Temple can result in a fine and social media, especially Facebook, provide a fairly steady stream of income as photos of meals and inane or ancient humour can incur a penalty. You also have to remember that 'ratting' is allowed so if we are short of a source of fines a couple of Members will always remind me of something I've forgotten. Visitors come away relatively unscathed, unless of course, they are silly enough to infringe by say leaving their mobile on in the Temple or dropping a sweet down a flight of stairs which rolls to the middle of the carpet during open Lodge! The average fine per head at each meeting is approx. £3 and the reports I have heard of fines as high as £50 are completely inaccurate. What I would say, however, is that no-one is safe; visiting APGMs, Grand Officers and the PGM when he next visits will be subject to the same rules and be expected to join the party!"



Since it's Consecration in July 2017 the Lodge has raised over £2000 in fines across its 12 meetings. Every penny raised is ploughed back into rugby development with donations being sanctioned by the Worshipful Master at the suggestion of the Brethren or in response to a minor crisis.

Lodge Secretary Mike Hall explains "Whilst we try and give kit and equipment to the Youth and Female sections of Essex clubs who might not have the same level of sponsorship as the main sections of the clubs, we do respond if a club suffers misfortune or is in need of urgent funds. Chelmsford RFC suffered a clubhouse fire which destroyed a large amount of matchday kit so we quickly despatched a cheque to assist the club to buy replacements and keep functioning."

So far donations have been made to Westcliff Youth, Braintree Youth, Basildon Girls & Ladies, Bancroft Youth, Chelmsford RFC and donations have been agreed to Westcliff Girls & Ladies and Ongar Youth and will be with them in time for the new rugby season. Additionally cheques totalling in excess of £3000 have been passed to Jason Leonard's Atlas Foundation, The Wooden Spoon Charity and the My Name's Doddie Foundation with funds raised by raffles and a very successful Ladies Night.







Festival 2022 Update Let's hit that £6 million target

We are just over half way through the Festival and at the time of writing we have banked around £2.9 million towards our revised target of £6 million – so thank you to everyone who has supported us so far, but as you can see – we still have a long way to go.



To achieve that target we need an average £682 from every Essex Freemason, a figure that has just been achieved by our neighbours in Hertfordshire, so £6 million, hopefully more should be more than doable from a Province like ours, renowned for its generosity.

If you have not done so already please take out a regular payment promise. You can still spread the cost of £8.50 a month plus Gift Aid over five years and the full amount that you pay will still count towards our overall Festival total – and you will receive a Festival Jewel.

Gift Aid

On my travels around the Province I can still see that many Lodges and Chapters are not using Gift Aid envelopes and there is no reason or excuse for not doing this. It is your tax that we are claiming back, your money that can be used for good causes or simply kept by the Government – your decision.

I hear excuses that people do not want the tax-man to know what they doing – well I have news for you, they already know and they are more than happy to give your cash back to charities. Whatever you are told or think you have heard – there is absolutely no reason why your Lodge or Chapter should not be using Gift Aid envelopes and claiming that extra 25%.

I or any member of my Charity Committee would be pleased to visit your Lodge and explain how this works and of course tell you more about the Festival and what we hope to achieve.

As you should be aware Essex is raising money for the Masonic Charitable Foundation which in turn is supporting the Province of Essex to the tune of £1 million a year with grants to local charities and of course to Freemasons and their families in distress – what's raised in Essex stays in Essex.

This money continues to flow in even when we are not in Festival which is why the MCF need our help and need it now. Do not wait until the end of the Festival, anything you donate now will attract 2% interest – helping to swell your Lodge and Chapter totals.

So thank you again for everything you have done so far – you are an incredible group of people who are helping to make a difference right across Essex – now let's hit that £6 million.

West Essex Round Table Lodge 9310 Life Changing Cheque Could Lead to New Records in Charitable Giving





Δⁿ amazing £703,000 from West Essex Round Table Lodge 9310.

The donation, the result of a generous bequest from W.Bro Alan Helps, who joined WERTL in 1989 and who passed to the Grand Lodge Above in 2015.

Such is the size of the cheque that the PGM RW. Bro Rodney Lister Bass OBE wanted to attend the meeting to acknowledge such a charitable donation.

Receiving the money at a meeting of WERTL at the Chingford Centre on Tuesday May 7th, the PGM paid particular tribute to W.Bro Helps, who was Master of the Lodge in 1998, by taking the unprecedented step of posthumously awarding him the Distinguished Service to Essex Masonry award (DSEM) – a very rare accolade in recognition of his generosity in support of charities both during and after his lifetime.

W.Bro Helps, who never married, left all of his Estate to charity with specific mention of the individual Masonic Charities that existed separately before being taken under the wing of the MCF.

His close friend W.Bro Bob Osborn, executor, supported by W.Bro Mike Jeffries of what proved to be a very complicated will, then realised that he could best deliver Alan's wishes by donating the money to the MCF, through his adopted Mother Lodge – some three years later history was made.

More than 90 masons were at the meeting to see W.Bro Bob Osborn hand over the cheque to the PGM who had previously processed into the Lodge accompanied by four APGMs, the Provincial Chaplain, the Provincial Sword Bearer together with two Deacons and Two Standard Bearers to represent the historic nature and importance of the donation and the occasion.

W.Bro Alan Helps was an Essex Mason for more than 30 years and was well known for his work in the community, particularly helping to raise money for charities and later via his support for his mother, a local councillor in Rainham. Alan was initiated into Epping Oak Lodge 7346 in 1985 which sadly handed in its warrant in 2011. He joined West Essex Round table in 1989 which then became his adopted Mother Lodge and was its Master in 1998.

Alan left an Estate in excess of £2 million and as well as his generous donation of nearly £703,000 to the MCF, he made further bequests to Hospices and charities such as the RNLI. At the time of his passing, aged 72, he was a PPGSwdB and can now add the DSEM following the posthumous award by the PGM.

New Essex Charities Set to Provide Funds for Projects Across the Province

major shake-up in the way that Essex Freemasons support community projects and good causes in every part of the Province will be completed by September with the launch of two new charities and a major overhaul of an existing fund.

The move, part of an ambitious new initiative by the RW PGM, Rodney Lister Bass, OBE, will release sufficient funds to allow potential grants and the opportunity for Province to work directly with Lodges and Chapters to match fund selected projects.

At the time of writing Trustees are still working on how the grant making process will operate and members will be advised later this year but we anticipate numerous applications from Lodges & Chapters for match-funding and while we will make every effort to make funding available to support as many projects as possible, not every application will succeed.

Funding has to work in tandem with existing resources and income which means that every new application will be considered on its merits and the contribution it makes to the wider Essex community.

The two new charities are the "Essex Provincial Almoners Fund" which is covered elsewhere in this magazine by the Provincial Grand Almoner, W.Bro Nick Clarke, and the "Essex Freemasons Community Fund." The "Essex Provincial Charity Fund," which was established in the 1930's, has been completely overhauled. All three charities have also been formed into CIO's (Charitable Incorporated Organisations) which will enable us to have greater flexibility when awarding grants.

So how will it all work? It's estimated that the Almoners Fund will need around £50,000 a year to continue its good work with local Masons and their families and this will be provided directly from the Provincial Charity Fund as explained by Nick Clarke. This is in addition to the nearly half a million of funding which comes to Essex each year via the MCF to support Masonic families.

Flagship Charity

The "Essex Freemasons Community Fund" is our new flagship charity formed at the request of the RW PGM. It has been made possible by making economies at the Provincial Office and has a remit to support a wide range of good causes – even those that are not registered charities.

Longer term the bigger plan for the Community Fund is an aspiration to identify one large project each year, which we may also look to the MCF to match fund with us. This would work alongside smaller, but equally significant projects in each of the five major population centres of the Province - Colchester, Chelmsford, Harlow, Basildon and Southend.

We are still looking at different ideas but these projects might be themed for greater impact and publicity potential. These could include for example, charitable causes to alleviate loneliness in one particular year and in the next we might consider supporting paediatric care charities. In all such cases we would still try to get support from the MCF with these, particularly if our strategy matched theirs for that particular grant making period.

It is also the PGM's request that this charity looks closely at "match funding" by supporting Lodges and Chapters make more of their own donations by doubling the amount available, but as explained earlier it will be impossible to support every application so members are encouraged to only submit requests where they can demonstrate a significant benefit to their local community.

These smaller match-funded grants will help lodges make a bigger impact with their own contributions, but as funds would be finite we may have to set agreed amounts as to what lodge donations we would consider supporting each year.

Freeing Up Reserves

Equally as exciting is the Essex Provincial Charity Fund which has been in existence since 1932 and has amassed reserves is excess of £900,000. The PGM has made it clear that the money will do more good in the wider Essex Community.

It will only be able to support registered charities but with its new CIO status once again it will be possible to make match-funded grants or direct donations as needed and all grants from this fund will be considered on merit.

So these are exciting times for the Province in terms of making Charity work in every part of the County, but like all charities there will come a time when we also will need to raise money if the work is to be continued.

Once the Festival is over we hope that once a year every Lodge and Chapter will be able to donate the proceeds of at least one Alms collection or preferably a raffle to either the Community or Charity Fund. If we had a choice we would hope that this could come from an installation meeting.

Monies for the Community Fund will continue to come each year from surpluses accrued in the Provincial accounts by prudent management but like all charities there will never be enough to support demand so we hope that longer term support really will be a two-way partnership between Lodges and the Provincial charities.

Further announcements will be made soon and I look forward to working with you.

Essex Freemasons have joined with charity Lifelites in an epic 3,000 mile journey across Britain - part of a nationwide fund raising challenge to ensure that 700 terminally ill and disabled children living in the county, receive the specialist care they need.





3000 Mile Road Trip

The charity, supported by local Masons for more than 20 years, works with all of the four children's hospices operating in Essex – Little Havens, Thundersley; Haven House Children's Hospice, Woodford Green; The J's Hospice, Witham and Saint Francis Young Adults Group in Romford - supplying specialist computers and software.

In Essex, this means that the charity empowers 700 children and young people every year with life-limiting, lifethreatening illnesses and disabling conditions by providing them with opportunities to be creative – and more importantly to communicate and to take control of their lives – in many cases right up to the moment of passing.

Local Freemasons have traditionally funded much of the £25,000 needed each year to ensure that Lifelites can continue its good work in Essex and were pleased to support the latest initiative – a 3,000 mile road trip by Charity chief executive Simone Enefer-Doy, linking up 47 different Masonic counties, with the added twist that in each area, all transport had to be a little unusual.

Colleagues in Kent chose to transport Simone via the Tilbury Ferry, where she was greeted by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Essex, Paul Reeves, driving a genuine Bangkok Tuk Tuk. Then on to Tilbury Fort for quick photocall and finally to Cheshunt to meet Masons from Hertfordshire.

"Although we support hundreds of different charities across Essex Lifelites has always had a special place in the hearts of local Masons," said Paul Reeves, "because of the fantastic work they do in the county."

"Meeting Simone at Tilbury was another opportunity to thank her for all that she and Lifelites do for our children via local hospices – and of course we could not let her go away empty handed and was delighted to present another donation of £2,500 to help ensure that work can continue."

"Essex Freemasons are dedicated supporters of Lifelites, and we're so grateful that they volunteered their time and vehicles to help us complete this challenge – the Tuk Tuk was also a little bit special helping to make my visit even more memorable," said Simone.



My thanks for your support and all the profit goes into the EPAF to help Essex Masons Invites to visit lodges and chapters are always welcomed, and if invited to speak we will give either a short update on all our work in less than 10mins. or if preferred more formal papers can be delivered which usually last between 30mins and 40mins.

Loneliness and Social Isolation

Loneliness and social isolation is public enemy number one, and it does not just affect older people, social media was blamed by 22% of younger people for making them feel lonely and isolated and just look at the consequences of all people who are lonely - Low self-esteem (30%), Depression (27%), Anxiety (26%), Confusion (10%), Eating disorders (8%), poor eating (28%), Sleep issues (24%)



We often only realise that people are lonely when they tell us, but there are plenty of lonely people who never say a word. Loneliness can feel like a dirty secret sometimes, like acknowledging that you're somehow deficient and defective. It's as though you didn't get invited to the party or picked for the team, like everyone is playing the game while you just watch from the side lines.

For many it feels shameful to say the words out loud – I'm lonely – so we mostly don't. It hurts to admit that you feel unwanted and invisible. The constant questions that are underneath the pain and the shame of being lonely are, do I matter? and does anyone see me?



Be Generous

So, one of the most generous gifts we can give people is ourselves, our time, our attention and our willingness to care about them. When we show up for people in this way, we answer people's deepest questions - you matter and I see you. This is what we call pastoral care.

There are many groups who may be lonely and it is not just the elderly, people whose partner works long hours, people who are grieving all kinds of losses, young people who think they have no friends, teenagers who are left in the cold because they are not as adventurous as their peers, school children left alone in the playground, students who prefer to study and not socialise, a party goer with no body to speak to and business folk of all ages who don't get included in a meeting, don't get asked for their point of view or who are not recognised with a smile by their leader.

So, let us ask ourselves what can we do to make a life better, can we make a phone call, write a letter, visit somebody, look at somebody and ask for their opinion or just smile at them, or can we sign post these people to get help? Whatever we can do will make a difference to that person.

We exist to relieve distress and we are trying to encourage lodges to develop widows/widowers' lunches, tea clubs, games activities, theatre trips etc. to get people out and about. But first we have to identify people who are lonely and that is why I am asking for Lodge Almoners to promote this work in their lodge/chapter and to seek the help of all members.

Essex Provincial Almoners Fund EPAF

Introduction



The charity was officially launched on the 30th March 2019 and is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, registered with the Charity's Commission, Number 1177292

This new almoner's charity exists so that there is greater transparency for donors to see where their money is going to in the Province. All money given to this charity is used for almoner work in Essex and the other two Provincial Charities give the money they receive to charities and good causes, mainly in Essex but not exclusively to Essex.

What is the Purpose of the Fund?

To ensure that eligible Essex Masons, their qualifying dependents and unattached widows have access to immediate funds through the Essex Almoners Team in times of great need, be it financially or medically

How is the Money Used?

Our aim is to use this money very quickly, often within 24 hours to give immediate relief from suffering connected to either or both, financial or health matters.

The fund is also used to provide support to our masonic widows who have become unattached from their own lodges.

Typical examples of how the money is spent

Emergency food shopping, buying clothes for children, paying rent, electricity, gas and rate arrears, minor repairs to a house, mending a car, buying toys for children, help with legal costs, clearing pests and rubbish, small financial awards to help until benefit arrives, commissioning occupational therapy reports, purchasing types of mobility aids, helping with funeral costs, emergency optical and dental costs, travel costs to and from hospitals and repairs to stair lifts. Supporting widows without a lodge at Christmas with a gift. The list seems endless.

How is the Fund Managed?

A board of trustees manages the affairs of the charity under the Chairmanship of W. Bro Nick Clarke, the Provincial Grand Almoner. He and the charity's finance officer, Gary Hostler look after the day to day matters that the charity is asked to deal with and are held to account financially and practically by the trustees

What Makes Up the Fund?

The fund only operates with a current account and which is examined each year and presented to the Trustees. All monies spent are first agreed by both the Chairman and the Finance Officer. Typically, the fund does not spend more than £50K pa.

Who is Eligible for Help?

All Essex masons and their eligible dependents who meet the criteria for help. Details of such criteria is available from the Provincial Grand Almoner, W.Bro Nick Clarke on 07768 067817 or from any of the Provincial Almoners Team.

All of the money given to the EPAF is used for supporting Essex Masons and their eligible dependents who are connected with an Essex Lodge or Chapter

Where Does the Money Come From and where should it be sent to?

Contributions come from Lodge, Chapter and individual donations, especially at Christmas when support is wanted to be given for the unattached widows. More donations however are required through the year to support our ongoing work which takes place every day of the year. All donations are acknowledged immediately, they are hugely appreciated, grateful received and faithfully applied to those in need. Cheques should be made payable to the 'EPAF'.

If at the end of the year more money is needed to support the almoners work then the EPCF will provide additional funding.

Freemasons Mark 75th Anniversary of D-Day



Any Essex Masons will know W.Bro. 

Dear Reader,

We are rightly bringing men's health matters into focus, particularly with the CHAPS initiative. There is another area which affects more men than women and that is an Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm. This affects 6 times as many men as women over the age of 65. This aneurysm is a swelling of the aortic artery which leads from the heart down through the tummy area. If the aneurysm bursts it is highly likely that death will follow within minutes. Between the ages of 64 and 65 the screening for this condition is now routinely offered. However, anyone over the age of 70/71 will not have had this offered to them. There are usually no symptoms and no warning of the problem. The Triple A screening process is offered on the NHS by self referral. On the NHS website put 'Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm' into the search box and follow the links to a phone number for your nearest clinic.

I would urge all of you over 70 to check whether you have been screened, and, if you haven't, to do so as soon as you are able.

It is a very quick and painless ultra sound scan, and the result is given to you as soon as the scan has been completed.

CONSECRATION OF THE LODGE OF DAILY ADVANCEMENT No 9979

n Tuesday 16th July 2019 the Deputy Provincial Grand Master VW Bro Paul Reeves stood in for the Provincial Grand Master as the Consecrating Officer for the Lodge of Daily Advancement No 9979 at Saxon Hall, Southend. On the same day 50 years ago the Apollo 11 mission was launched with Bro Edwin 'Buzz' Aldrin becoming the first Freemason to walk on the moon.



The Provincial Grand Stewards team provided first class support throughout the meeting which was opened in the Three Degrees by the Worshipful Master of St Laurence Lodge No 5511 the sponsoring lodge. The meeting was called to order and the Consecrating Officer VW.Bro Paul Reeves entered with the Provincial Consecration Team. 

Ronald Frederick Marsh Lambourne Lodge no 3945



t was on the 17th of July 1957 that Mr. Ronald Frederick Marsh, entered Loughton Masonic Hall, unaware of what would happen next, was met by his father John as IG, and was initiated him into freemasonry, so that when he left Loughton Temple, he was a Brother to all other freemasons worldwide, but particularly Lambourne Lodge no 3945.!

He was only 21 years plus 2 months old, which meant he had a head start regarding longevity in Masonry, but he filled those early years by progressing through to WM in 1970. He took on ADC and then DC for 8 years followed by 5 years as Chaplain. He had started work as a pupil civil engineer with Rush and Tomkins, was awarded a state scholarship to read Civil Engineering at Kings college, London, receiving a BSc , and then moving to Ove Arup for the rest of his outstanding and satisfying career.

He had attended Kings College which entitles him to append AKC after his name, but his earlier school was William D'Aeth in Dartford, and eventually was the Founding Master of the Dartford school lodge.

He was honoured with active provincial grand rank of Senior Grand deacon, and thence PPSGD, eventually on to PPJGW. Unusually he also attained PPJGW in West Kent (Dartford).

He was a constant attender at the L of I., being preceptor for many years, when the L. of I. was weekly, and the excellent ritual that was typical of Lambourne Lodge was no doubt due a great deal to Bro. Ron's efforts.

He has been resident in France for several years, but still attended as often as possible, but recently had suffered with back problems which saw him being bed-bound during 2016/17. However, as part of his rehabilitation he is trying to become more mobile, and to remain upright. Because of hospital appointments he was able to attend Dartford but could not make Lambourne, his Mother lodge who meet in October.

It was therefore agreed to present him with his Certificate to recognise the 60th anniversary of his Initiation, at the William D'aeth Lodge, after observing the protocols of both Essex and West Kent GL., where the R.W.Bro. Col. Sir Neil Thorne PPGM., presented Bro. Ron with his certificate, with genuine sincerity, especially when Sir Neil, sat with Ron as he was unable to rise comfortably.

This was followed by a presentation by W.Bro Doug. Lee, Lambourne's master of a capo damonte model perhaps modelled on Bro. Ron himself. At the festive board the host Lodge also presented Bro. Ron with a tankard as their tribute to his contribution to them. A summons suitably signed by all present was also handed to Bro, as a memento.

Finally, all who know him see him as a big man, both Masonically, and in normal life, with a beard that is as old as his Masonic career.

Epping Forest Lodge 4263 W.Bro James Fretwell PAGDC 50 Years

W.Bro Kenneth Montgomery PSGD, APGM, made his last Official visit to Epping Forest Lodge on Saturday 9th February 2019 before his retirement in March 2019, to carry out a most pleasant duty of presenting W.Bro James Ernest Fretwell PAGDC with his 50 Year in Freemasonry Certificate.

James Ernest Fretwell, was born in Stratford, East London on 21st October 1933, one of 4 siblings and the eldest son.

Jim started his career working for the family business, The Fretwell heating company, and then as a proof reader for a shipping Company, before moving into the drawing office of Sulzer Bros. During this time he met Jean, who became his wife in 1955. They had 2 children, Laurence and Susan and now have 5 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Jim studied at night school to obtain his qualifications and steadily worked his way through the ranks in Sulzer to become Sales Director, taking early retirement in 1989. One of the highlights of his career was becoming President of his professional Institute, the Chartered Institute of Building Services Engineers in 1999, and then a member of the Council and Executive Board.

Jim's masonic career started when he was proposed into Freemasonry by W.Bro George Henry Goodall and seconded by Bro. George Godby, both of whom were Jim's work colleagues at Sulzer Bros. He was Initiated into Epping Forest Lodge on 8th February 1969, by W.Bro. Bill Carpenter on our 197th meeting, where he was the 169th Initiate of the Lodge, and was rapidly passed and raised at the two subsequent meetings. Jim worked his way through the progressive offices and took the Chair of the Lodge in November 1980. In February 1986 he had the pleasure of Initiating his son into the same Lodge and subsequently passed and raised him. Jim received his first Provincial appointment, an active rank of Provincial AGDC in 1988, and in 1992 was promoted to PPDepGReg, and then to PPJGW in 1999. In November 2000 Jim was immensely proud to be able to Install his son Laurence into the Chair of King Solomon in Epping Forest Lodge. In 2001 Jim received Grand Rank of PGStB. In 2003 Jim was appointed as Provincial Junior Grand Warden in the Province. In 2010 Jim was promoted to the Grand Rank of PAGDC.

Jim was instrumental in forming Epping Forest Chapter in 1990 and was the Primus Scribe Ezra when the Chapter was Consecrated in 1991, an office which he held for 6 years before taking the Chair of the Chapter in 1997. Jim also exalted his son Laurence into the same Holy Royal Arch Chapter in 1997, and subsequently Installed him as MEZ in 2005. Jim also became a member of Essex First Principals in 1993, and holds the Grand Rank of PGStB.

Jim has also been very active with the Loughton Masonic Centre, having been appointed as Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Events Committee for Group 3, in 2001 and successfully organising events for the 'Freemasonry in the Community' initiative. For the next 4 years Jim remained as Chairman of the Events Committee and in his role as Treasurer raised funds for various Community projects, including a local school for children with learning difficulties and for the Loughton Masonic Centre Refurbishment Scheme (including a lift for disabled).

In 2003 Jim was appointed Chairman to the Board of Loughton Masonic Hall Company, a post he held for 9 years. During his tenure Jim introduced an information Newsletter which was produced and circulated to all users of the hall at least twice per annum covering a variety of matters including TLC, the Grand Charity, PEDoKC, honours, up-date on the Centre in general, Provincial news, and details of inter-centre activities (especially at Chingford/Loughton).

The APGM made a very eloquent and personal presentation of a 50th year service certificate to W.Bro Jim Fretwell, remarking that it was actually particularly relevant as today is actually 50 years to the date in which he was initiated into the Lodge. During the presentation, W.Bro Ken Montgomery also recalled some of his personal experiences during the last 50 years, which were very similar in many respects to that of W.Bro Jim's personal life, work and masonic career. The APGM then presented a 50th year lapel pin to W.Bro Jim who responded accordingly.

The Brethren of Beeleigh Abbey Lodge 7017 take the values of Freemasonry very seriously. Integrity, kindness, honesty, fairness and charity are an integral part of Masonic life but charity extends beyond being inward looking and moves into the community as a whole.

The residents of the village of Woodham Walter have every reason to be thankful for this ethos. Set the task to raise funds for a Parish Council but Church led community defibrillator, the Churchwarden, W. Bro. Paul Clark PPGSwdB, himself a member of Beeleigh Abbey Lodge, raised the matter at a Lodge meeting and the Brethren rallied by making a significant contribution towards the acquisition, not just by making a financial grant but also by voluntarily giving up their time and expertise to ensure the project was a enabled and based in the redundant village telephone kiosk purchased by the Parish Council.

Bro. Stephen Nunn, a local Maldon historian of repute, launched the project with a fund raising talk on St Roger of Beeleigh, which raised a significant sum; W.Bro. Martin Cook PPJGW helped raise money by playing the organ at fund raising events; Charity Steward W.Bro. Martin Harvey PPAGReg obtained approval for a charitable grant that, when added to other funds raised by Bro. Nunn and the Village, allowed the defibrillator to be purchased. A defibrillator is best used, but not exclusively, by trained operators and Bro. Peter Stilts, a specialist trainer in such first aid matters, voluntarily assisted by training some twenty-three operators so there is a spread of personnel across the Village.

The Parish Council Chairman John Tompkins, together with a number of village volunteers refurbished the iconic K6 telephone box that is now fully commissioned as a community defibrillator access point and managed by a community group.


