




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DepPGM's Foreword

Brethren, a lot has happened since the special Spring Edition of Essex Mason Magazine. At that time we had lost eleven brethren but since then we have lost a further four brethren to the virus and our condolences go out to their friends and family.



Every death is significant, but the sudden passing of our Provincial Grand Master was unexpected and a shock to us all. Can I, on behalf of is wife Margaret and his brother, W.Bro Henry Bass, and their families thank all of you for the many cards and letters of condolences they received. It was very much appreciated and the many kind things that were written about RW.Bro Rodney were a great comfort to them at a very difficult time. Due to Coronavirus regulations his funeral at Great Totham was restricted to thirty mourners and I was privileged to be allowed to attend to represent the Province and I was pleased to see members from Tollesbury along the route. We are planning to hold a memorial service when restrictions are finally lifted, probably in the spring of 2021.

The MW The Grand Master's suspension of masonic meetings lapsed on 17th July and many lodges are now planning to resume meetings in September. A recent survey of our members suggested that almost 50% were ready to return to meetings now with the other 50% wanting to wait until the restriction on numbers able to attend was eased or until the pandemic is over or a vaccine has been found. Many of our centres have been working hard to be ready to open and will be available to host those meetings that do go ahead and I look forward to resuming my Freemasonry, as I am sure many of you do too.

However, if you do not think the time is quite right for you to return please do not feel that anyone will think any less of you. Your health is your responsibility and if you do not believe it is safe for you to return yet please do not think there is any pressure for you to do so, whatever your role is in your Lodge or Chapter.

Despite his failing health the RW ProvGM was keen to continue until 2022 so that he could see Essex deliver on its target of £6m for Festival 2022. The suspension of meetings has seriously impacted the amount of money Lodges & Chapters were able to raise so I hope you will support our Provincial Grand Charity Steward, W.Bro Colin Felton, and his plans to 'Save the Festival'.

Brethren, please stay safe and I look forward to seeing you around the Province soon.

Death of RW.Bro Rodney Lister Bass, OBE Provincial Grand Master of Essex



n his private life he was a senior Manager at HSBC Banking and his deep belief in service to the community service led to him following in his father's footsteps and joining Maldon Rural Council (later Maldon Council) in 1967, at which time he was the youngest Councillor in the country. He continued with them for the next 40 years and in 1997 he also became an Essex County Councillor and went on to be a Cabinet Member for Highways & Transportation between 2003-2007, Vice Chairman of Essex County Council between 2008-2009 and County Council Chairman between 2010-2012.

He then served again as Cabinet Member for Highways & Transportation between 2013-2015 and oversaw some of the council's largest capital projects and pushed for investment and improvement in the county's roads. He then focussed on Infrastructure until 2016, retiring after 50 years of public service in 2017.

In recognition of his service to the community he was elected an Honorary Alderman of Essex and honoured by HM the Queen in October 2017 when she invested him as an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the Empire; the OBE.

Rodney was initiated into Tollesbury Lodge No. 4738 in October 1978 and Exalted into Tollesbury Chapter in October 1981. He was the Master of Tollesbury Lodge in 1992 and the MEZ of Tollesbury Chapter in 2002 and appointment as a Provincial Grand Steward in the Craft followed in 1994 and in the Royal Arch in 2003. He was appointed to Craft Grand Rank in 2010 and as an APGM in 2011. In 2015 he was invested as the RW Provincial Grand Master for and the Grand Superintendent in and Over Essex.

He had also been the Master of Woodrolfe Lodge No. 8354 in 2006 and the MEZ of Clapton Chapter (MetGL) in 2008 and went on to be the Master of the Bear & Ragged Staff Lodge No. 8527 in 2015, Essex Masters Lodge No. 3256 in 2016, Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge No. 8665 in 2019 and the MEZ of Clapton Chapter for the 2nd and 3rdtime in 2015 and 2018 and the MEZ of Essex First Principals Chapter No. 3256 in 2018 and Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Chapter in 2019.

He was passionate about his Mother Lodge, Tollesbury, where he continued to play an active role and where the whole Executive dropped in unexpectedly in 2018 to help him celebrate his 40th anniversary as a Freemason. He also joined several Lodges and Chapters over the years and was made an honorary member of many others across the Province.

Under his leadership his Executive became more open and approachable and Essex Freemasons were encouraged to increase their community involvement, starting with an appeal that raised £160,000 to build a high wire and zip wire facility for Essex Scouts at Skreens Park, Chelmsford. His launch of a new Essex Freemasons Community Fund in 2019 has allowed significant funds to be made available to help hundreds of local charities and good causes across

the county.

At the time of his appointment as PGM Freemasonry was shrinking nationally and in the five years before his appointment the Craft in Essex lost 1,431 members, a 13.6% drop, while the Royal Arch lost 423 members, a 10.7% drop. In the five years he held office the Craft losses were reduced to 783 (an 8.6% loss) and the Royal Arch 152 (a 4.3% loss).

He was a great supporter of the Additional Masonic Orders and was an active member of many of them including Mark, Royal Ark Mariners, Rose Croix, Knights Templar, Royal Order of Scotland, Royal & Select Masters and the Commemorative Order of Thomas of Acon.

Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master states

"Rodney Bass was a great man who was loved and respected by everyone who knew him. Essex Freemasonry will be the poorer for his passing. Since his appointment in 2015 he has transformed Freemasonry in Essex, instilling a spirit of openness and ensuring that our members strived to make a difference in their communities. He worked hard to forge greater links and mutual cooperation with the all of the Additional Orders and his contribution to the wider Masonic family will be a lasting legacy."

In April last year he was diagnosed with lung cancer, but he did not allow it to slow his commitment to Essex and Essex Freemasonry, a commitment that was only cut short by the sudden deterioration of his condition.

Rodney leaves a wife, Margaret and stepchildren Emilio and Lydia, brother W.Bro Henry Bass and sister Julia Peel. He was pre-deceased by his elder sister, Alison Gould.

During August, the Provincial Office carried out a membership survey to get your views on the timings of returning to Masonic Duties. The details below are the results of some of the pertinent points; the full results will be made available on the Cube.

65% of the membership would attend a Lodge or Chapter meeting, if dining wasn't permitted

62% would use the adapted ceremony for Passing and Installation

27% would not choose to attend a meeting until the pandemic is over

75% would not use the adapted ceremony for Initiation or Exaltation

71% feel video conferencing should be used during some part of the ceremony to include members who cant attend in person

68% ready to return on resumption of meetings when all brethren can attend

PATHWAY

Provincial Mentor W.Bro. Pierre Waddoups EMAIL



Having recently been appointed as the new Provincial Grand Mentor, I thought it prudent to take this opportunity to introduce myself and in the next issue of this, the Essex Mason magazine, to acquaint you with the Deputy Mentor, the Group Mentors and their Deputies, all of whom make up the Provincial Mentoring Team.

We are all, wittingly or unwittingly, Mentors, either as that Brother officially appointed as the Lodge Mentor or as an experienced Mason with knowledge to impart to anyone seeking answers to those seemingly interminable questions about Freemasonry and Mentoring appears a deceptively easy task, but for it to be done well and for it to be effective, it requires the Mentor to be well informed and ideally to have a flair for delivery; to be interesting, to be engaging, personable and certainly not turgid.

An hour shall be set apart to talk Masonry, such were the terms of a resolution passed by the Antient Society of Freemasons in the City of York in the year 1725, when it was determined: 'That every Wednesday in the month a Lodge shall be held at the house of a Brother according as his turn

shall fall out.' This regulation of nearly 300 years ago shows that it was evident that the Freemasons of York fully appreciated the value of Masonic education as distinct from the mechanical repetition of the ceremonies.

Mechanical Repetition of the Ceremonies

It is this 'mechanical repetition of the ceremonies': first degree; second degree; third degree; Installation; repeated ad infinitum or ad nauseum, which is often uninspiring and proving to be challenging to many members and in particular, the new initiates.

This issue is exacerbated when questions on topics other than the ritual are asked by members, new or experienced and are continually not being answered. Subjects such as; what are the origins of the Craft or of the Royal Arch? Where does our ritual come from? What does the symbolism of the Working Tools mean? Etcetera and when questions are constantly not being addressed, one of three outcomes, it has been shown will occur to those members, they will become; discouraged, disinterested and ultimately disappear.

The net effect of this situation is that a number of Masons are leaving, disappearing from the Craft, many before they have received their Grand Lodge Certificates, which impacts on membership of the Royal Arch and subsequently on the associated Additional Orders too, but just as importantly, the potential enjoyment and that sense of personal fulfilment, is not being given a chance to flourish and because of this premature departure and those that left Freemasonry, stated in a survey carried out in Freemasonry Today in 2015, that they did so with 'a sense of feeling unfulfilled'.

A far reaching remedy to the problem of these early departures and a resolution was desperately needed with a radical solution being sought, before the matter went from acute to chronic. This solution also needed to address and deal with that oft quoted and misunderstood phrase 'to make a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge' which was clearly missing the point for many.

The Members Pathway

The answer lay with the launching of The Members' Pathway in 2017 and the subsequent introduction of the interdependent Solomon on-line resource, with its concept of a flexible approach to Masonic education in its construct and its delivery: including an emphasis on the role of Lodge and Chapter Mentor; whose collaboration has in the intervening years, become paramount, this proved to be the redemption that was needed.

The Members' Pathway was introduced as 'a guide to help Lodges attract, introduce and retain members' and as the Pro Grand Master, Peter Lowndes also wrote:

'The future of Freemasonry depends upon being able to introduce and retain committed members who will contribute to their Lodge and enjoy a lasting membership.'

This initiative comprises a series of 11 Steps, which takes a man who is interested in Freemasonry, but not yet a member, all the way through a journey to become a committed Master Mason, with Step 8 in the series, begins immediately after an Initiation and follows the new Freemason as he goes through the Degree ceremonies and experiences elements of Freemasonry for the first time.

Supporting the New Freemason

Step 8 is the most appropriate and relevant Step for the Lodge Mentor, because this is the point at which the new Freemason is at his most vulnerable and this is also the stage at which a significant proportion of new members leave and often within two years of their Initiation.

Intervention of the Lodge Mentor at this point is absolutely crucial and this, in my opinion, cannot be emphasised enough. But the Mentor's responsibilities do not end here, because the role of the Lodge Mentor is a continuous one, it is an on-going supportive role and as referenced earlier, one of education and personal development too.

Strategies that can be employed by a Mentor are things such as; meeting up with the new member immediately after each ceremony to talk through what he has experienced and explain the significance of that particular ceremony. Helping him with his preparation for each ceremony is another idea to support him and answering any questions that he may have, so that the Mentor, his Mentor, becomes a source of information, support and guidance for him.

Nuggets

Integral to the Solomon website, is the concept of Nuggets which are Talks whose delivery will take around 5 to 10 minutes and the content of which is designed to enhance parts of the ceremony as a way of making sense of it to a participant or to someone who has witnessed the performance. The Nuggets can be delivered so that they are pertinent to any portion of a ceremony, even Installations.

The Pathway (Steps 1 to 11)

1. Lodge Planning

For a man known to existing members

- 2. Identifying prospective candidates
- 3. Approaching prospective candidates

For a man not known by existing members (e.g. via the internet)

4. Responding to enquiries from potential candidates

For all prospective and potential candidates

- 5. Preparing the prospective candidate for interview
- 6. Interviewing the applicant
- 7. Preparing the candidate for Initiation
- 8. Supporting the new Freemason
- 9. Introducing the Royal Arch
- 10. Retaining our members

11. Retrieving members

While I understand that the 'mechanical repetition of the ceremonies': first degree; second degree; third degree; Installation; is important, in fact, it is essential, because it is after all what we are about in terms of ceremony and from this, the making and the progressing of Freemasons and it is an essential part, the bed rock of our Speculative Freemasonry.

It must at the same time be accompanied with an understanding of why we do what we do, supplemented by some idea of where we come from as a fraternity, which in turn can help to guide us as to where we are heading in the 21st century and make us as a fraternal organisation, relevant in today's world, where everything is challenged, analysed and critiqued.

That said, no matter how much our society's values appear to change; work pressures and the consequent effect of this on leisure time, the core values of Freemasonry are immutable and it is this glue, if you will, that binds us and Mentors help to make sense of all of this in their endeavours and assist in continuing to help make Freemasonry, 'a centre of union, a nexus of contact and solidarity between people of different backgrounds.' (Clark, P. 2000, p.330).

Fostering Curiosity and Developing Understanding

This is the point at which Solomon becomes significant and it was launched in December 2018, with its mission statement of 'Fostering Curiosity and Developing Understanding' and 'to help in making good men better' and straightforward goal in helping members of Lodges and Chapters to learn more about Freemasonry. Within the first month of its launch, it boasted over 10,000 members and the membership numbers are up to; at the time of writing during the hopefully, latter stages of the Covid-19 pandemic, in excess of 30,000.



Mentors, can either deliver a Nugget at a relevant juncture at a Meeting, whether there is work to be done or not, or they can help develop that newer member, by asking them to Present a Nugget in the Lodge, or Chapter. This latter idea has many benefits, from inclusion, to personal development via a modest research process; the advantages of this are many-fold.

Mentors historically, have always had an extremely important role to play and now, even more so in modern Freemasonry; in encouraging, supporting and informing members, which will doubtless help in retention of the membership, so please, do not underestimate the essential part that they have volunteered to undertake as Mentors, in helping to make a success of the process of recruitment and retention.

Lastly, a word of encouragement to all Mentors; your role is vital for the success of a Lodge and Chapter and to Freemasonry as a whole. Do enjoy your position as Mentor so that Brethren and Companions can understand their Freemasonry and that they will ultimately, with confidence gained through knowledge, encourage others to join us and remain and grow with us and in the words of the other part of the Solomon Mission Statement, to help in 'making good men better.'

Eastwoodbury Lodge 7922

Well I heard of the "Pathway" and attended a couple of the sessions at Saxon Hall in Southend. The first event was well supported with the great and the good from Grand Lodge and Province who were also in attendance, expounding on the virtues of a new day in Freemasonry.

Clearly some interesting debates ensued but it was refreshing to hear that "This is the way we have always done it" was no longer a valid reason from some of the "old Guard" and was up for challenge leading a refreshing way to identifying potential new members and more importantly retaining them.

So I attended a second event, again at Saxon hall which was driven by the Pathway Provincial Team. The meeting reaffirmed steps 1-6 and basically getting the foundations laid with roles and responsibilities in the lodge. A further meeting was held at Saxon Hall but this time the atmosphere was more dynamic as there had been a bit of a lull since the previous meetings. Led by Lee Taylor and facilitated by Mick West, the room was challenged to their thought process and what needed to be done to qualify for a Pathway Lodge.

Fortunately I had read the Pathway booklet and came prepared with our Lodge Profile, which I believe highlighted the lodge's determination to become a "Pathway Lodge"

I suppose like most lodges, planning of ceremonies for the forthcoming year were being developed. Eastwoodbury had what I would call a lean year. Candidates did not materialise, a couple of resignations and deaths brought into focus that the Pathway could be a welcome approach.

It was agreed that our installation meeting in October 2019 would go ahead as normal but November 2019 could be a demonstration and January 2020 a Lecture and February 2020 a demonstration and March potentially a talk.

Then I August 2019, all changed. A Mr Charles Faweya had approached Saxon Hall to see about joining Freemasonry. Fortunately for us they could not accommodate and I got a phone call asking if Eastwoodbury Lodge 7922 would be interested in the prospective candidate. Straight away the answer was a resounding yes.

On the 3rd September 2019, both myself and WBro Paul Thomson (Treasurer) contacted Charles and visited him at his home address and met his family. He was a Microsoft Director covering the "Africa's" so made frequent journeys to Kenya, Nairobi, Lagos. A great first meeting, a met with great hospitality from Charles.

Both Paul and I agreed that it was important to keep in touch with Charles prior to him entering the lodge. We kept regular weekly contact and Paul occasionally met up with him. Charles application was read out in open lodge in October 2019 and he was initiated into Eastwoodbury Lodge 7922 on the 12th January 2020. Also at the meeting was the new APGM, Graham Dickerson, being his first visit to the lodge.

Again, key aspect of retention is keeping in contact with new candidates and encouraging them to attend Lodge Of Instruction and getting them involved in the day to day running of a lodge.

So Pathway has impacted on Eastwoodbury Lodge in a positive way. And may it continue to do so Charles will undertake his 2nd Degree Passing maybe November 2020 or January 2021



Warren Wood Lodge No 8284





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
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he history of Walden Lodge dates back to 1869 when, at that time, there were no facilities for Freemasonry whatsoever in this part of Essex with the nearest Essex Lodge located in Chelmsford and the only other alternatives were in Bishop Stortford, in the province of Hertfordshire, or Cambridge, in the Province of Cambridgeshire. With a growing interest in Freemasonry it was inevitable that sooner or later steps would be taken to form a Lodge in Saffron Walden.

A series of preliminary meetings were held at The Rose and Crown Hotel in Market Square, Saffron Walden, later to become Walden Lodge's first "home".

The petition to form a Lodge was recommended and supported by two Lodges, these being The Stortford Lodge No. 409 in



the Province of Hertfordshire and The Three Grand Principles Lodge No. 44, from the Province of Cambridgeshire. The petition was successful, and Walden Lodge, No. 1280 received its warrant on the 16th November 1869. The Lodge was opened at 2pm in the three degrees by Bro. Arthur Goodchild, Provincial Grand Deacon. The R.W. Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Bro. Robert J Bagshaw MP and his consecration team were received with traditional honours, it was noted that after the meeting ended and at 5.30pm twenty-six brethren sat down to a banquet costing 10s 6d per head which is almost £60 in today's money.

With the onset of the first world war in 1914 it proved to be a difficult time for Freemasonry and for Walden Lodge with both the Rose and Crown Hotel and the Town Hall comandered for use by the army, locations for meetings were difficult to arrange and it was decided that after forty-six years Walden Lodge ended its association with the Rose and Crown Hotel and, in 1916, moved to St Mary's Church Parish Rooms.

However In April 1927 Walden Lodge was given the option to purchase the freehold of number two, Church Street, Saffron Walden a furniture repository owned by the Stansted Furnishing Company and after estimates were obtained to convert the building into a Temple with Dining room the purchase was agreed at the princely sum of £633 11s 2d, (equivalent today as just over £40,000), the cost to rebuild, reconstruct and purchase furniture added another £1,512 15s 1d, (£95,750). It should be noted that speed of this work was quite remarkable as on the 10th November 1927, seven months later, the Ceremony of Dedication of the Temple was carried out by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master W. Bro Dr J. H. Salter D.L., J.P., PGD assisted by W.Bro Brig-Gen R. B. Colvin C.B. PGW and other Provincial Officers Joseph Bell, a builder who had a distinguished career as a Saffron Walden councillor, Alderman and Mayor, (Mayor, ten times between 1877 and 1909), was appointed the very first Master of The Lodge and his portrait, painted by W.Bro George Foster still hangs in the building, one of the few artefacts to survive the dreadful fire, in July 1999, that destroyed the majority of Freemasons Hall.





The fire, which consumed the roof, the Temple and part of the robing room destroyed the majority of its contents and it was to take two years before the building was rebuilt and refurbished. Over time various items, mainly 'specialised' furniture was located and replaced, and the Temple and hall was finally rededicated on the 26th October 2001.

In 1905 Walden Lodge introduced Royal Arch masonry to Saffron Walden and Walden Chapter No.

1280 was consecrated on the 14th June 1905 in the Province of Essex and is the 11th oldest Chapter still meeting regularly. Indeed, Walden Lodge was to promote Freemasonry further by jointly sponsoring, with Etheldreda Lodge (Newmarket), our first daughter Lodge, Granta No. 6179 which was consecrated in 1945. Walden Lodge was to sponsor another three Lodges, two of which still meet at Freemasons Hall, Saffron Walden, the other one meets at Bury Lodge, Stansted, they are:

- Stansted Mountfitchet Lodge No. 6230 consecrated in 1946,
- Audley Lodge, (Saffron Walden), No. 7281 consecrated in 1953 and
- Elsenham Lodge, (Saffron Walden), No. 8973 consecrated in 1981



One hundred and fifty years after receiving its warrant Walden Lodge, No. 1280 held its sesquicentenary meeting in the presence of the R. W. Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Rodney Lister Bass OBE and his accompanying Provincial team. During the meeting the Lodge was called off and a short 'play' was given, led by W. Bro Graham Newman, (not in picture), depicting an image of how Walden Lodge may have come into being. Unlike in 1869 when twenty-six brethren dined after its inaugural meeting, fifty-seven brethren enjoyed the festive board afterwards at an average cost of £26.00 per head.

18 Months to "Save Our Festival"

We have 18 months left to "Save our Festival." Just 78 weeks, at the time of writing, to raise £2.2 million to reach our late Provincial Grand Master's target of £6 million. Can we do it? Yes we can with your help. Will it be tough? Of course it will - but I know what big hearted Essex Freemasons can do when they have made their minds up and right now I need your help.

I promised our late PGM Rodney Lister Bass OBE that I would deliver his target – money desperately needed by the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) to maintain its and our programme across Essex, supporting hundreds of different charities together with distressed Freemasons and their families.

The suspension of meetings caused by Covid-19 saw our funds dry up. I reckon we have lost £1.2 million that Freemasons would have given if they had not been in lockdown, but the need is as big as ever and somehow we must make up that shortfall.

We get back nearly £1 million each year from the MCF whether we are in Festival or not, which is why I intend to do everything I can to deliver that promise in memory of our RW ProvGM. This is his Festival and in celebration of his life and the huge contribution he made to our Province we are launching a number of new ideas to raise that £2.2 million and to close that gap – please do your best to support them.

The Rodney Lister Bass Memorial Pin

The Rodney Lister Bass Memorial Pin comes in two versions, one in sterling silver and one gilded sterling silver (gold). They are in the form of the late ProvGM's initials and can be pinned to your Festival Jewel or to your lapel and can be worn with pride as part of your Masonic regalia.



I am very conscious that for some of our members the pandemic has caused significant financial hardship but I am asking those who can afford to do so to donate the money that you would have spent - and to give it by purchasing a pin to help "Save Our Festival."

Please buy a silver version for £25. Every penny counts if we are to achieve our target and it would be wonderful to see these pins across the Province.

At the time of writing the pins are in the final design and manufacture stage but will soon be available via Essex Mason.

The New Platinum Level Festival Target

Many Lodges have worked hard to get to Grand Patron status but realise they would not be able to achieve Double Grand Patron before the end of the Festival. We have therefore set a new interim Platinum level target for Lodges willing to go that extra mile. To work out how that figure applies to your Lodge or Chapter simply divide you existing Grand Patron target by three and then multiply by four.

All Lodges & Chapters have been notified of their new targets by the Provincial Charity Team and we look forward to issuing certificates to those units who go the extra mile.

Remember brethren, the targets are based on the number of members in a Lodge or Chapter, so it makes little difference how many members you have – the targets are the same for everyone. Even if you cannot hit Platinum please aim as high as you can, it is not a league table or a competition – it is a real need to "Save Our Festival."

Rewarding Your Support

There have been many individual Masons, Lodges and Chapters that have gone that extra mile to help make Festival 2022 a success. We want to mark the special contribution that some of you have already made and for others who will do so in the coming months.

From September 2020 we will be issuing a Festival President's Award, a unique certificate in memory of Rodney Bass, which will be presented to individuals, Lodges and Chapters who have made a special contribution towards making the Festival a success.

It recognises the enormous task we all face if we are going to reach our £6 million target. It is a reward for excellence, initiative and hard work in helping to raise funds for Festival 2022. If you or your Lodge are organising a special event, doing something above and beyond for the Festival then let us know and you could be one of the first to receive this new award.

Make a Pledge

With no meetings taking place during lockdown we know we are running out of time – but help is on its way. The MCF have agreed that if your Lodge or Chapter will pledge support for the Festival and are willing to commit to a specific sum, then you have until December 2022 before you have to hand over the money – that is nine months after the Festival officially ends and more than two years from now.

Make your pledge now and that sum will immediately be credited to your Lodge or Chapter and to the Festival total and it will count from the moment you notify us.

Essex Freemasons Supporting Local Charities

The Province set aside £60,000 from the Essex Freemasons Charity Fund to support local charities in every part of the Province. That money is being used to match fund donations by Lodges and Chapters - that's a massive £120,000 given since lockdown.

At the height of the Covid-19 pandemic we gave £30,000 to buy essential PPE equipment for hundreds of Care Homes and Emergency Workers and were supported by the MCF with a further £10,000. This autumn the Essex Provincial Charity Fund has set aside a further £60,000 for flagship projects such as the Air Ambulance, foodbanks, homelessness, young carers and much more and have been supported by the UGLE Covid-19 Appeal Fund and the MCF with a further £20,000 towards those projects.

Looking ahead still further your charity trustees will be launching major initiatives with the help of the MCF to assist a whole range of other key charities in every part of the Province.

We do get support from the MCF but they can only continue to do that if we support them, which is why I urge you to please focus on helping us to deliver our Festival - we only have 18 months left to save it.

Freemasons Lodge helps Women's Refuge take another step

Urgently needed funding to support Next Chapter, a leading domestic abuse charity working across Tendring, Colchester, Maldon, Chelmsford, Braintree and Uttlesford, has been given by members of Blackwater Lodge.

They have donated £1,000 to the charity, which helps more than 300 families every year, providing refuge and support for those that have suffered from domestic abuse.

The £1,000 came directly from members of Blackwater Lodge with the balance made up with a match funded grant from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund.

n Monday 23rd December, the Colchester Hospital Paediatric Diabetic Clinic received a very welcome gift from the Brethren of Colcestria Masonic Lodge, which meets at St Giles Masonic Centre in the town. The Lodge decided to raise money for educational equipment after learning that Ellie-Mai Brown, 14, from West Mersea had been diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. Ellie-Mai's father, Alfie Brown is a member of the Lodge.

Natalie Jordan, Lead Children's Diabetes Nurse, based at Colchester Hospital said she was delighted to have been contacted by the Lodge. "They asked if there was anything that we needed that would help children like Ellie-Mai". Natalie said, "We gave them a wish list of items such as story boards and body maps that would help us to educate the children and their families about Type 1 diabetes. The items would also be used when we visit schools to help others understand the condition. We never thought we would get everything we asked for"

Worshipful Brother Brian Chenier, who was the Worshipful Master of the lodge at the time said, "As a Lodge we really wanted to do something that helped a local good cause and when Alfie told us about his daughter getting this diagnosis we appreciated how difficult this must have been. To be able to donate these items is a real pleasure and we know they will get well used".

Freemasons around the country are well known for their charitable giving and Lodges do as much as they can for their local communities. All of the money raised, a total of £630 was donated by Members of the Lodge and other Masons that visited during the year.

Ellie was asked to formally present the equipment to the Nursing team and afterwards she said "When I was first diagnosed Type 1 diabetic, I never really understood how and why this happened to me. Now the nurses have this equipment it will be easier for them to show children like me how it all works". She added, "I am so grateful for all the help and ongoing support from the diabetes team and I am proud to have been asked to present this

Saffron Walden Freemasons

give boost to Foodbank



Urgently needed funding to support Uttlesford Foodbank, which has seen a 200% increase in demand from people in crisis since the start of the Covid-19 Pandemic, has been given by Freemasons in Saffron Walden.

Members of Audley Lodge, which meets at the Masonic Centre in Church Street, have donated £1,000 to the Food Bank, which has helped to feed more than 1,500 people in an area of North Essex taking in Stansted, Dunmow, Thaxted, Saffron Walden and all of the surrounding villages since it first began operating some eight years ago.

The £1,000 grant will allow Uttlesford Foodbank to meet an ever growing demand for its services.

These are likely to increase still further in the next few months according to Sophie Durlacher, Manager at Uttlesford Foodbank, who believes that even more people will be facing hardship when the Government furlough support declines and then stops altogether.

"The £1,000 is very welcome," said Sophie, "and it will go a long way towards buying many essential food items. We rely very much on the support of the local community and I cannot thank the members of Audley Lodge enough for their help."

As an independent charity Uttlesford Food Bank is run very much on a major scale operating from a commercial unit on the industrial estate at Shire Hill in Saffron Walden where it coordinates deliveries across its part of North Essex.

People in crisis are referred to the charity via a number of different agencies with some such as the short-term unemployed requiring temporary help while others may need ongoing assistance depending on their situation.


"Audley Lodge is very much part of the local Saffron Walden Community and this is the kind of charity that makes a real difference," said Peter Thomas, Lodge Treasurer. "We have been aware for some time of the work of Uttlesford Foodbank and were pleased to be able to help."

The Essex Freemasons Community Fund which match funded the £500 donation from Audley Lodge was set up to support projects such as the Foodbank. Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons, explained: "There are hundreds of small charities like this in every part of the County. They are vital to the needs of the local community and this is where we are trying to aim our support.

"The work of Uttlesford Foodbank cannot be underestimated, particularly in these difficult times and I am pleased it has the support of our members."

The Essex Freemasons Community Fund is expecting to make donations of nearly £90,000 to local charities in 2020 in addition to nearly £1 million which will be given separately by more than 300 Lodges across the county.

Our Non Covid19 Grant work continues well with the MCF

Despite the Group Almoners not being able to get out to visit, it is most pleasing to see that awards to people in Essex have held up well. Awards for the 3 months 1st March to 30th June 2019 and 2020 are very similar and this is a credit to the ongoing grant awareness campaign that we have in place.

- 2019 74 awards (£146,228) of which 25 (£84,816) were DLE
- 2020 65 awards (£141,206) of which 28 (£95,740) were DLE

The Lodge Almoner Role

Widows Update

Our lead on this, Gary Neilson, Social Contact Officer, has now managed to find a new lodge for 16 out the 25 widows who live away in 13 different Provinces from Essex and who are quite isolated.

Work is currently underway to find lodges in Essex for the 92 widows who live in our own province and who do not have a lodge to link up with. Lodges who are situated close by to these widows are being written to see if they wish to adopt a widow and I am pleased to report that 30 widows have now been adopted.

I have sent out the summer newsletter to all the widows without a lodge to ensure they know what is happening with our work and to update them on the Covid19 "Call for Action" appeal. Their next letter will be in November when we send a card and Christmas gift to them.

As screening has been opposed by many medical professionals in the UK, as opposed to just testing, it's nice to feel that we are on the right track to develop this service for men in this province. If properly organised a screening programme can halve the death rate from Prostate Cancer and that it should start in a man's 40s -50s, our efforts have been vindicated, and probably something we should highlight now that there are at least 16 Provinces in England with some form of PSA screening already up and running. In essence, properly organised programmes halve the death rate from Prostate Cancer"

Guessing the reason for the Almoner's visit, the brother welcomed him, led to a comfortable chair near the fire place and waited. The Almoner made himself comfortable but said nothing.

In the grave silence, they contemplated the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After several minutes, the Almoner took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth, all alone. Then he sat back in his chair, still silent.

His host watched all of this in quiet contemplation. As the one, lone ember's flame flickered and diminished, there was a momentary glow, and its fire was no more. Soon it was cold and dead.

The Almoner glanced at his watch and chose this time to leave. He slowly stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember, and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately, it began to glow once more, with all the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the Almoner reached the door to leave, his host said, with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you so much for your fiery summons, my brother. I'll be back in our lodge at the next meeting"

Essex Freemasons to fund prostate cancer tests across the County

Essex Freemasons are to fund a major healthcare initiative across the County in a bid to reduce a wide range of killer diseases in men - and it will be totally free and open to all residents aged 40 to 74.

The campaign starts on Thursday April 30th in the Premier Suite at Essex County Cricket Ground in Chelmsford where medical experts will be on hand to test for prostate and skin cancer, heart disease as well as screening for aortic aneurisms. If successful they will be repeated in other parts of the County.

Prostate cancer which kills 12,000 men every year requires a PSA blood test and usually costs £20 a time. Tests currently do not attract any kind of funding from the NHS leaving many vulnerable to early deaths.

The screenings will be taken by trained medical professionals in conjunction with the men's health charity CHAPS and the cost of each test will be met via the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, set up to improve the lives of those that live and work in the County.

The late, Rodney Bass, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons, commented:

"I am delighted that we have agreed to underwrite the cost of this programme and I would urge all men who live in Essex to book themselves in, particularly if they have the kind of health concerns which will be covered by these tests. We have been involved in similar schemes in the past but understand that cost, particularly for those on restricted incomes, may have been a factor in preventing some from taking part, which is why we have agreed to cover these charges.

Our Community Fund was set up for just such a purpose and I cannot think of a better use than saving lives in Essex. However, I am obviously unable to tell you how much we will donate in total as that will depend on how many take part, but how can you put a price on someone's life which is why I hope that many will put themselves forward for these vital tests."

Men wishing to take part can prebook by contacting Celine Larkin either by phone by calling 07873 541505 or by e-mail to celine. larkin@chaps.uk.com to make an appointment between Noon and 8pm on the day. However, men can still take a test by walking into the Chelmsford Cricket Ground between 5pm and 8pm and they will be seen.

All tests will be free but should visitors wish to make a charitable donation on the day to help cover the costs – it will be welcomed.

We are ready for opening on the 1st September and look forward to seeing the Brethren of all of the orders again.






Holy Royal Arch







The past several months have been extremely challenging for us all due to Coronavirus but recent events within the Province have of course been overshadowed by the sad loss of our Most Excellent Grand Superintendent Rodney Lister Bass, OBE following a brave and determined battle against cancer. His passing has been devastating for his family, friends and the Province of Essex. He was held in extremely high regard in Freemasonry in general and within the community that he served for a large part of his life.

E.Comp. Rodney was an extremely popular Most Excellent Grand Superintendent who contributed much to the development of the Holy Royal Arch in Essex and he will be deeply and sorely missed. Under his leadership, he consistently and enthusiastically highlighted the indissoluble link between the Craft and

the Royal Arch and was responsible for driving significant progress toward achieving the target of 45% of Craft Masons in Essex being subscribing members of the Royal Arch by 2021.

He had a great love of the Royal Arch and was proud to have been MEZ of the two flagship Chapters in Essex namely Essex First Principals Chapter No 3256 during 2018/19 and Essex Provincial Grand Stewards' Chapter No 8665 during 2019/20.

Whilst we continue to lament the passing of our Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, we also mourn all other Companions who have lost their lives during the past year including those who have so cruelly been struck down by Coronavirus. Although we will not have had the opportunity to remember them at the Annual Convocation of Provincial Grand Chapter, many of you will have participated in the nine o'clock toast to 'Absent Companions and Departed Merit' which was conducted via Zoom meetings across the Province on the date of the funeral of our Most Excellent Grand Superintendent on Wednesday 29th July. Due to the current restrictions, attendance at the funeral was restricted to family members and close friends but it is anticipated that a Remembrance service will be held within the Province later in the year at which Brethren and Companions will be able to show their respect in traditional Masonic fashion.

Looking back over the past 12 months

Despite the unprecedented events and difficulties encountered during the second half of the year, there have been many highlights of note. The year started in the presence of the M.E. Pro First Grand Principal, Peter Geoffrey Lowndes at the Annual Convocation in September 2019 and our late MEGS was proud and honoured to welcome him on what was the first occasion that the Pro First Grand Principal had ever attended a regular Essex Provincial Convocation.

The Annual Convocation also saw the retirement of E.Comp. Cliff Thoms after having served the Province with distinction both in the Craft and Royal Arch over a period of many years to be succeeded by the appointment of myself as Deputy Grand Superintendent. E.Comp's. Phil Campbell and Elliott Chevin were also appointed as Second and Third Provincial Grand Principals respectively. We also welcomed E.Comp's. David Wilson and Martin Cook to the Royal Arch Executive as Assistants to the Provincial Grand Principals as well as E.Comp. Joe Shearer as Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies.



At that convocation, the Grand Superintendent stressed the importance of enjoying our Freemasonry and of learning our ritual so as to deliver a special ceremony to all those in attendance, but most importantly, for the benefit of the candidate.

Whilst the suspension of Masonic activity in March resulted in so many meetings and events not taking place, the members of the Royal Arch Executive were nonetheless able to attend numerous Convocations of Chapters across the Province prior to the suspension. This included Combined Convocations held at Chingford at Upminster as well as conducting a Banner Dedication for Abbeygate Chapter No. 4219 at Colchester.



In November 2019, I and other members of the Royal Arch Executive attended the Chapter of True Friendship No. 160 at Rochford where some ninety Companions were in attendance to witness a demonstration by the Metropolitan Grand Stewards Demonstration Team of the Royal Arch Tracing Boards. The inaugural performance of the newly researched Royal Arch Tracing Boards had been hosted by Clapton Chapter No 1365 where the MEZ had been none other than our own MEGS and the demonstration at Rochford was the first to be given outside of the Metropolitan Grand Chapter District. The Essex Provincial Grand Stewards

Chapter No 8665 look forward to hosting the Metropolitan Grand Stewards for a further demonstration at a future convocation.

The Royal Arch Executive extend their congratulations to St John's Chapter No 1343 who celebrated their Centenary at the Crossed Keys Masonic Centre, Undine Chapter No 3394 who celebrated their Centenary at Loughton and the Chapter of Friendship No. 5587 who celebrated their 75th Anniversary at Upminster. We look forward to rescheduling visits to those Chapters whose anniversary celebrations were prevented by the suspension, including Thames Estuary Chapter No 4043 whose 75th Anniversary would have celebrated at Southend, United Chapter No 697 who would have celebrated their Centenary as well as a Banner Dedication at Colchester and Ixion Chapter No. 2501 who would have celebrated their 125th anniversary at Harlow. We look forward to further developing our communications strategy and continuing these and other initiatives in the future. Guidance and advice has been and continues to be available from the APGPs with regard to the resumption of meetings following the suspension, the adapted ceremonial and any other issues.

The Royal Arch Executive are most appreciative of Arthur's hard work and dedication to the Royal Arch in Essex. E.Comp. Arthur will be succeeded by E.Comp. John Crudgington who moves across from the role of Royal Arch Membership Officer and will inherit E.Comp. Arthur's portfolio of Chapters. We will also welcome E.Comp. Bruce Mapson (left) to the Royal Arch Executive who is appointed as an Assistant to the Provincial Grand Principals and will assume the role Membership Officer. E.Comp. Bruce will undoubtedly be a great addition to the team and a worthy successor to E.Comp. John.

ur hearty and sincere congratulations go to all of those Companions who are receiving a first appointment or promotion this year. Whilst Provincial honours are a recognition of past services, your preferment does of course carry with it an expectation of future support both to your Chapters and to the Province. The appointments to active ranks are featured in this publication and you can find the names of all those receiving appointments and promotions on the Royal Arch website at www. essexroyalarch.org

Turning to membership matters, in September 2016 the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent announced that there was to be a five-year programme that would see the percentage of Essex Craft Masons being subscribing members of the Royal Arch increase from 38% to 45%. This was to be achieved by a number of initiatives including the re-launch of the Royal Arch Representatives Scheme and would be implemented by a membership team under a newly appointed Membership Officer.

Steady progress has been made towards this objective, with membership increases being driven through 'Next Step' awareness evenings, publicity & education and, most importantly, the involvement of Lodge Royal Arch Representatives in the development of the progress of Candidates through the four steps of core Freemasonry.

In addition it was emphasised that the Chapter Almoner's role was to include the overall welfare of the Chapter, to encourage attendance and letting Companions know that they are missed should they drift into the habit of not attending meetings. This initiative was introduced to aid membership retention by helping to prevent premature resignations.

Last year saw a slight change in the way that membership percentages were expressed by including only qualifying Masons, ie Master Masons of four weeks and upwards. Whilst this only had a small impact on the overall figure it was considered that Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts should be excluded from the objective as this would not represent a true reflection of potential Royal Arch membership.

By the end of 2019 the percentage of Craft Masons in Essex being subscribing members of the Royal Arch had increased to just over 44% and there is every indication that the our target will be met by the end of this year.

Looking to the Future

The Royal Arch Executive remain focused on looking to the future and continuing with our existing programme of initiatives as well as introducing new ideas to further increase Royal Arch membership within the Province. The Lodge Royal Arch Representative will continue to be a vital tool in ensuring successful recruitment and that Master Masons are aware that their Masonic journey is not complete until they have been Exalted into the Royal Arch. Of particular focus will be our efforts to reduce membership losses, encourage greater and more frequent attendance at meetings and to attract unattached Companions back into our wonderful order.

Support continues to be available to Chapters across the Province from the members of the Provincial Grand Stewards Chapter in the form of demonstrations and assistance with Exaltation Ceremonies. Grateful thanks go to E.Comp. Roger Davis and the members of the Demonstration Team as well as to E.Comp. Jim Wolfe who now stands down as coordinator of the Support team and hands over the reigns to E.Comp. Stuart Bramzel. Should your Chapter require assistance from either team then please contact your APGP in the first instance.

Whilst we have been unable to enjoy your company at Provincial Grand Chapter this year, the Royal Arch Executive are grateful for the support and encouragement that we continue to receive from Chapters across the Province, and now that the general suspension of Masonic activity has been lifted, we look forward to seeing you all again when it is safe to do so and as our Chapters begin to meet again.



Our late Most Excellent Grand Superintendent was deeply proud of the Holy Royal Arch in Essex and took great comfort in the knowledge that Essex continues to be one of the most active and vibrant Royal Arch Provinces.

We hope that you will continue to enjoy your Royal Arch Masonry and, in the words of our late Most Excellent Grand Superintendent,

"May God bless you all, let us go forward together and walk worthily in the light which shines around".

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n the morning of the 22nd February 2020 the Installation meeting of Council 103 took place at Saxon Hall, Southend. For readers of the Essex Mason, the Grand Council of Knight Masons is an Irish Order which now has eleven Councils in its Province of England and Wales. Cyrus Sasana Council 103 was the fourth Council to be constituted and dedicated and the ceremony took place at Saxon Hall in September 2013.

Following an invitation from Council 103 several senior Knight Masons were in attendance having flown in the evening before from Dublin, Ireland. The Council was honoured to receive the Most Excellent Great Chief, Bernard V.A. Woods, Right Excellent Sir Knight Derek J. 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VW.Bro Fred Thornback

f anyone deserves the coveted title of the Father of Essex Freemasonry, it must certainly be Fred Thornback. At the age of 90 he is still very active and attends many masonic meetings and functions. With his friendly disposition he is equally at home chatting to anyone in Freemasonry whether they be a member of the Executive or a Master mason and he freely gives anyone the benefit of his vast experience. His tall distinguished figure belies his gentle and modest nature.



Frederick Arthur Thornback was born in 1929 He went to a local school in Southend. Soon after WW2 war broke out most of the schools closed and like many others he was evacuated to a little village in Derbyshire where he stayed for about 18 months before returning to Southend. At the age of 18 after hostilities had ceased he joined the Royal Airforce for his national service, after 6 months training he was posted to RAF Swinderby in Lincolnshire where he served his time as a flight mechanic.

In 1952 he married his wife Vivienne whom he had met at a youth club in 1949. They had two children Andrew and Lorraine unfortunately they lost Andrew 4 years ago. They have four Grand Children and a new Great Grandson.

Until his retirement Fred was managing director of the family asphalt company, started by his Grand Father and then taken over by his Father, both of whom were Freemasons. The main company works were at Prittlewell but the asphalt manufacturing plant was at Rochford. Fred was a member of the Institute of Asphalt Technology.

Fred was initiated in St Andrews Lodge No 1817 at the Palace Hotel in 1954 at the young age of 24. He was Proposed by his father who initiated him and seconded by his grandfather. He was W.Master 1n 1966 and again in 1999 when he was 70 years of age. On that occasion the lodge presented him with a beautiful leather bound souvenir book charting his many happy memories of his 45 years as a member and a mason.

Fred was Worshipful Master of Essex Masters Lodge in1987 and in the same year he was MEZ of Essex First Principals Chapter. In 15 years as an active member of the Provincial Executive, he was first Prov.GDC (1980-84), APGM (1984-1986) and Deputy PGM (1986-1994). The rank of PGSwdB in 1986 entitled him to use the prefix of Very Worshipful Bro.which is much cherished and well deserved. Fred was involved in many consecrations while a member of the Executive and consequently made an honorary member of many other Lodges.

He was exalted into St Andrews Chapter No 1817 in 1960 and MEZ in 1970. He was ProDepGsupt in the Royal Arch from 1986-94 during the same period he was ProvDepPGM in the Craft Eight very busy but very happy years indeed.

For a period of 3 Years from 1988-1990 Fred was a member of the Board of General Purposes at UGL where he played an active part serving on the buildings sub committee.

To crown his esteemed masonic career in Essex Fred was awarded the DSEM in the Royal Arch in 2010 and in 2014 he was honoured to receive the DSEM in the Craft.



Apart from his Freemasonry, which his wife, Vivienne has always supported, Freds other main hobby is his garden which is evident from the beautiful tended lawns and flower beds around the house Freds other great love is the Southend and Essex Masonic Welfare Trust. He has been involved with it since the 1960's and became a trustee since 1980 he was chairman in 1988 a position he held for about 10 years. The trust continues to improve every year and apart from providing the brethren of Essex and their families with medical aids the Trust continues to entertain the RMBI Annuitants on their holiday in Southend.

Fred was made Honorary Life President but is still very much involved. In recognition of his charitable work Fred and Vivienne were invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace in July 1988

The Brethren of Beeleigh Abbey Lodge 7017 take the values of Freemasonry very seriously. Integrity, kindness, honesty, fairness and charity are an integral part of Masonic life but charity extends beyond being inward looking and moves into the community as a whole.

A defibrillator is best used, but not exclusively, by trained operators and Bro. Peter Stilts, a specialist trainer in such first aid matters, voluntarily assisted by training some twenty-three operators so there is a spread of personnel across the Village.

The Parish Council Chairman John Tompkins, together with a number of village volunteers refurbished the iconic K6 telephone box that is now fully commissioned as a community defibrillator access point and managed by a community group.

Essex Masons support front line emergency teams

Freemasons have donated 50 litres of hand sanitizer to Essex Search and Rescue, a team of 63 volunteers working across the county who help to find missing and vulnerable people.

Their volunteers operate in every part of the County - work alongside Essex Police and are called out in the event that a high risk or vulnerable person such as a child or someone with dementia goes missing.

As a life saving charity which receives no public funding, Essex Search and Rescue are on call 24 hours a day to respond to requests for assistance from the Emergency Services, putting them firmly into the key worker category, which is why they need essential PPE such as hand sanitizers.

"We are members of our national body Lowland Rescue," said Trustee Martyn Tillett. "Sadly we are a charity few have heard of, but to explain more clearly, Mountain Rescue take care of the high ground, Cave Rescue specialise in caves and underground locations, the RNLI looks after the sea and we look after everything else in between."

"In Essex we are called out on average once a week when a vulnerable person goes missing working alongside Essex Police. Our volunteers include paramedics, former fire fighters and former police officers and like other emergency workers we needed hand sanitisers and cannot thank Essex Freemasons enough for their support."

Nearly £30,000 has been spent so far by Masons on essential PPE equipment for 300 Essex care homes, a further £20,000 has been donated to boost antibody testing with an additional £100,000 pledged to fight the virus in every part of the region.

The campaign to support front line emergency staff will continue says Essex Freemasons and have appealed to all those involved in the front line against Covid-19 to make contact with Lee Taylor via e-mail: lee.taylor@essexpgl.org.uk if they need help.

Money to support the campaign has been donated via the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, set up earlier this year Provincial Grand Master Rodney Bass to support charities and good causes across the entire county.

Letter from Buckingham Palace

Ron is a 97-year-old member of Canute Lodge No3104, who through the coronavirus has been very restricted in his movements received a wonderful pick up letter just before the 75th VE Day. It was from Buckingham Palace personally addressed and signed by the Colonel of the Regiment (Duke of York) Grenadier Guards (The Queen is the Colonel in Chief) It was sent to all Regimental Association members who served during the war.

Ron served in the Grenadier Guards from 11th June 1942 to 15th February 1947.



After 15 weeks at the Guards Depot Caterham he went to the Training Battalion, Victoria Barracks, Windsor. During battlefield training he developed acute skin problems and as a result was medically downgraded. He then served about 8 months in the Castle Company located in the Mews/Stables of Windsor Castle purely to guard the Royal Family within the Castle. Late October 1943 he was posted to the Westminster Garrison Battalion to carry out guards on Buckingham Palace and St. James Palace.

His final posting was back to the Guards Depot, attached to the Officers Mess and ended up as the NCO in charge of running the Officers Mess for the last few months of his service.

After the war as a member of his Regimental Association he attended many functions plus 10 very special invitations to functions where the Queen was present. Seven of these were at Buckingham Palace where twice he was presented to the Queen and once to Prince Phillip.

Before joining Canute Lodge, he was a member of the Epping Lodge No.2077 from 1.5.1953 until the warrant was handed in September 2018. He was Master twice and held many Offices including Treasurer for 15 years.





FORTY YEARS AGO

The late VW.Bro Peter Neivens OBE QPM, Past Provincial Deputy Grand Master of Essex and a Deputy Assistant Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police was the interface to the world during the successful assault of the Iranian Embassy by the SAS.

The siege took place from 30 April to 5 May 1980, after a group of six armed men stormed the embassy in South Kensington. The gunmen, took 26 people hostage and demanded the release of Arab prisoners from prisons in Khuzestan and their own safe passage out of the United Kingdom.

Margaret Thatcher's government quickly resolved that safe passage would not be granted, and a siege ensued. Over the following days, police negotiators secured the release of five hostages in exchange for minor concessions. By day six the gunmen had become increasingly frustrated at the lack of progress in meeting their demands, killed one of the hostages and threw his body out of the embassy.

As a result, the government ordered the SAS to rescue the remaining hostages. Shortly afterwards, SAS soldiers abseiled from the roof of the building and 'gained admittance' through the windows. During the 17 minute raid, they rescued all but one of the remaining hostages, and killed five of the six hostage-takers.

HERMES IN ESSEX

t the annual meeting for Deputy Provincial Grand Masters in 2019, held at Freemasons' Hall in London, the DepPGM, VW.Bro Paul Reeves heard a presentation on Project Hermes from W.Bro Nigel Codron, PSGD, PAPGM (Middx) and he invited Nigel to speak to Essex Masons. The chosen occasion was the Installation Meeting of the Lodge of Enlightenment No 9550 on Monday 27th January 2020 at Upminster Masonic Hall. Following the Installation of W.Bro David Fage PPJGW by W.Bro Maurice Court PGStB, the meeting was closed and the brethren received a talk by W Bro Nigel on the new IT system.

UGLE uses an Oracle database called ADelphi (the Greek word for brother) which maintains the records at member, Lodge/Chapter and Provincial level but access is only available to the PGM, ProvGSec and other members of

the Provincial Executive, Provincial Office and VOs. ADelphi generates the Annual Return (which forms the basis for the collection of dues) to each Lodge Secretary and Chapter Scribe E who must also attend to all the other forms including those for new candidates, Installation Returns and summonses, where he has to ensure that each Agenda item is in accordance with the Book of Constitutions. If not compliant, they will receive an email from the Provincial Office asking them to make the necessary amendments. Preparing applications for new members can also be time consuming for Lodge Secretaries, who have to obtain Clearance Certificates to show that a brother is not in arrears and for an Initiate, under Rule 158, to write to another Province or Metropolitan Grand Lodge if the member lives and works outside Essex. In late 2018, the Grand Secretary proposed to the Board of General Purposes that procedures such as these and others could be made more efficient and less time consuming if Secretaries and Scribes E could also take advantage of the ADelphi system.

A Project Steering Group was set up, chaired by the GSec and containing 3 Provincial Rulers and selected members of UGLE staff. They appointed a Project Manager, Tony Keating, and Nigel, a Business Analyst, in January 2019 to establish a new web-based front-end portal, codenamed Project Hermes, with the aim of delivering an online platform to manage the vast majority of the administrative functions for Lodge Secretaries and Chapter Scribes E. This would replace the endless form filling, paper based existing processes with the ability to prepare these mandatory forms online with most of the data being prepopulated, so that turnaround times are significantly reduced. The actual process will be intuitive with online training provided but it is expected to be as simple as using Amazon or online banking. The two systems, Hermes and ADelphi, will talk to each other so that updates by Lodge Secretaries and Scribes E will be on ADelphi as soon as they are submitted.

The Provinces of Bristol, Cheshire, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, Metropolitan Grand Lodge together with the Districts of Cyprus and Eastern Archipelago (Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand) were asked to be part of the process and are providing valuable feedback on what Hermes should look like. Changes required for Hermes will also have an impact on the Book of Constitutions for which a separate committee has been set up to consider. However, the final decisions rest with the Board of General Purposes and ultimately Grand Lodge.

After the meeting, our Provincial Grand Secretary, W.Bro Phillip Lovelock, said that he would be looking at how Hermes will be successfully implemented when it is launched in Essex. Meanwhile as Covid-19 restrictions are gradually lifted, there will be more presentations for Secretaries and Scribes E together with full training before Hermes goes live in 2021 and "making Clearance Certificates" as W.Bro Nigel said in his excellent presentation, "a thing of the past".



An Essex Holy Royal Arch Heritage in the South Pacific

CONSECRATION OF THE CHAPTER OF DISCOVERY NO 8737



on Saturday 14th March 2020, E.Comp Ian Simpson PAGDC PAPGP was the Consecrating Officer for the Chapter of Discovery No 8737 in Port Vila, Vanuatu and he also ensured that the heritage of an Essex Chapter formed in 1887 will be remembered at every Convocation of the new Chapter. Three days later the First Grand Principal, HRH The Duke of Kent, suspended all meetings and Vanuatu closed its borders. Ian's journey back to Essex was not without trial, including being held in isolation in Sydney.

In 1977, the only Masonic lodge in Vanuatu, the Lodge of Discovery No 8737, was consecrated within the UGLE jurisdiction and the members recently agreed to form a Holy Royal Arch Chapter but as none were Royal Arch Masons, arrangements were made for their Exaltations in New Zealand. E Comp Tony Mansfield PGStdB 2nd Dist GPr of North Island, New Zealand was elected to be Primus First Principal.

E.Comp Ian Simpson, as the APGP, had assisted Brooke Chapter No 2005 with its closure with the final Convocation being on Tuesday 11th June 2019. He knew Tony Mansfield as the TLC Champion in New Zealand and that on the same day would also be in London to be honoured at the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons Investiture by The Most Worshipful Grand Master, HRH Prince Michael of Kent. Ian invited Tony to be his personal guest at the

Brooke Chapter final festive board that same evening and also suggested that the Chapter equipment including officer collars and jewels, a large VSL, scroll and cushion could be given to help the new Chapter. The Companions agreed and Tony travelled home with much more than he came with.



Three Chairs for Chigwell (hip hip hooray)

In respect of the article in a previous Essex Mason, here is another tale of 'Three Masonic Chairs'.

About 1836, Dr George Rowe who lived in the country at Chigwell, was a member of Old Dundee Lodge No 18 which held meetings every month throughout the year, January to December, at Wapping, next to the river Thames.

The very hot summer months, June to September, during the years 1836 – 37, had proved stifling and the odours emitting from this part of London were very unpleasant in deed.

Dr Rowe and other members of Lodge No 18 sought to petition his close friend, the Provincial Grand Master of Essex, to create a new lodge in the country, in order to meet during the summer and thus avoid the discomforts at Wapping.

Chigwell Lodge No 663 was consecrated on 22nd August 1838 at the Kings Head public house Chigwell, by the Provincial Grand Master, followed by the initiation of three brethren at the same meeting.

Soon after the Consecration, the three 'Chigwell chairs' as they are affectionally known, were purchased for the considerable sum in those days, of £50.

The symbolism of the Master's chair, Ionic columns and Seven Stars, the SW's chair, Doric columns and Moon and the JW's chair, Corinthian columns and the Sun, are magnificent examples of workmanship by R. Burr 1796 of that period and offer the occupants more room and comfort.

In late summer of 1841, the Landlord of the King's Head was facing the imminent execution of a forfeit order pertaining to the 'goods and shackles' in his pub.

The 'Chigwell chairs' were under threat of seizure by Bailiffs.

Hearing of this situation and without further ado, the Worshipful Master aided by several Brethren and a horse and cart, made several trips on a Sunday evening to the King's Head. They successfully transported the 'Chigwell chairs' plus other Lodge furniture and possessions to the Eagle Hotel at Snaresbrook.
