On Monday 28h October the Provincial Grand Master, in and over the Province of Essex, became the first Provincial Grand Master ever to be installed as Worshipful Master of his own Stewards Lodge

RW.Bro Rodney Lister Base O.B.E. was installed as WM of Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge 8665

The Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge 8665, consecrated 29th September 1975 has been honoured by the first Essex Provincial Grand Master to be installed as the Lodge Master.

Since its consecration, in contention to be deemed as the Premier Lodge of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex in contest with the Essex Masters Lodge 3256, the largest Lodge in the English Constitution with over 900 members, the Stewards Lodge's Red Aproned members serve the needs of the Province under the direct guidance of the Provincial Grand Master of the time.

On Monday 28th October, the 19th Essex Provincial Grand Master since its founding in 1776, Right Worshipful Brother, Rodney Lister Bass OBE was duly installed as the 45th Master of the Stewards Lodge by outgoing Master, Worshipful Brother Dennis Baum PJGD.

At the same meeting, the current acting Essex Provincial Grand Stewards presented the Provincial Grand Master with a cheque for £9,500, their current fund raising total to go towards the Festival 2022 in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation Trust.

A charity collection at the meeting raised £750 which was donated, at the Provincial Grand Master's request, to Cancer Research UK.

Deputy Provincial Grand Master Installed as Worshipful Master of Essex Masters Lodge

was truly humbled to be Installed into the Chair of Essex Masters' Lodge in October. I had been surprised and delighted when they asked me to be the ADC in 2007-2009 and then DC 2009-2013 but nothing compares with being the Master of such an august lodge, which also has the largest



membership of any lodge world-wide, and I have already had the pleasure of visiting other Installed Masters' lodges representing Essex.

When it was Consecrated in 1907 there were 56 lodges in the Province; now there are over 300! The Primus Master was Col. The Rt.Hon. Aurelius Richard Mark Lockwood, PC, CVO, MP and ProvGM. He later went on to be Lord Lambourne and in 1926, while still ProvGM, wrote "I wish to recommend to the Brethren of the Essex Masters Lodge how well worthy of their attention is the first printed copy of the Transactions of the Lodge. There were originally many doubts expressed as to the advisability of starting this lodge, and I myself had some fears. I was wrong so were many others, the subsequent history of the lodge and its present position show its extreme usefulness both to the Craft and the Province." It still does provide that important link with the Province, with the RW ProvGM attending every meeting and announcing the latest developments and changes within the Province and Freemasonry generally.

We currently have 932 members and with no joining fee and subscriptions of only £20 per annum I would like to be able to hand over to my successor a lodge with 1,000 members who will benefit from membership of a very special lodge.

a call to action

The Pro First Grand Principal on why more members aren't joining the Royal Arch

ompanions, for a long time we have been trying to come up with good reasons why all brethren should join the Royal Arch. I think between us we have had some success, and the percentage of brethren who are members has increased almost everywhere over the last few years. Today I want to turn the question round and ask: 'Why don't all our brethren join the Royal Arch?' It seems to me that there are five main reasons, but I am sure others will come up with many more. First, they don't know anything about it. If this were to be the main reason, I would be very depressed, which I am not. However, I am sure that there will be some who fall into this category – and that is a real condemnation of those who appoint the Royal Arch representatives in lodges. They must clearly be failing in their duties. Where there are no Royal Arch representatives, then senior brethren and particularly mentors as well as proposers and seconders must step up.

Second, they have heard about it, but have been put off by some aspect. Frequently I have heard people talking about how difficult the ritual is to learn. Surely our brethren should be able to make up their own minds about that and not have seeds of doubt sown in their minds without having tried it. Let them find out for themselves, and if they are reluctant to join the ladder, they can watch from the side until they feel ready. The exaltation ceremony is one of the best to sit and watch.

Personally, I don't consider it any more difficult than any other ritual, and the main long section delivered by the Principal

Sojourner is a good story which I have always found sticks in the mind reasonably well. Also, companions, the Principal Sojourner has two assistants. Why should they not live up to their names and assist in the ceremony. The work splits naturally and gives the Assistant Sojourners good reason to attend. With the fairly recent changes to the ritual, the First Principal's task has been considerably eased

by sharing much of it with the other Principals.

Third, cost. This is clearly relevant, and it is imperative that any candidates are fully briefed on this just as they should have been when joining the Craft. In part, this can be considered in the same way as my fourth reason: time. Again, extremely relevant. Many chapters only meet three times a year, but that is still an added burden for working people to manage. Do our lodges, perhaps, meet too often? Many meet 10-plus times a year – along with Lodges of Instruction and rehearsals, this is an enormous time burden on the young working brother. I know I shall be unpopular with many, but if lodges that meet that often considered reducing the number of their meetings, it could possibly invigorate their chapters by saving the brethren both time and money.

Fifth, they have joined other Orders already and have reached the limit of the involvement in Freemasonry that they want. If this is the case, we have again failed in our duties as Craft Freemasons. There can be no logical masonic reason for a Craft Freemason to join any other Order before joining the Royal Arch, unless they don't know about the Royal Arch, or the reasons for joining have been poorly explained.

I must add that I am all for our Craft brethren joining whatever other legitimate Order that they want, but I strongly believe the Royal Arch should come first.

Companions, the Royal Arch is a wonderful Order, as everyone knows. I am extremely proud of being the Pro First Grand Principal and look forward to the day when we can boast that more than 50% of Craft Freemasons have joined the Order and we can then move upwards from there.

There were nearly 40 attending, including RW.Bro. Sir Neil Thorne, W.Bro's. Brian Tierney, and Cliff Thoms.

By established custom the acting WM., W.Bro Ron Marsh, opened the lodge in due form, before the Provincial GDC announced the imminent arrival of the "Boss", who was duly admitted, but he graciously declined the offer of the gavel.



The Acting WM., drew the attention of the Brethren to the names of the Consecrating officers and the Founders, and their contribution to the world of Freemasonry was acknowledged.

The meeting continued with the reading of the original warrant, following the Provincial Grand Secretary W.Bro. Philip Lovelock, reading out the new Centenary warrant, which was duly passed to the PGM., who passed it to the WM., who passed it to the Secretary, for safe keeping!

The Treasurer promised to make a donation to the 2022 festival in the sum of £2500, to which the PGM expressed his grateful thanks and regaled us with latest figures from the forthcoming event.

After the necessary libation the whole party, sat down to a main meal of Middle Skate and it was unanimously agreed to be a good choice. The usual wines were taken followed eventually by the Toasts. The PGM addressed the WM, who responded in a reflective manner. The toast to the visitors was given by Bro. Tony Everett, who reminded us that without our guests Lambourne would have floundered years ago. The response was given by Bro. Mike Higgins who himself had once been a coerced WM. The acting IPM, guest W.Bro Terry Rogers, was also actual IPM at the 75 anniversary meet. A successful raffle was held and added to the sum for the 2022 Festival.

A more clearly defined and broader role for the Chapter Almoner combining the duties of Craft Almoner, Mentor and Membership Officer is hugely important to the strength and well-being of a Chapter and we will continue to work on this.

In the long run, the overall strength of The Royal Arch depends upon the vitality of the Craft. The new Membership Pathway Lodges in the Craft, highlight, from the very beginning, the natural progression of Core Masonry from Entered Apprentice through to Royal Arch Companion. The Craft overall is very supportive of The Royal Arch and as this Province has the same Head of both organisations, it should come as no surprise that this link is being continually reinforced in Essex!

Royal Arch Tracing Boards Chapter of True Friendship

Most Companions can be forgiven for not knowing that there are tracing boards in the Royal Arch because very few examples are known to remain in existence.

At the convocation of the Chapter of True Friendship, No. 160 on12th November, some ninety Companions were present at the Rochford Masonic Centre to witness a fascinating and informative explanation of the tracing boards.

The explanation was given by members of the Metropolitan Grand Stewards' Demonstration Team, headed by E. Comp. Simon White PGSoj, Metropolitan Grand Inspector.

In attendance was the Deputy Grand Superintendent, E. Comp. Nicholas Franklin, Second Provincial E. Comp. Grand Principal Phillip Campbell, Third Provincial Grand Principal, E. Comp. Elliott Chevin together with three APGPs.

Also present was the Deputy Metropolitan Grand Superintendent E. Comp. Chris Clarke PGSN who is also a member of the Chapter of True Friendship and had facilitated the visit by the demonstration team.

Royal Arch Tracing Boards have a history dating back to when UGLE was first formed when the Duke of Sussex, the first Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England, commissioned the artist John Harris to harmonise the tracing boards by creating an official model for each degree including the Holy Royal Arch. The rituals and explanation of the symbols had in the main been lost over time but have again been brought to life following research of examples of the Tracing Boards that are held at Freemasons Hall in Great Queen Street.

The inaugural demonstration of the Royal Arch Tracing Boards had been given at the Clapton Chapter No. 1365 at Southgate Chapter in April this year when our very own Most Excellent Grand Superintendent E. Comp. Rodney Lister Bass had presided as MEZ of his London Chapter. The Chapter of True Friendship were very proud to have hosted the very first demonstration in an Essex Chapter and the evening was much enjoyed by all who were present.

Look out for news of the next explanation of the tracing boards by the Metropolitan Grand Stewards Demonstration Team; it should definitely be experienced at least once!

In a still changing world may we remain unchanged, and like the bleak mountain which bears its crest with dignified composure to the coming tempest and fearlessly presents its bosom to the midnight storm may our faith and our tenants remain until time shall be no more.

Your chance to boost your local communities and charities

he Essex Freemasons Community Fund has now been officially launched – it's ready to make a massive difference across the entire Province - and it's ready to 'match fund' and support your Lodge or Chapter.

The charity, part of a major new community initiative by the PGM, RW Bro Rodney Lister Bass OBE, has been set up to work with Essex Freemasons by supporting the good causes that really matter to you, in your local towns and villages.

So what does this mean? In real terms we would ask you to approach the local charities that you like to support and ask them what would make a real difference. All charities need cash so general funding would not qualify - we are talking here about clearly identifiable projects - where we as Freemasons can take ownership. Ideally, smaller charities that frequently fail to attract funding and especially those that work with children or young people, would be considered first.

We also ask that members of your Lodge or Chapter be prepared to put your hands in your own pockets. This means that if you are willing to give money then we as a Community Fund will consider match funding or even providing the balance of what is needed to deliver that project and make it happen for the local charities that you support.

We cannot guarantee to be able to provide for every application, but be assured that all requests will be considered by the team of trustees and grants will be awarded based on the overall benefit that will be given to the local community.

The Essex Freemasons Community Fund has been set up with savings made by introducing new efficiency measures at the Provincial HQ in Wickford. This has enabled a generous fund of around £80,000 to be made available for good causes and it is expected that similar amounts will be transferred over on an annual basis.

The charity will work alongside the established Essex Provincial Charity Fund which has been reformulated into a modern CIO, which can be run in a similar way to a limited company but is still policed by the Charity Commission. In short it means that money can be made available from both charities - so what are you waiting for?

Essex Festival 2022

The launch of both charities comes when we are asking Essex Freemasons to dig deep to support the Essex Festival2022. At the time of writing we have banked £3.2 million towards our target of £6 million - a fantastic effort, but still a long way to go and with just two years left.

The secret of delivering our target is dependent on Essex Freemasons committing to a regular payments - one which can still be spread over five years. You will see inserted into this edition of Essex Mason a letter from the PGM asking for your support and a regular payment form which I hope you will fill in and return to me at my home: 73, Quorn Gardens, Leigh-on-Sea, Essex SS9 2TA

We only ask for £8.50 a month - more if you can afford it - which equates to £500 over a five year period and if you add Gift Aid it becomes £625. Do this and you immediately qualify for a Festival Jewel which will be posted by return - and which I hope you will wear with pride.

If enough of you return forms then we shall easily hit our £6 million target, money which is coming back into Essex at an incredible rate in charitable donations. Every year we receive nearly £500,000 to help distressed Freemasons and their families across the Province. We also receive a similar amount for local charities.



In recent weeks we have given £72,000 to a

Rape Crisis Centre in Colchester, £50,000 to a children's charity in Chelmsford along with numerous other charities in every part of Essex. The MCF is our local charity and you can work with them and the good causes that you support to ask for grants - talk to me if you need more information because remember - what's raised in Essex stays in Essex.

Finally I would like to thank all those Masons who have gone that extra mile to support our various charities and the Festival in particular. I am truly humbled by your generosity and ongoing commitment.

Donate £72,000 to Colchester Charity

ssex Freemasons have donated almost £72,000 to Colchester based charity, CARA (Centre for Action on Rape and Abuse), to help fund a specialist "Young Person's Practitioner" to provide support to teenage victims of sexual abuse

The funding will cover the cost of providing therapeutic support to help young people of all genders to move forwards from the trauma they have experienced, feel more able to cope with their lives and develop coping mechanisms to, for example, manage flashbacks and self-harming behaviour.

The grant, which was given via the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF), the Freemasons own charity, is one of the largest ever given in Essex to one single organisation and reflects the importance of the work that CARA undertakes in North and Mid Essex.

"The work undertaken by CARA is incredible and we are delighted to be able to support this excellent charity," said Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Essex, who presented a cheque for the grant to Helen Parr, Director of CARA.



"CARA is a lifeline for vulnerable victims of sexual violence and child sexual abuse, helping to rebuild lives and we know that money from Essex Freemasons will make a real difference." Helen Parr for CARA, commented: "We are extremely grateful to the Freemasons for recognising the importance of the specialist support we provide to young victims of sexual violence and child sexual abuse and providing a grant that will help fund our work in Colchester and Tendring for a full three years."

CARA has been providing a counselling service for young people who have been victims of sexual violence or child sexual abuse since 2009. Demand has sadly increased by 163% over the last four years, with the number of referrals growing from 105 (2014) to 276 (2018).

This has grown largely due to increased awareness and understanding amongst young people, professionals and parents and across society in general. Currently, young people have to wait for four and a half months to start the support once they've been referred, but the additional funding from Essex Freemasons will help reduce that waiting time.

The Young Person's Practitioner is a fully qualified and experienced young person's counsellor. She will work one day a week from each of the CARA premises in Colchester, Clacton and Harwich. Each young person will normally be offered sessions for a minimum of six and a maximum of 20 weeks, depending on their needs. Over three years, the grant will support CARA's work with over 100 young people

Referrals to CARA come from the Essex Police, the Essex Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC), Social Care teams, GPs, voluntary organisations and parents who may be concerned about their child, and sometimes from the young people themselves.

CARA (Centre for Action on Rape and Abuse) works with victims and survivors of sexual violence and child sexual abuse, providing independent, specialist support and promoting and representing their rights and needs.

Reflections on Christmas

This last Christmas has been a most humbling time for many of us. In November we wrote to all of the 120 unattached widows and told them about the strength of masonry in Essex with new lodges opening despite a few having to close. We focused on our work that we are doing to reduce loneliness and the importance of pastoral care in our work.

The response we have had has been amazing with 92 widows replying to say, thank you for their gift and many asking me to pass on their thanks to all the brethren in Essex for the work you do. Below is a typical quote.

"I lost my husband some years ago and recently a dear friend passed away, I still struggle with this and especially the loneliness that it brings. Often it is just knowing that someone is there for a chat and some companionship. It is so important that people like me feel involved and a part of the community. When the days and weeks stretch out before me, I often think how important the almoner's work is in trying to bring people like me together, I wish you well and please pass on my thanks to all Essex Masons."

Update on the Role of the Lodge Almoner

Without any doubt the most important part of the lodge almoner's role is giving pastoral support to lodge members, be they regular or infrequent visitors, widows and of course those who are in distress with either their health or finance. It is a role that requires specific skills, especially in listening, patience and good communication.

The role is also about signposting the distressed person to the relevant source so they can get expert help quickly. The list is long but the top 5 are as follows and more will be given to almoners at the conference

Lodge Donations – A new request in a new decade

Giving to those less fortunate is perhaps at the heart of a mason's work, naturally the almoners team get many calls every week from around the province asking if we (the Essex Provincial Almoners Fund) can help a brother in need and we always try to respond quickly with advice or some tangible award.

We can only give the financial help if we have the money donated to us and there remains a huge variance between those lodges that donate and those that don't. In the last year, out of 302 lodges and 120 chapters in the province, we have had donations in from just 48 lodges and chapters totalling £4964 from 1st Dec 2018 to 30th Nov.2019. To all who have supported us may I say again, a huge thank you and individual acknowledgements have been sent. The recent donations of £3221 during the run up to Christmas 2019 were healthier but sadly still insufficient to even cover the cost of the unattached widows Christmas gifts, let alone help to fund the other work through the year.

The EPAF and the Southend & Essex Masonic Welfare Trust frequently find that some lodges make regular calls on the charities for help, yet some of these units have never given any donations of money to the charities.

So maybe as we enter a new decade, I wonder if we can try and change how we support our eligible brethren in their hour of need and my plea is for every lodge and chapter to try and give something each year. Just £100 from each lodge and chapter a year is all the EPAF need and as a leading supermarket would say" every little counts". My thanks in advance.

Keeping in touch

A common request from a mason, usually an elderly man who does not attend his lodge regularly, is for me to put him back in touch with his lodge and for a member to visit him. Widows too often phone in and ask for more contact from their husband's lodge. Dozens of such requests come to me and so my message in this edition is for lodge members, led by the almoner, to try and keep in touch as much as is possible with widows, widowers, country members and members who haven't been to two or three consecutive meetings.

Making a single phone call to somebody may be the only contact they get from another person that day or indeed that week and your phone call will make all the difference to them.

Grant Awards from the MCF

I am often asked about grants that Essex get from the MCF, well from January to November 2019 we made to the MCF 102 formal enquiries, we received a total of 185 grants versus 178 last year and these totalled £389K versus £344K last year. Overall, we received the 3rd largest sum of grants from all the provinces excluding the Metropolitan District

Social Isolation - A New Approach

This is one of the terrors of our modern life and as we live longer so the problems get worse. Social Isolation usually effects the elderly but not always and many young and middle-aged people can be affected. There will be more on this at the Lodge Almoners conference in April.

Loneliness often leads to other illnesses, bad lifestyles, poor eating and little or no exercise. As a result, serious ill health is often the outcome.

To continue our efforts in tackling this we have taken into the team, Gary Neilson, a mason who wants to make a difference by initially helping our widows to meet each other and socialise. Gary can be contacted on 07786 151587 if you have ideas to help him I have been in touch with all Masonic Centres last year and several are very keen to assist in this work, I am grateful to those that have come forward

The Royal Order of Scotland The Province of East Anglia

he Royal Order of Scotland is essentially Christian in character. As with Craft Masonry, the exact origins of the Order and its ritual are shrouded in antiquity. It differs from modern Craft Masonry and does not fit into any sequence with other Orders.



It will come as no surprise that the Order is governed from Edinburgh where Grand Lodge is situated. Subordinate to this are Provincial Grand Lodges throughout the world, however there are no Private Lodges.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of East Anglia meets on three occasions in the year; Colchester in April, Newmarket in May and Lowestoft for the Installation Meeting in September. The Province encompasses Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and North Essex as far as Chelmsford.



Qualification for membership requires that a potential candidate must have been a Master Mason for five years and upwards. In practice each Province lays down its own requirements, for example some demand that a candidate has attained 30 degrees in the Ancient and Accepted Rite. In East Anglia candidates are usually limited to brethren who have been Master Masons for at least five years and have shown a keen interest in Freemasonry beyond their craft lodge.

The Province of East Anglia usually "Advances & Promotes" two candidates per meeting and entry may be protracted as there are about two hundred Lodges from which to draw candidates.

Documentary proof in the archives of Grand Lodge gives rise to the assertion that, with the exception of the craft, the Royal Order of Scotland is the oldest unchanged ritual of speculative masonry, for there is written evidence that a number of Lodges 41 and the ritual has never been changed

of the Order were active in London as early as 1741 and the ritual has never been changed.

When the first Grand Lodge of the Order was formed in Edinburgh in 1768, the King of Scots was made the Hereditary Grand Master.

There are two degrees conferred respectively in the Provincial Grand Chapter and the Provincial Grand Lodge, and in the order "the Heredom of the Kilwinning" and "Knighthood of the Rosy Cross".

The Wardens undertake some of the most lengthy and difficult ritual in freemasonry and the Provincial Grand Master plays a full part, although he is usually assisted by the Deputy and Substitute Provincial Grand Masters and Past Holders of those officers.

In the first degree, the candidate is invested with a white apron edged with crimson and a sash or baldrick of a similar colour. This is worn over the left shoulder and under the right arm. The apron is later replaced, and the candidate is invested with a green sash or baldrick. This is worn over the right shoulder and under the left arm. A breast jewel of seven stars and an armband of thistle green edged with gold and which bears the motto "Virtue et Silentio".

In these degrees, masonry is depicted in a purely Christian aspect. A large part of the ritual is couched in quaint old doggerel verse and is worked mainly by question and answer, as in the Craft Lectures, but embracing elements and references found in many other degrees. This Order will be of interest to brethren who profess the Christian Faith and who have maintained a dedicated & genuine interest in Freemasonry over several years.

t was on the 17th of July 1957 that Mr. Ronald Frederick Marsh, entered Loughton Masonic Hall, unaware of what would happen next, was met by his father John as IG, and was initiated him into freemasonry, so that when he left Loughton Temple, he was a Brother to all other freemasons worldwide, but particularly Lambourne Lodge no 3945.!

He was only 21 years plus 2 months old, which meant he had a head start regarding longevity in Masonry, but he filled those early years by progressing through to WM in 1970. He took on ADC and then DC for 8 years followed by 5 years as Chaplain. He had started work as a pupil civil engineer with Rush and Tomkins, was awarded a state scholarship to read Civil Engineering at Kings college, London, receiving a BSc , and then moving to Ove Arup for the rest of his outstanding and satisfying career.

He had attended Kings College which entitles him to append AKC after his name, but his earlier school was William D'Aeth in Dartford, and eventually was the Founding Master of the Dartford school lodge. He was honoured with active provincial grand rank of Senior Grand deacon, and thence PPSGD, eventually on to PPJGW. Unusually he also attained PPJGW in West Kent (Dartford).

He was a constant attender at the L.of I., being preceptor for many years, when the L.of I. was weekly, and the excellent ritual that was typical of Lambourne Lodge was no doubt due a great deal to Bro. Ron's efforts.

He has been resident in France for several years, but still attended as often as possible, but recently had suffered with back problems which saw him being bed-bound during 2016/17. However, as part of his rehabilitation he is trying to become more mobile, and to remain upright. Because of hospital appointments he was able to attend Dartford, but could not make Lambourne, his Mother lodge who meet in October.

It was therefore agreed to present him with his Certificate to recognise the 60th anniversary of his Initiation, at the William D'aeth Lodge, after observing the protocols of both Essex and West Kent GL., where the RW.Bro. Col. Sir Neil Thorne PPGM., presented Bro. Ron with his certificate, with genuine sincerity, especially when Sir Neil, sat with Ron as he was unable to rise comfortably. This was followed by a presentation by W.Bro Doug. Lee, Lambourne's Master, of a capo damonte model perhaps modelled on Bro. Ron himself. At the festive board the host Lodge also presented Bro. Ron with a tankard as their tribute, to his contribution to them. A summons suitably signed by all present was also handed to Bro, as a memento.

Lambourne Lodge 3945 celebrated its Centenary in September 2019 and W.Bro. Ron was asked to occupy the Masters chair, which he did, and the opportunity to repeat the presentation, but now with RW.Bro. Rodney Bass was taken. A copy is attached of the photo!!

Finally, all who know him see him as a big man, both Masonically, and in normal life, with a beard that is as old as his Masonic career.

Il that is good about Freemasonry was evident at the November meeting of Wykeham No. 4925 in a full capacity Constellation Temple at The Square at Upminster, which was attended by the Provincial Grand Master, Rodney Lister Bass OBE. After the Lodge was opened by the Master W.Bro. David Macnaghten and the Provincial Grand Master had entered, the special proceedings commenced.

The first item was a delightful presentation of a Grand Lodge Certificate to Bro. Jason Goodman by APGM W.Bro. Clive Rees, on his first visit to Wykeham.

This was followed by a lecture by W.Bro. John Davies, PAPGM and W.Bro. Keith Brown OBE, PAGDC. They presented a vivid picture of the 92 years of the Wykeham Lodge from its foundation, in the growing years of Freemasonry in the 1920's, to the present day. It covered the early challenges of the formation and how the Lodge survived the Second World War, sometimes with bombs dropped nearby. Then the rebuilding after the war and a Golden Era in the 1960's and 1970's when there were regular ceremonies, sometimes doubles with entertaining Festive Boards. At the same time the Ladies Nights at the Heybridge were the great social occasions of the year.

The lecture paid tribute to members who had sustained the Lodge in recent years sometimes taking office as Master more than once, summed up in the famous words of the Gang Show song that Wykeham had always 'Ridden Along on the Crest of a Wave.'

The lecture was followed a reading of the Lodge minutes of 1969. Then the presentation of a 50th Certificate to W.Bro. Keith Brown by the Provincial Grand Master who highlighted W.Bro. Keith Brown's progress in Masonry and his charitable activities in Essex.

In reply W.Bro. Keith Brown thanked the Provincial Grand Master for coming to Wykeham, a promise he had made a year before and still honoured despite the traumatic period in his health. He had been initiated by his Father in November 1969 at the White Hart Hotel in Romford which was its meeting place at the time. At that meeting there were four other brethren all of whom have since received their 50th Certificates and all of whom were in attendance at this special meeting in 2019 – a possible unique achievement and a reflection of the family of freemasonry that had supported the Lodge over the years.

The meeting concluded with notice of a motion from the Charity Steward to donate £5,000 to Festival 2022 in addition to the contribution to date with Wykeham at Grand Patron Status.

Seventy eight brethren including twenty Grand Officers sat down to the Festive Board and the Provincial Grand Master addressed the meeting and guests on the positive progress being made in Essex Masonry. He thanked W.Bro. Keith Brown for his donation from his family charity Fryerning Foundation which he would donate to Cancer Research UK.

The speech to the guests was given by W.Bro. Keith and replied to by W.Bro. Chris Williams a long-standing friend of Keith. Then a toast to the Founders by W.Bro. John Davies and lastly an enthusiastic Tyler's Toast by W. Bro. Evans, the brethren retired - happy to meet, happy to part, happy to meet again!

Remembrance Sunday 10th November 2019

Brethren across the Province paid tribute to our fallen hero's

Wheel of Fellowship Maldon

The Fallen were remembered in services across the Maldon district.

The wreath laying ceremony took place at the war memorial in Maldon High Street at 10:30am on Remembrance Sunday.

Wing Commander Glen Mayes, Parade Marshal gathered veterans, volunteers and school children to pay their respects.

The Act of Remembrance was opened by Father John Dickens who lead the crowed in the Hymn 'O God, our Help in Ages Past'.

After the Bidding Prayer, Standards we're dipped as the Bugler sounded the 'Last Post'. This was followed by the Town Mayor of Maldon, Cllr Flo Shaughnessy who conducted The Exhortation.

After the laying of the Wreaths, the names of the fallen were read out by representatives of local youth groups and services - this year in particular remembering the 248 men of Maldon and Heybridge who made the ultimate sacrifice from 1914-1919.

Cllr Stephen Nunn read the Dedication - Kohima Epitaph, followed by the Rev Tony Shrimpton who lead the prayer.

Lt Jon Doyle of the Salvation Army, shared a heartfelt Address, recounting his personal experience in spending time with 94-year-old Second World War veteran Harry Read who earlier this year re-enacted his parachute jump into Normandy to mark the 75th anniversary of D-Day.

Harry Read was a 20-year-old wireless operator when he first landed on the battlefields of northern France on 6 June 1944. After plunging into a flooded trench near Le Mesnil, he made it through the war before going on to become leader of the Salvation Army in the UK.

Masons from Maldon and Witham lodges, were well represented in the parade with Worshipful Brothers Glyn Garrett, David Foster, Tony Wiley, David Payne, , Alan Reid, and Brother Bruce Heubner taking part with W Brother Mark Jones laying the wreath on behalf of the Maldon Masonic Hall.

THE ORIGINS OF THE POPPY

The poppy which is the recognised symbol of remembrance was inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields " written by John McCrae in 1915 and later published in 1917.

Major John McCrae was a Doctor serving with the 1st Brigade Canadian Field Artillery at the second battle of Ypres between April-May 1915. After the death of his friend Lt Alexis Helmer whose funeral service he conducted as the Brigade Chaplain was busy elsewhere he drafted this poem when viewing the wooden crosses with vivid red poppies springing up between them.

In Flanders Fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard among the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived , felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders Fields.



An American lady Moina Michael was working at the YMCA Overseas War Secretaries office in New York in 1918 and was so inspired by McCrae's poem that she vowed to pin a poppy to her lapel to honour and revere the war dead. She then purchased 25 silk poppies and distributed them to her work colleagues and this led within 2 years to the American Legion adopting the poppy as the official symbol of remembrance in 1920.

At the American Legion Conference in New York a French representative Madame E. Guerin witnessed the sale of these poppies and took the idea back to France as a means to raise money for children affected by the Great War. Madam Guerin organised a team of war widows to make paper poppies which saw sales in excess of 1 million by 1921.

Madam Guerin sent a team of poppy sellers to London in an effort to popularise the appeal in the United Kingdom which was favourably received. Field Marshall Douglas Haig who was a founder of the Royal British Legion and a veteran commander of the British Forces was so enthused by the idea that he had it adopted almost immediately and the first ever poppy day occurred on November 11th 2021.

The poppy rapidly outgrew its American roots being adopted by Canada and Australia in 1921, followed by New Zealand in 1922. "Red is the leaf and the blood ,black is the heart of sorrow."



Festival of Remembrance Tabor Academy in Braintree

The RWProvGM and members of the Executive, accompanied by two Provincial Grand Standard Bearers, attended the 9th Festival of Remembrance organised and run every year at the Tabor Academy in Braintree by their Estates Manager, Bro. David Wiles of Rosslyn Lodge No. 1543.



The ceremony was first held as a tribute to a former pupil, Lance Corporal Scott Hardy of The Royal Anglian Regiment, who was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2010 but continues each year supported by Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Essex, members of the local community, Local Government officials (MP's, Mayors), serving Armed Forces, local Police and Fire Service Chiefs, the Royal British Legion from Haig House in London and Essex County Officers and veterans from all conflicts. Representative Essex Freemasons have been invited since 2015 and have always featured high on the list of VIP's and in recent years have attended with our Standard Bearers who are invited to join the procession of Royal British Legion Standard Bearers led by W.Bro Gordon Roach, also of Rosslyn Lodge.

This year W.Bro Alan Brown, the Secretary of Thames Mouth Lodge No. 6694 loaned the school a scale model of the Cenotaph in Whitehall, made by W.Bro Steve Zetter of that lodge and used by them every year in their own Remembrance Tribute, which took centre-stage.

It was an honour and a privilege to join the VIP's and 1,000 students at such a well organised and moving tribute, the format of which changes every year, and a great way to normalise Freemasonry in the Community.

VE Day and our Essex **Regiment Masonic Heritage**

Officially May Day Bank Holidays are held on the first Monday of May, but for 2020 it has been moved to Friday 8th May as part of the 75th anniversary of the VE Day commemorations.

In WW2 The Essex Regiment ('The Regiment') fought many battles throughout North West Europe, Tobruk, Alamain, Monte Cassino and Kohima. Also the 10th Battalion converted 'en-masse' to the 9th Parachute Battalion and fought the battle at Merville Gun Battery after which Merville Barracks in Colchester is named.

Freemasonry has always attracted servicemen willing to give their lives for the freedom of others to practice Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. In the Age of Enlightenment, as the membership of Freemasonry increased, the first military lodge was formed in 1732 by the 1st Foot (The Royal Scots) and 200 years later in 1932 the 574th military lodge was formed by the 8th Kings Royal Irish Hussars. The 44th Foot was raised in 1741 and the 56th in 1755 becoming the 'East Essex' and 'West Essex' in 1782 and the 1st and 2nd Battalions 'The Essex Regiment' in 1881. In 1759 at Quebec under Bro Major General James Wolfe, The Regiment fought alongside the future Primus Provincial Grand Master of Essex, then serving in the Royal Navy, R W Bro Thomas Dunkerley.

Four military lodges were formed by The Regiment with Warrants from four different Grand Lodges. The first in 1760 with the "King George III Lodge" (Scottish) followed in 1762 (Provincial Grand Lodge of Quebec), 1765 (Irish) and in 1784 (the Moderns) with the "Rainsford Lodge" named after Major General Charles Rainsford, Colonel of the Regiment from 1781 to 1809.

The gallantry of The Regiment was rewarded with six Victoria Crosses, distinction in many campaigns including the Peninsula War, Waterloo, Crimea, South Africa and 62 battle honours in WW1 with the loss of over 8,000 men from 31 Battalions. In 1931 the Freemasons of Essex presented the West Gallery Front to the Regimental Chapel at Warley as a memorial to all the Freemasons of Essex who died in WW1.

Another Freemason, who was also a Lodge secretary, did more than any other person to change the then despised and unwanted way people regarded the Army in peacetime.







Never a soldier himself, Bro Rudyard Kipling's Barrack Room Ballads and other poems, conveyed the foibles of soldiers to the hearts and minds of a population which began to appreciate far more the dangers and hardships of military life. This change helped foster numerous military charities and welfare organisations, many of which still survive today.

It is a great honour for me to be able to address you again as Grand Superintendent in and over the Royal Arch Province of Essex at this Annual Essex Convocation – it is now four years since I was installed as your Grand Superintendent and Provincial Grand Master and I have enjoyed every minute in both those roles.

May I again thank most sincerely Cliff Thoms for his outstanding work for the Royal Arch as Deputy Grand Superintendent. His experience and wise counsel both in the Royal Arch and in Craft masonry has been invaluable both to me personally and to the Province as a whole. I also pay a warm tribute to Clive Rees (and wish him well in his new role in the Craft) and to Phil Campbell for their conscientious and diligent work as Second and Third Provincial Grand Principals respectively. I am sure that Nick Franklin will be an admirable successor to Cliff and that Phil and Elliott Chevin thoroughly deserve their promotions.

The Assistants to the PGPs have also done an excellent job. Ian Simpson is stepping down today as an APGP. I thank him for his hard work in that role and his continuing active involvement in the Province is very much appreciated. I am delighted to have appointed Martin Cook as APGP to succeed him and David Wilson to succeed Elliott Chevin and I wish them both well in their new roles.

May I also extend my grateful thanks to the Provincial Scribe E, Phil Lovelock and the outgoing and incoming Provincial Grand DCs Geoff Turpin and Joe Shearer and each of their teams for all their hard work and effort in ensuring that today's meeting proceeded smoothly – as well as the outstanding support they give me throughout the year.

The Royal Arch Executive has continued to develop, borrow, and produce many innovative initiatives around the Province, primarily designed to recruit new Exaltees and to provide a better understanding of The Royal Arch. With the help of The Stewards Chapter and the ever-improving network of Lodge Royal Arch Reps, we remain an active and vibrant Royal Arch Province. A more clearly defined and broader role for the Chapter Almoner combining the duties of Craft Almoner, Mentor and Membership Officer is hugely important to the strength and well being of a Chapter and we will continue to work on this.

In the long run, the overall strength of The Royal Arch depends upon the vitality of the Craft. The new Membership Pathway Lodges in the Craft, highlight, from the very beginning, the natural progression of Core Masonry from Entered Apprentice through to Royal Arch Companion. The Craft overall is very supportive of The Royal Arch and as this Province has the same Head of both organisations, it should come as no surprise that this link is being continually reinforced in Essex!

We also make no apologies for briefly emphasising two things. First, promotions to active or senior Provincial rank in the Craft in Essex will normally require Membership of the Royal Arch as a pre-requisite and, in turn, appointments to active or senior Essex Provincial rank in the Royal Arch require a continuing engagement with the Craft. This reinforces the indissoluble link between the two. Secondly, it is as vital that the ceremony of Exaltation is carried out well so as to give a favourable impression to the candidate for Royal Arch masonry as it is for the ceremony of Initiation in the Craft. It is pointless for the ceremony to be read (or even prompted) from the book – it completely loses its meaning and purpose - better to divide up the work and farm it out. As my old Preceptor in my Mother Lodge used to say - "Chuck the book away – it is wrong anyway !!!

I know that all the Members of the Executive appreciate the support and encouragement we receive from Chapters all across the Province and their generous hospitality whenever we make an official visit. It has been my especial pleasure and privilege this past year to serve as First Principal of Essex First Principals Chapter No 3256 and of Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Chapter No 8665 for which I am eternally grateful. Can I also pay tribute to the excellent support provided by several Essex Chapters to the 2022 Festival (as illustrated in the Report of the Committee of General Purposes) and to encourage others to follow their lead.

Thank you once again for listening to me and may God Bless you all and indeed this Royal Arch Province of Essex. As I say at the conclusion of each of these addresses, let us go forward together and walk worthily in the light which shines around. Rodney Lister Bass, OBE
