

By the time we meet again many Lodges & Chapters will have a backlog of Candidates to Initiate/Exalt and Second and Third Degree Ceremonies to perform. In recognition of the support you continued to give to your masonic centres many of them have already agreed to open during the summer to and I would ask you to consider holding extra meetings to start to clear any backlog you have because Grand Lodge will be starting a national attraction campaign in July which could lead to a rise in potential Candidates later this year.

The other 'big thing' of 2021 will be the roll-out by Grand Lodge of the Hermes electronic system that will replace all paper application forms and returns. W.Bro Neil Beverley, APGM, is running the Implementation Team in Essex and will ensure that every Secretary and Scribe E has been trained in plenty of time before the system goes live. I have seen the system and wish it had been available to me when I was a Lodge Secretary. Judges Reveal Secrets of Essex Freemasons

At the Pride of Essex Awards 2020 Presentation Ceremony on 24th November 2020 streamed by Anglia Ruskin University, the Judges gave the Essex Freemasons Community Fund (EFCF) a 'First' with the ultimate 'Community Top Team Award'.

Chaired by Deputy Lieutenant Dave Dennison BEM, these annual Awards are

for those who have shown exceptional courage, inspiration or community service in Essex. The top ten in each category were invited to the virtual presentation with the results kept a closely guarded secret.



Heroes of Pandemic Essex

WINNER

The Freemasons were nominated for a new Award, 'Heroes of Pandemic Essex', set up for 2020 at the request of the Lord Lieutenant, Jennifer Tolhurst, and received a special mention for the thousands of visors, hand sanitiser and PPE they supplied to Care Homes, NHS Community Staff, Essex and Herts Air Ambulance and some East of England Ambulance Stations.

The Judges delved more deeply into the work of the Freemasons and found a number of other significant Community initiatives including six £10,000 grants to good causes and £20,000 towards boosting antibody testing. Totally unexpected, it came as a complete surprise when the Pride of Essex Awards 2020 Presenters detailed the finding of the Judges and announced the 'Community Top Team in Essex' was the Essex Freemasons Community Fund.







The Pride of Essex Award presenters explained that

- The EFCF was set up in 2019 with money from the charitable donations of Essex Freemasons to award grants to registered charities and organisations supporting communities. Six £10,000 grants were made this year
- The Fund executive were also tasked with responding to PPE needs of groups across Essex (which received additional recognition in the new category of HOPE -'Heroes of Pandemic Essex Team Award)
- Some of the initiatives and grants include £20,000 towards boosting antibody testing with a further £100,000 pledged to fight the virus in the East of England
- 50 litres of hand sanitiser was given to the Essex Search and Rescue Team of 63 volunteers who find and help missing and vulnerable people in Essex
- 50 litres of clinical grade sanitiser was donated to each of the seven hospices in Essex
- A £10,000 grant was given to the Essex Child Death Review Team at the Princess Alexandra Hospital in Harlow to fill funding gap due to the COVID-19 outbreak
- Hand sanitiser and face shields were provided to Essex and Herts Air Ambulance Service, face shields
 were supplied to all nurses in the Community Mental Health Teams in mid and south Essex and to
 District Nurses in the south of Essex
- All 506 Registered Care Homes in Essex were offered face shields for all their staff. More than 320 care homes requested support and £10,000 worth of face shields has been supplied
- Personal bottles of hand sanitiser were given to all Ambulance crews across Essex as a 'Thank You' from Essex Freemasons and that Freemason volunteers delivered all these items personally

In these unsettling and challenging times, this Award for the EFCF as the Community Top Team in Essex is also a firstclass honour which further enhances the charitable reputation of Freemasonry in all the Provinces and Districts in UGLE. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master, VW.Bro Paul Reeves, acknowledged this recognition by the Community for the good work of all the 9,000 Freemasons in Essex who donated money as well as those who volunteered to deliver the items across the County.

One of the unfortunate consequences of the lockdown was that the PoE Awards could not be presented as usual, so the various sponsors of the awards were asked to present them following the online presentation ceremony. Mr. Ian Watson of Watson & Co Accountants, the category sponsor, who has been a long-term sponsor of the PoE Awards, presented the award to W.Bro Colin Felton, the Chairman of the Essex Freemasons Community Fund and VW.Bro Paul Reeves.

VW.Bro Paul Reeves said "each one deserved a handshake as personal recognition and that it was also a tribute to the late Rodney Bass OBE, the Provincial Grand Master of Essex who died in July 2020, under whose leadership the EFCF was set up, together with many of the initiatives which had impressed the Judges."

Assistant Provincial Grand Master, W.Bro Tony White, emphasised the true depth and continuity of support for the Community in Essex, in that the Judges had awarded the Freemasons the 'Team of Pride' Community Award, after learning about their ongoing support of local charities across Essex in 2014.

In these unsettling and challenging times, this Pride of Essex 2020 Award for the EFCF as the Community Top Team in Essex is well deserved and helps enhance the reputation of Freemasonry for charitable giving, not just in Essex but throughout the UK and overseas.





Young Freemasons Youth Programme benefits Essex Charities



Cornerstone, a Lodge formed by young Essex Freemasons, continues to lead the way, supporting a growing range of good causes across the county with a Youth Programme focussed on local charities dedicated to helping young men and women in need.

The latest to benefit as part of this growing programme is The Rob George Foundation. The RGF is a Colchester based charity, supporting young people all over the UK. Launched in January 2014, it has so far helped nearly 1,000 young people making grants totalling £591,000.

The Foundation has received a £1,000 grant from the Lodge and the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, which will be used to financially and/or practically support young people facing life threatening or terminal illnesses, or by providing financial help to those young people who demonstrate exceptional commitment or ability in the worlds of sport or the performing arts but are held back from fulfilling their full potential due to a lack of funds.

"This money will help to make a huge difference to the lives of young people," said Lorraine George, who formed the charity with her husband Philip following the tragic death of their son Rob from Leukaemia, aged just 21. "Our aims were set by Rob himself and we pride ourselves on trying to fulfil his wish that the foundation should 'Make a Difference – One Individual at a Time.' Rob was himself a very talented sportsman and the aims reflect that, and his personal experiences and the financial hardships he faced during his illness. We are also very proud of the fact that we have next to no overheads, so the Freemason's can relax in the knowledge that just about every single penny of their donation will reach the young people – just as you would want and hope."

"We are helping many talented individuals, some of whom are on the cusp of Olympic selection, and one of whom has recently been selected to represent team GB at the Paralympics. These youngsters, through illness or disability, have no way of covering all their costs and need help. The current pandemic has brought many huge challenges to charities, and in common with so many, the Rob George Foundation's fundraising programme for 2020 was wiped out overnight. So, understandably we are more grateful than ever (if that's possible) for this grant from Essex Freemasons. Our current average grant is running at £633.00, so your grant will help make nearly two whole grants – that's two real young people who will hopefully feel we have together 'Made a Difference' to their lives."

The £1,000 was presented to the Foundation by Jack Gilliland from the Cornerstone Lodge, at a short ceremony at Essex County Cricket Ground. He commented: "Our Lodge is formed of members aged up to 37 so it is understandable that we wish to support charities that help other young people. The Rob George Foundation does just that, an incredible job, which is why we were pleased to help.

Present at the ceremony was Assistant Provincial Grand Master Peter Hollingsworth who praised the work of the charity and Cornerstone Lodge for their ongoing Youth Programme which is seeing more and more Essex charities benefit. Essex Provincial Grand Stewards, still finding a way during lockdown.





Covid-19 and the subsequent protective measures have not deterred our 2020 Provincial Grand Stewards from continuing with various charitable initiatives across the province, initiatives that have so far seen over £6,000 generated for the 2022 Festival and Provincial Almoners Fund.

The Stewards started their year with a simple product offering that was expected to be a winner across our Masonic fraternity, the Jewel Holder in Embossed Case got off to a great start in February and was expected to do really well, along with the usual events across the Essex Masonic calendar, but Covid-19 set to completely derail their plans.

Undeterred they continued to look for ways to make a difference, and in anticipation of the likely additional demand upon the Provincial Almoners funds, a number of the Stewards led by W.Bro's Jeff Palmer and Christian Webb, combined forces with W.Bro's Dave Hawtin and Chris Lee to develop and launch the Forget-Me-Not Initiative. Another simple idea, they offered packs of forget me not seeds at £2 per pack by post to Masons across the province. A small production team was established by Stewards Daniel Gearing, Darren Elsey, Mark Jones, Gary Soars and Dan Broyd, supported by their families to fill and post the orders. This was supported by brethren across the Province, who really got behind this as way to celebrate and remember absent Brethren, an initiative made even more poignant following the sad loss of our PGM. This raised £1,400 for the Almoners fund.





It is intended to relaunch the Forget-Me-Not initiative in the spring of 2021 alongside what they hope will be a popular photographic tribute feature on the Essex Provincial Grand Stewards website, where those supporters of the initiative earlier this year, can post pictures of their new forget me not blooms in remembrance of another.

No Masonic calendar would have been complete without a Provincial Golf Day, but this was going to have to be very different to ensure the safety of all and adherence to the Covid safety measures in place at the time. Weeks of planning and rewrites of that plan later, in conjunction with the amazing folk at the South Essex Golf Club, plus an excellent response from many of our Golf playing membership, led to this event being a sell out. Along with the usual raffle and a Memorabilia Auction, the event raised close To £3,000 for the 2022 festival.

The current Initiative from our Stewards 'Help in the Province' is directed more at helping a Brother in real need, connecting those brethren with one of the Stewards local to their area, helping with things like odd jobs, general maintenance or just a bit of shopping or telephone contact, for those brothers in real need. Darren Elsey is the point of contact for this, and can be reached on 07729 688513. If this initiative sees the uptake expected, the Stewards will be looking for additional volunteers to join their effort.

Please keep an eye out for the Masonic design face masks coming soon. Currently in production complete with Essex Provincial Grand Lodge Crest, W.Bro Paul Bates and his fellow Stewards will be making these available for purchase, and look forward to these proving really popular upon resumption of meetings, or before.

Royal College of Surgeons

The Square and The ScalpelWorking Togetherby W Bro Tony Hales



The Rt.Hon. Lord Ribeiro CBE FRCS

Just a few minutes' walk from Freemasons Hall in Great Queen Street is Lincoln's Inn Fields where the Royal College of Surgeons (RCS) and its predecessors has been based since 1796. Renowned throughout the world for its prestigious qualification of FRCS (Fellow of the RCS) there are many famous Surgeons who have 'exchanged the Scalpel for the Square' and joined their Masonic Brethren in raising money for others and doing good works in the Community.

The Livery Company of Barber-Surgeons was established in 1540 but an Act of Parliament in 1745 split the two and by a subsequent Royal Charter 'The Royal College of Surgeons in London' was formed in 1800. With a new Charter in 1843 and a name change to 'The Royal College of Surgeons of England', the RCS has become renowned for maintaining the highest standards of Professional Membership, Training, and Research.

Facilitating cutting-edge research for surgery is expensive and like any other registered charity the RCS relies heavily on donations, so to commemorate the 250th Anniversary of Grand Lodge in 1967, every Freemason in England and Wales was invited to donate £1. More than £580,000 was raised for the first Masonic charity with non-masonic objectives 'to further, in conjunction with the Royal College of Surgeons, research in the science of surgery' and an annual research fellowship scheme was established.

Applications come from qualified doctors, who are members of the RCS by examination (which has only a 30% to 40% pass rate) and hope to become Consultants. Fellowships are particularly helpful for those who want to be Academic Surgeons i.e. Professors or Senior Lecturers in medical schools attached to the NHS, operating and running clinics whilst teaching and continuing their research.

A major initiative taken by VW.Bro Paul Reeves, our Dep ProvGM in Charge, has been to highlight the support of Freemasonry for the RCS. In November 2020 the Province of Essex arranged a joint online event hosted by the RCS entitled 'The Science behind the Scalpel' with five short informative talks but a technical glitch on the night reduced the impact. The RCS has now produced a video with a playlist and each talk can be viewed individually.

Professor Peter Hutchinson, Director of Clinical Research at the RCS introduces the event and then describes some of the research work currently being undertaken including Covid-19 specific projects and the importance of the financial support of Freemasonry.

St Luke in Essex No 8714 Lodge member, RW.Bro the Rt. Hon Lord Ribeiro, Kt CBE FRCS, Senior Grand Warden "until Covid-19 brought proceedings to a close rather abruptly" explains more about the selection of Research Fellows for Fellowships of the Freemason's Fund for Surgical research.

VW.Bro Paul Reeves gives Brethren the background and the numbers behind the donations from both Craft and Holy Royal Arch Freemasons since the original research fund was established in 1967 and the future commitment of Essex Freemasons to surgical research.

Two former Freemason Research Fellows, Robert Tyler and Tom Jovic, share their cutting- edge research in genetic mutations to improve abdominal cancer outcomes and 3D printing in plastic surgery and they each describe the beneficial impacts, as well as their appreciation to Freemasonry, in facilitating these research projects.

Solomon and the Lodge Officers' Jewels

A number of Brethren in Essex are part of the Solomon User Group (SUG) which is a module on Solomon where new items designed by the Learning and Development Team are tried by 'lead users' who give feedback before the material goes live for all users. The current item being reviewed is all about the Lodge Officers' Jewels.

Imagine a busy Installation Meeting where the collars have got mixed up and as you are sitting the closest to them the Worshipful Master looks at you and asks you to put them in order so he can invest his Officers.

Three well designed introductory quizzes cover matching the officer to the jewel, the jewel to the officer and a timed quiz to identify the jewels for all the officers of a lodge. Then comes the fourth quiz called 'Precedence of Officers' which is described as fiendishly difficult with only two minutes to sort all the collars. This quiz has only one question but if you get it wrong a brother may be invested with the wrong collar and jewel.

The concept of the tests is first class and practising this way will help any brother make a useful contribution to the smooth running of proceedings at a busy Installation meeting with the added bonus of becoming more familiar with the Book of Constitutions Rule 104(d). Do look out for this and other new modules as they are a good way of "fostering curiosity and developing understanding.

Mental Health Matters

With the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic taking a huge toll on people's mental wellbeing, the Essex Cornerstone Club felt it would be a good time to provide a talk on the issue for our members and provide advice on how to seek help.

2020 was a year that most people would care to forget. Lives and jobs were lost, businesses crumbled and the nation's mood, was, and continues to be, filled with trepidation. As we approached the end of 2020, instead of families gathering round a fireplace to share stories and gifts, they were bound by further restrictions which in turn

created a more sombre atmosphere for most. In times like these, we should take a moment to stop and have an introspective look at the needs of ourselves and others.

Tragically suicide rates in the UK are still too high. In 2019 for example 5,691 died of suicide. Of that number 4,303 were men. These numbers of course reflect a time before the global pandemic which has devastated families across the world.

The Essex Cornerstone Club, recognise that Masons across the province have diligently supported and cared for the most vulnerable in our society throughout the lockdown period. So, in order to support our own heroes, the Cornerstone Club hosted a free event on the 20th December 2020 which was designed to create an awareness of mental health issues and ways in which to create mental resilience in these difficult times.

The event was hosted by:


- Hannilee Fish, a Lawyer, Mental Health Practitioner and founder of iKan Health. Hannilee's book, One Minute Miracles has led her to deliver mindfulness training to individuals and companies all over the globe;
- Dr Kelly Jones, a Clinical Psychologist who works with the NHS supporting people with dementia, anxiety, trauma and bereavement and has worked in forensic services across the UK and America; and
- Steve Stanley; a leadership and management facilitator and trainer. Steve is also a personal and executive coach with years of experience in Neuro Linguistic Programming.

During the event we covered the basics of mental health and the issues most frequently associated with the term. Dr Jones identified the signs and symptoms which are often found with the most common mental health issues. We also heard several real-life stories where individuals had overcome adversity and learnt to deal with their own mental health problems. Finally, we looked at the ways and means by which everyone can take smalls steps to overcome a period of anxiety or stress.

Crucially, the event was designed to encourage everyone to seek help if they have any concerns regarding their own health or that of another person. There are lots of organisations that offer free and confidential helplines and guidance on how to overcome negative thoughts or feelings.

The event was a great success with club members joined by members of the Essex Almoners team and many other Essex Freemasons, with lots of positive feedback from our attendees. The Essex Cornerstone will be hosting a second talk later in the year to supplement this important topic.

There are a few initiatives that I would like to implement once Freemasonry returns to a new normality and one of these is to have a Mentors' Association. Briefly it could be run on the following lines; it will be informal, meeting three times per year, at lunch time at a weekend, with wives and partners invited to the lunch. After the meal there will be a Guest Speaker for the wives and partners entertainment, while we members retire to another room and discuss any issues or topics relating to mentoring, including the occasional Key Note Speaker. We could have a President, Secretary and a Treasurer, with an open invitation to the Provincial Executive to attend as our guest. It is work in progress, but this is the synopsis and you will be pleased to hear, that it will be as cheap as we can make it. I will be pleased to receive your feedback and comments.

In July of last year, Solomon launched Share and Encourage: Mentor's Corner, a module that has been providing Lodges and Chapters with material for on-line gatherings and methods on how best to present that material and I must remark on the way in Lodges and Lodge mentors have embraced this new approach. They have also included prospective members, keeping them updated and maintaining their interest and ready to join us when the time is right.

We now have a Facebook Group for mentors; I have made it a closed group and it just needs a request from mentors to join. If you are not a Facebook user, then please consider becoming one and you can do what I do with Facebook, restricting it solely for my Freemasonry.

I would like to expand the existing Mentoring Team and ask if you would consider becoming a Group Mentor, or Deputy Group Mentor. The role is simply to look after a number of Lodges at any one of the centres and making sure that the Lodge and personal mentors have all that they need in terms of information and help, so that they can continue with the sterling work that they are doing currently. Group Mentors and their Deputies will work closely with the Assistant Provincial Grand Master who has been appointed to look after those Lodges in the centres and feeding back to the Provincial Deputy Mentor and ultimately to me.

Supporting Local Charities

During Covid the Essex Freemason Community Fund has given to local charities, we have match funded Lodges and Chapters with additional support, but it is now time for us to look after our own. By transferring as much money as possible from your Relief Chest now you are helping us to meet our obligations.

When this happens, your money will immediately attract 2% interest – that's not happening while it is doing nothing in your Relief Chest. Your Lodge will be honoured with your donation because it will help you reach your Festival target and more.

When our meetings return to normal there will be plenty of time for individual Lodges and Chapters to replenish funds – but time would have run out for the Festival which officially ends at the end of March 2022.

So, Brethren and Companions - it really is decision time - and we need that money now. Will you be able to help?

CHRISTMAS IN A BAG

Dozens of young people across Essex with social and emotional health issues enjoyed a better Christmas thanks to a pioneering initiative by a Billericay school and last-minute help from Essex Freemasons.

"Christmas in a bag," essential basic items such as toothbrushes and clothing, can now be given to students at Ramsden Hall Academy, thanks to a £3,300 grant from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund supported from Masons who are members of Southend-on-Sea Lodge.



The initiative had been in doubt following the loss of sponsorship from local businesses affected by COVID-19. That would have meant that some students, many from families on the edge of poverty, would have had nothing for Christmas.

As well as suffering from social and emotional health issues some of these young people have very little. Some arrive at our school from families that are really struggling in the current pandemic – so we are trying to provide more than just basics and some goodies for them to enjoy at Christmas. I am extremely grateful to Essex Masons for providing such generous funds."

Ramsden Hall Academy is a residential special school for boys aged 10 to 16 who have an Education, Health and Care Plan for Social, Emotional and Mental Health. It admits up to 100 boys from across the whole county.

150th Anniversary of The Lodge of Saint Mary No 1312

Planning and early discussion for The Lodge's 150th anniversary on 13th October started about five years ago. One of the ideas that emerged was for the Lodge to put on an exhibition at Braintree Museum showing how the Lodge has engaged with the local community over the last 150 years.

This project was moved forward and indeed put together by the IPM of the Lodge and museum Volunteer John Adlam and his wife Sandra. The exhibition was to have taken place before the anniversary meeting and to be open to the public with Lodge members taking in turns to be on duty to answer questions and to generally promote Freemasonry within the community.

The project was very warmly received by our late Provincial Grand Master Rodney Bass who gave his complete support and had agreed to officially open the exhibition with a Civic Dignitary. He would then visit the Lodge with a Provincial Team on its anniversary in order to re enact its Consecration. Sadly, because of you-know-what, non of these things was able to take place, though it is hoped that they will be held next year.

As a thank you to the Friends of Braintree Museum for allowing us to use part of their building we agreed to donate £500 to them and on application, this proposal was match funded by the Province of Essex with a total of £1000 available. Three members from the Lodge, W.Bro Andrew McLeod the current Master, W.Bro John Adlam and W.Bro Nigel Oldacre met with Museum Manager Robert Rose, Treasurer David Watson and Vice Chair of The Friends Sandra Adlam. Whilst Province was Represented by our APGM W.Bro Lee Taylor.

The Lodge also commissioned W.Bro Gerald Reilly. a prize winning Masonic author to elaborate and to investigate in greater detail the history of the lodge over 150 years and it was his hard work, enthusiasm and dedication which enhanced the Museum project. His beautifully produced book indeed highlights this through its title "Engaging with the Community: The Lodge of Saint Mary 1870 - 2020".

In the afternoon a lodge meeting was held to commemorate the occasion with the master his two wardens and three others present; all wearing masks (except briefly for the photo) and very well distanced.

At this meeting Andrew McLeod was presented with a beautifully crafted gavel and base made from the oak from part of the original front doors to the Howard Hall and with an inscription commemorating the 150 years. It was the idea and creation of W Bro Fred Bowler a member of the Lodge.

Lastly in the evening there was a Zoom meeting with members. There was some 25 people who logged on and there were invited guests too, including VW.Bro Paul Reeves Deputy Provincial Grand Master in charge, W.Bro Lee Taylor APGM and representatives from local Lodges.

A brief outline of his newly published book was given by W.Bro Gerald Reilly and a response and toast to the Lodge given by Paul Reeves. There was great interaction and chat later on and it was agreed to hold a Lodge Golf Day at Braintree Golf Club as soon as possible.

£20,000 lifeline from Essex Freemasons following the "perfect storm"

A leading Colchester charity, dedicated to helping the homeless back into the community, has been given a £20,000 lifeline by Essex Freemasons, following what could only be described as a perfect storm.

mmaus, which has been helping the homeless across north Essex for more than 20 years, had been hit by a
 'triple whammy' of events over the last nine months following the Covid-19 pandemic which saw funding dry up,
 borrowings increase and reserves seriously diminished.

The situation was made even more difficult by the closure of other charities operating in the Colchester area because of Covid, resulting in a massive increase in workload for Emmaus as the only organisation in the area able to still provide a service for the growing number of homeless.

"It would not be wrong to describe this as a perfect storm," said Denise King, Chief Executive of Emmaus. "Under normal circumstances we would have received funding via our own charity shops, but these have also had to close during the pandemic and like all charities, we have also been affected by a drop in donations during this difficult period. We literally only had enough funds to stay open for 3 more months, so this donation has provided an amazing lifeline"

"I cannot say how welcome this money is, which will be used to pay for specialist staff. We are not simply a charity that provides people with a bed for the night. We work hard to bring the socially excluded back into the community and off the streets permanently."

The £20,000 was donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemasons own Charity and was part of a £1 million grant awarded nationally to combat homelessness and rough sleeping.

VW.Bro. Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge, commented:

"As part of the local community we always strive to ensure that charitable money is given where it is needed most. Emmaus do some unbelievable work to get people off the streets and eventually into their homes. They literally change lives and I am pleased we have been able to help."

Such is the need to help the homeless, Essex Freemasons are now looking at ways to help similar charities in other parts of the county. An announcement offering further support is expected in the New Year.



Essex Freemasons donate £10,000 to support bereaved children and their

ssex Freemasons have donated £10,000 to help fund the work of the Essex Child Death Review Team, a group of dedicated professionals who work as part of the NHS to offer support to families in every part of the county, following the tragic death of a child.

The money will be used to purchase visual aids, leaflets and books which help to explain to young children what has happened following the passing of a sibling or other close relative. There are about 100 such cases every year in Essex. The team, who are part of The Princess Alexandra NHS, also work closely with all of the main hospitals in Essex – Broomfield, Basildon, Harlow, Southend and Colchester – and are involved with families when a child (up to the age of 18 years) dies.

Team Leader Andrea Brewis, explained: "Around 50% of our cases are unexpected and when a member of our team arrives, usually in an A&E Department, parents and children are obviously distressed and in many cases have no idea what they should do next."

"We assist with practical advice and information (for example information about other professional's roles and funeral planning) and we offer advice and support to families individual to their needs. A large part of our work is to help other young children in the family understand and cope with what has happened. We use leaflets, toys and books to help us do this and the money will help to fund this vital part of our service which is why I want to thank Essex Masons for this very generous donation."

The £10,000 was given via the Essex Provincial Charity Fund, which was set up by local Freemasons in the 1930's to support worthy causes such the Essex Child Death Review Team. Their work came to the attention of the Fund Trustees, who immediately agreed the grant, following a recommendation from members of The Lodge of Borrowed Light which meets in Harlow.

VW.Bro Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master. "The work undertaken by the team each year under the most difficult of circumstances is absolutely incredible and we are delighted that we have been able to help."

W.Bro Rob Whittingham, Chairman of the Teddies for Loving Care Appeal in Essex said, "I am also delighted to say that the support will not stop there. We have been supplying TLC Teddies to A&E Departments and walk-in centres in every Essex Hospital as well as Whipps Cross Hospital and the Essex & Herts Air Ambulance, which are given to child patients suffering trauma & distress. When we learnt this team were also using Teddies to help children suffering the trauma of a death close to them we were only too happy to include them in the TLC family and have today supplied them with their first batch of Teddies.

This was a charity initiative which started in Essex 20 years and which is now supported by Masons worldwide with 3 million having been supplied to date and almost ½ million in Essex alone."

The TLC Teddies will now be used by the Essex Child Death Review Team alongside the books, leaflets and other visual aids, to help young children cope through difficult times.

eigh-on-Sea charity The Gold Geese, set up in 2014 to help families with young children suffering with rare blood cancers, has received a cash boost from Southend Freemasons, money that will help the organisation expand its services across south Essex into Basildon.

A £1,000 grant donated by members of Sweyn Lodge, which meets at Saxon hall in Aviation Way, supported by the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, will enable Gold Geese to work more closely with Basildon Hospital.

The charity already provides extensive support in the Southend area offering a wide range of services such as bereavement counselling, help for families as well as direct support for children suffering from Childhood cancers.

Katie Southgate from Gold Geese commented: "The charity was formed after my daughter Hattie was diagnosed with Leukaemia. She received two years of treatment with more than 40 blood transfusions."

"She thankfully made a full recovery and we wanted to put something back into to the community to help other families going through the same thing as us and to thank all those who had given blood and registered as stem cell donors to make it all possible."

As well as encouraging people to give blood the charity supports families with advice and arranges events and outings for those suffering with cancers. Siblings are also included to ensure that they do not feel left out.

As it has grown the charity now intends to expand its services into the Basildon area and the long-term aim is to eventually work across all of Essex in conjunction with all of the main hospitals in the county.

"This is a local charity and it does so much good work in the community that our members wanted to do something in support," said Ian Krise, Charity Steward for Sweyn Lodge. "We are especially pleased that this money will help the charity expand to help so many others."

Hermes and Essex Province

New web-based application for Secretaries and Scribe E's.

UGLE has wanted for some time to move away from paper-based systems and this will happen with the launch of Hermes which is currently planned for the second half of 2021.



Paul Harris, head of Hermes deployment in Essex answers your questions.

I thought Hermes delivered parcels, what's that got to do with our Province?

Yes, they do deliver parcels and no doubt will continue to do so. But the Hermes I am referring to is the new system which has been developed by Grand Lodge for use by Lodge Secretaries and Scribes E.

U. What was wrong with the old paper system?

A. There was nothing wrong with it, indeed it has worked perfectly well for many years. However, as we all know, especially over the last year, many of the tasks we all did in person or on paper have been moved to online systems. I am thinking here of Banking, shopping, buying goods and even meeting up with friends and Brethren during Lockdown. So rather than paper forms and returns, Grand Lodge are moving to doing these online.

U. OK so how will it work?

Each Secretary and Scribe E. will have access to their Lodge or Chapter details online. If a Brother changes address or phone number for instance, this can be done immediately and the details held by Grand Lodge and Province will also be updated. All those details will be saved and can be accessed anywhere and at any time, via desktop, laptop, iPad or smartphone.

Does this mean that everything will be online?

A. No, there is still the requirement to write minutes and produce summonses which are still an important and a great part of our Freemasonry however the majority of these are now also prepared and distributed electronically.

U Sounds as if it maybe complicated.

It really is not, I am confident that every Secretary and Scribe E. will be able to continue in their Office and use the new system. To help in that regard Neil Beverley, APGM, and I have formed a Steering Group whose first task was to put together a team of trainers. This has been done and these trainers will be available on a group or one-one basis as needed by each individual. A support line will also be set up in due course for those urgent enquiries.

Sounds interesting, when will we get to see it?

We hope that Essex will go live on this in the last quarter of 2021. Prior to that training programmes will be rolled out. There are other time saving features of Hermes which I shall lay out another time. However, this really is an exciting development for Grand Lodge and Essex. We are moving to the paperless office.

The Future with a new PGA

Over the holiday period I have informed the Dep. Prov. Grand Master in Charge, Paul Reeves, that I will not be accepting his kind invitation to me to remain in office for the next 12 months.

The role as I have carried it out, has been full time, it has been immensely satisfying and rewarding and all made possible by the friendship and support generated with Lodge Almoners and in particular with the Provincial Almoners team. I thank you all for this and for all the great work you are doing.

Social Welfare Work - Our New Approach

I reported last year that we were working on trying to improve the interaction that our widows without a lodge have with



the masonic community. Loneliness is one of the terrors of our modern life and as we live longer so the problems worsen. Social Isolation usually affects the elderly but not always and many young and middle-aged people can be affected.

Loneliness often leads to other illnesses, bad lifestyles, poor eating and little or no exercise. As a result, serious ill health is often the outcome and so we have been, and continue to be, very keen to make a difference in this work.

To continue our efforts in tackling this, Gary Neilson, Social Welfare Officer, has been helping our widows who are not attached to a lodge and who live in or outside the Province, to try and become formally adopted with a lodge that is near to where they live; this way they will be able to integrate more with lodge social activities.

The outcome has been that out of 98 unattached widows who live in the Province 47 have been adopted with 23 not wanting to move, leaving 28 widows for us to look after. My thanks to all the lodges who have supported this scheme and who have adopted a widow.

Out of the 25 widows who live out of the Province, we have got 23 adopted and 2 have sadly passed away. I am very grateful to the other Provinces involved for their support of the scheme.

If you have recently changed lodge almoner on a temporary or permanent basis, please contact the appropriate Almoner Liaison Officer (ALO) so he can update his records and provide the necessary support.



A Festival committee has been formed and plans are underway for a series of fundraising events, including family fun days and repeat of the magnificent auction that was held in 2017





Celebrations

90th Anniversary Thundersley Lodge 5225



The conception of a Lodge in Thundersley can almost certainly be attributed to Lt. Col Richard Mark Lockwood (later Lord Lambourne) the Provincial Grand Master of the Province of Essex 1901-1928 on an official visit to the Thundersley Parish Council in 1913. However, the First World War intervened and prevented the formation of the new Lodge. There was however renewed interest after the War by three very keen local Masons. With sponsorship from the Lodge of True Friendship No. 160 (warranted 4th December 1766), a Charter was granted and Thundersley Lodge was consecrated at the Masonic Hall, The Broadway, Southend-on-Sea on Michaelmas Day, 29th September 1930. The Consecrating Officers were made Honorary Members of the Lodge and after the consecration, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, W. Bro Dr. J. H. Salter installed W.Bro E. Kilburn as the first Master of Thundersley Lodge.

The first Regular meeting of Thundersley Lodge was held at the Weir Hotel in Rayleigh in 1930. However, as the premises proved difficult to Tyle, future meetings thereafter were held, by dispensation, at several local locations until 1957 when finally, the Memorial Temple in Woodgrange Drive was established, of which Thundersley Lodge was a Founder Member. The innovation of stained glass windows prompted the first Initiate to donate such a window adorned with the

Logo of the Lodge.

The Lodge is of the second generation of Lodges and its history can be traced back to the Strongman Lodge No. 45 (consecrated in 1733) which now meets at Great Queen's Street, and which sponsored the Lodge of True Friendship. This Lodge now meets at the Old Court House, Rochford and was a founding Lodge of Rochford Masonic Hall in 1981.

The Lodge is also a Hall Stone Lodge, having subscribed to the Masonic Million Memorial Fund. The Hall Stone Jewel and the Collarette to which is attached was presented to the Lodge in June 1933 by the MW Grand Master, the Duke of Connaught. Additionally, the Collar of the Worshipful Master is adorned with the Commemorative Jewel to acknowledge the funds contributed by members towards a Fund that commemorates the preservation of Freemasonry through two and a half centuries.

There is an historical connection between the Lodge and the Church of St Michael and St Peter in Thundersley. Its Rector became the first Lodge Chaplain and to celebrate the consecration, a weather vane depicting the St Michael and St Peter was presented to the Church. Thundersley Lodge has also been referred to as a "Teachers Lodge" taken from the fact that in the Lodge's early history, there have been eight Head Teachers from the District and a further five from within the Teaching profession. Although the close connection with the Church of St Peter is now less strong, the model of the Church is always displayed at the Secretary's Table at all Installation meetings in memory of the first Lodge Chaplain.

A Lodge Masonic Charities Association was formed in 1931 and the Lodge has been a keen supporter of charities ever since. The Lodge is a Patron of the Royal Masonic Hospital, the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution and the Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and is also a Founder Lodge for the Southend Masonic Centre.

The Lodge is also proud that one Past Master, W.Bro A J Fowles FRIBA PPGSuptWks, was the Honorary Architect to the Masonic Temple during its conversion from the original Church premises. He also donated towards the cost of installing twelve illuminated stained glass windows depicting the crests of 44 Lodges that met at the Southend Memorial Temple. These were transferred later to Saxon Hall.

In May 1939, a Notice of Motion was accepted that Thundersley Lodge support the foundation of a Royal Arch Chapter, but the start of World War II caused a delay of 12 years. Thundersley Chapter was eventually consecrated on 25th October 1951.

The Golden Jubilee was celebrated on 22nd January 1981 at the Memorial Temple Southend, attended by the PGM RW Bro F W R Leistikow and the Provincial Grand Chaplin who carried out the re-dedication of the Lodge Banner. In May 1981, W.Bro Harold Abraham gifted the Lodge a beautiful olive wood gavel from the Holy Land to commemorate the milestone, which is still used by the Worshipful Master today.

The Diamond Jubilee was similarly celebrated with splendid lunch at the Southend Memorial Temple Woodgrange Drive. This was followed by a Thanksgiving church service and Re-dedication, conducted by the Assistant Provincial Grand Master, Reverend Stanley Conway-Lee on 30th September 1990 at the Westcliff United Reform Church. Forty nine years later, due to deterioration and escalating maintenance costs, it was decided a new Masonic Centre was


needed. Southend Masonic Centre was opened on 4th January 2006 and Thundersley Lodge held their first meeting here, at Saxon Hall, on 26th January 2006, to this day.

The Lodge takes great pride in its' Ritual, which is Taylors Workings. There have been numerous memorable meetings and achievements. The Lodge achieved Grand Patron Status for Festival 2011 and has Vice Patron status for Festival 2022. Thundersley Lodge is proud to have 9 members who have achieved 50 years' service to Masonry, of which three have been in recent years. Our Late Deputy PGM, VW Bro Peter Holland presented W. Bro Ray Fretten his Certificate on 24th November 2011. Our Late W. Bro Henry Stennett was presented with his on 28th May 2015. The Brethren were pleased to receive a large contingent from the Grand Lodge of Ireland in private capacity, including their Grand Master MW Bro Douglas T Grey when W.Bro Mel Goodchild was presented with his Certificate on 24th May 2018.

The Lodge has been fortunate to have witnessed four Lewis ceremonies in recent years. Our Late W. Bro David Clement's son, Stephen was initiated on 10th April 2008, W.Bro David Fairney's son James was initiated on 22nd January 2009 and Larry Hocking initiated his adopted son Daniel Ward on 23rd November 2017. Bro Steve Hodder proudly presented the tools of an Entered apprentice after his son Joseph was initiated on 22nd November 2018. Another notable ceremony was that of Bro Robert Huntley when his twin Brother W.Bro David Huntley delivered the charge after initiation, witnessed by several Grand Officers from the Province of West Kent, including their PGM, MW Bro Mark Estaugh. Finally, several brethren have had Grand Rank bestowed upon then over the years gone by, including our own venerable W. Bro Raymond Fretten, who was promoted to PGStB on 30th April 2003.

Sadly, due to the restrictions placed on large gathering due to the coronavirus pandemic, it is unclear when Thundersley Lodge may be in a position to truly celebrate the wonderful achievement of 90 years after receiving its warrant. The Lodge has truly flourished, and with the assistance of the Great Architect of the Universe, will continue to uphold the principles and tenets of the Craft.





Never Too Late To Become a Freemason

In his 84th year, Bro Voltaire proved it is never too late to become a Freemason by being Initiated and made an Entered Apprentice of the Lodge of the Nine Sisters in Paris. Among the distinguished visitors was Benjamin Franklin who later became Master. Born in 1694 and famous for his travels, wit and irrepressible grin seen on hundreds of paintings, sketches, caricatures, statues and busts, Voltaire once wrote "Let us always march forward along the highway of Truth, my brothers, grinning decisively".

Philosopher, historian, and writer who also led many campaigns against injustice, inequality and tyranny and who introduced the term "Human Rights", Bro Voltaire is described on his tombstone monument in Paris as the 'Immortal symbol of the Age of Enlightenment'.

Learning to be a successful investor whilst living in London in the late 1720s Voltaire never had to rely on book sales or aristocratic patronage for the rest of his life. He loved England, especially the coffee houses and the London Exchange, writing that "There the Jew, the Mahometan and the Christian deal with each other as though they were all of the same religion".

Having lived a long, full and eventful life, it appears that one of the World's greatest ever Philosophers found in Freemasonry the same 'Brotherly Love' and tolerance for all religions and denominations to work together, similar to that which had impressed him so much in the London Exchange where "the Presbyterian trusts the Anabaptist and the Anglican accepts the Quaker's bond"

Voltaire's grin and wit stayed with him all his life, even during his dying hours when a Jesuit priest, who had been sent for, urged him to renounce the devil to which Voltaire softly replied "Now is not the time to be making enemies". Fortunately for the Age of Enlightenment, which greatly influenced the development of Freemasonry, Bro Voltaire also refused to renounce any of his works before his 'passing' to the Grand Lodge Above on 30th May 1778.

Charity



Dozens of young people across Essex with social and emotional health issues enjoyed a better Christmas thanks to a pioneering initiative by a Billericay school and last-minute help from Essex Freemasons.

"Christmas in a bag," essential basic items such as toothbrushes and clothing, can now be given to students at Ramsden Hall Academy, thanks to a £3,300 grant from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund supported from Masons who are members of Southend-on-Sea Lodge.

The initiative had been in doubt following the loss of sponsorship from local businesses affected by Covid-19. That would have meant that some students, many from families on the edge of poverty, would have had nothing for Christmas.

"It is literally Christmas was a bag for these young people," said Emma Baker, head teacher at Ramsden Hall Academy. "As well as suffering from social and emotional health issues some of these young people have very little. Some arrive at our school from families that are really struggling in the current pandemic – so we are trying to provide more than just basics and some goodies for them to enjoy at Christmas. I am extremely grateful to Essex Masons for providing such generous funds."

Ramsden Hall Academy is a residential special school for boys aged 10 to 16 who have an Education, Health and Care Plan for Social, Emotional and Mental Health. It admits up to 100 boys from across the whole county.

The Academy has a remarkable record of success working with students who have mostly been excluded for various reasons, which means that Ramsden Hall is frequently the only place left for boys who have struggled with mainstream education.

Tony Hodgson, Charity Steward for Southend-on-Sea Lodge, commented: "Our Lodge was approached by the Academy for help via my son Ryan who is a teacher at Ramsden Hall. There was apparently no funding available to pay for Christmas in a bag."

"We as a Lodge could only provide £500 so we asked for further help from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund to make up the difference and they immediately agreed to find the balance needed." The money was handed over in earlier in the month so that the initiative could go ahead and on Friday December 11th Head Teacher Emma Baker invited Masons from Southend-on-Sea Lodge together with Assistant Provincial Grand Master Charles Elliott, to see how the money had been spent.


I have always been a person who loved mystery and magic, and Freemasonry I found that.

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12 Million Steps For Muscular Dystrophy

One Hundred and Twelve Essex Freemasons stepped up to the plate for the Provincial '500 Step Challenge'. In the eight days from 23rd to 30th December 2020, the Brethren recorded a total of 12,378,321 steps, the equivalent of walking 6,189 miles. St Philip Lodge No 4221 whose four team members, Alan Keith, Andy Cross, Joe Wiggins and Paul Leacock marched into first place with an average of 20,478 steps each day and gave their prize-winning charitable donation to Muscular Dystrophy UK, in memory of the late Spencer Walsh, the brother-in-law of Andy Cross, who sadly passed away on 7th December 2020.


For Andy Cross, the sexagenarian Treasurer of St Philip Lodge, every step was a challenge, suffering with heel pain in his right foot from a ligament inflammation (plantar fascia) he still managed to complete 242,926 steps. Exactly 100 years ago, the Founders of St Philip Lodge were also taking challenging steps. The Warrant of the Lodge was granted on 13th December 1920 and arrangements for the Consecration were well under way. As the Founders look down from Grand Lodge above, they must be feeling very proud of the current St Philip Lodge members as they begin their Centennial year.



The leading individual was Clive Cheeseman with a total of 275,784 steps from second placed Henry de Gray Lodge No 6627. His team was followed in order by Cornerstone, St Kath's Turkey Trotters, Spero Lodge, Orsett Lodge, The Beeleigh Abbey Lodge, Round Table Lodge of Essex, Old Parkonians Lodge, The Dragon of St George, Albert Lucking Chubbsters, Sons of Benfleet, Old Easthameian, Essex Quadrant Lodge, Team Wakering, Haven Step Brothers, Prittlewell 3 Amigos, Shenfield Lodge, Saint Cedd, Paul Geadey Gaggle, Alan Keith Quadrant, Lodge of Amity No 5753, Team Higgins and The Dragon of St George.

The widow of Spencer, Mrs Jill Welsh has written "I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Province of Essex Freemasons for the '500 Step Challenge' donation. This been donated to Muscular Dystrophy UK, a cause very close to our hearts having lost our son to this cruel disease at the age of 17. With tributes also from family and friends we have been able to send in excess of £2,000 to this worthy charity. With my deepest gratitude".

Essex Cornerstone Top of the class for Templars

The Essex Cornerstone continues to support a growing range of good causes across the county, with a youth programme focused on local charities dedicated to helping young people and children in need.

Last year, the Essex Cornerstone, a club for younger Freemasons, started a scheme to supply NHS hospital wards with iPad/tablet devices to allow patients to communicate with relatives while visiting is restricted due



to Covid-19 pandemic. The success of the scheme led many other masonic provinces taking up the challenge.

Ten months after the first national lockdown, with schools across England again closed due to the pandemic, it is clear that many students still do not have access to a computer, laptop or the internet. So, following a request by W.Bro Henry Bass to help support his local school, Witham's Templars Academy, with computers to help support home learning, the Essex Cornerstone rose to the challenge and quickly provided the school with 10 laptops, supported by £500 of matched funding from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund. said:

"We are delighted to have been able to provide support to Templars Academy, and know that the laptops will help schoolchildren access online learning. Being able to provide this support at a time of need harmonises with the ethos of the Essex Cornerstone supporting young people".

Victoria Gooding, Head of School, said: "The laptops that were very generously donated to Templars Academy will without doubt support our families to access online learning.

"Families are struggling at the moment; without adequate or sufficient access to technology, some have either no way of accessing live or recorded lessons and the learning that is set on a daily basis. Some of our families are working from printed copies of work because of this, but the laptops being given to them will enable them to easily log-on and use Microsoft Teams or access the school website. The laptops also support our families who have many siblings.

"We are very grateful for how this provides learning opportunities for our students who are most disadvantaged." Faye Welsher, MAT Safeguarding Lead and Family Liaison Officer at Templars Academy added: "I just wanted to put in writing a huge thank you for the generous gift of the laptops. We have identified specific children that will hugely benefit from this. The families are completely overwhelmed and grateful."

Jane Bass said: "Can I also, as CEO of Connected Learning MAT, the academy trust of which Templars is a member school, say a big thank you for the generous gift of laptops. For pupils of the school, who do not access to IT devices whilst trying to learn at home, these will make such a difference to their learning".

"O WONDERFUL MASONS!"

ollowing a presentation about the rebuilding of 'The Square' at Upminster, the late Rodney Lister Bass OBE, as Provincial Grand Master and Grand Superintendent of Essex, declared "O Wonderful Masons!". The captivating story of this magnificent achievement by a number of inspirational brethren and skilled craftsmen and the challenges they overcame which led to the PGM's exclamation can now be viewed in a new video.

Entitled 'Rebuilding The Square', the well-narrated video holds the viewers' attention with many examples to show how inspired business acumen, resourceful planning, quality workmanship, efficient energy saving applications and creative interior designs all contributed to the successful rebuild of the property whilst saving well in excess of £100,000 without compromising the quality and splendour which can be seen today.

The original Upminster Masonic Hall on the site was built in 1955/56 for £8,200 but had fallen into a state of disrepair. Resourceful planning was needed to work around the meeting and dining needs of over 2,000 members of 55 Lodges, 23 Chapters and 32 additional Masonic orders.

Very professionally produced with computer animations and actual photographs the video story begins on 13th December 2013 explaining how a new board of directors dramatically took control, assessed the situation and unknowingly began a programme of rebuilding lasting seven years. The main video can be viewed in six nuggets starting with the Beginning and followed by The Large Temple, The Small Temple, The Exterior, The Entrance Doors and Commendations.

The first five nuggets explain the major developments including how the ceiling of the new Constellation Temple was created together with the innovative improvements to the heating, lighting and flooring and how some work was carried out at night to keep on schedule because of a heatwave. Viewers can also see how many of the features of the Great Eastern Hotel's Grecian Temple, built in 1912, gave inspiration for the new Grecian Temple using authentic materials for the intricate work.

The new bar which had been installed at the Masonic Centre in Clerkenwell for over £100,000 in 2014 was acquired by the directors at Upminster for £6,000 just one year later when that centre closed. The video explains how additional business acumen resulted in the bar being completed at zero cost and describes how that acumen was used to make other significant cost savings throughout the whole project including the exterior with its historical entrance doors from Jodhpur in India.

Everyone who views the new video will not only find it a pleasure to watch, being both entertaining and informative, but will also be as impressed as the late Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Rodney Lister Bass, when he exclaimed "O Wonderful Masons!".

Southend's freemasonry centre, Saxon Hall, in Aviation Way, opened its doors last week to NHS front line staff, offering the building for use as a vaccination centre in the battle against Covid19.


On the chilly opening day, the first 80yearoldplus invitees for a jab turned up for their 8am appointments almost an hour early, and kept coming.

Helping the queues grow even longer was the late arrival of the actual vaccines - and then there wasn't enough supply to meet demand, which led to further delays, and lengthening queues, while fresh supplies were sourced.

And then police arrived. Chairman of Saxon Hall Dennis Baum, pressed into willing duty as a car park attendant, said: "They had been notified that there was a rave taking place at Saxon Hall - only to find 80and 90yearolds with wheelchairs, zimmer frames and walking sticks patiently queueing for their vaccinations."

Dennis added that although the earlier queues had resulted in a few grumpy old men and women, "as a balancing act, many more very appreciative people couldn't have been more grateful to receive the vaccine, and thanked Saxon Hall and Essex freemasons for providing the venue".

In the days following, local voluntary organisations, including the Leigh Lions, Community Police and OneLove Soup Kitchen Southend, made queueing a lot more comfortable for those awaiting the vaccine by providing gazebo shelters, hot drinks, blankets and wheelchairs, as well as helping with steward duties and providing refreshments for the hardworking NHS staff.



A SNACK IN TIME HELPS COVID WARD FRONT LINE



Essex Freemason, David Wiles, was at the till paying for petrol, when the cashier asked if he would like to buy a snack bar for the nursing staff who were not even getting to eat on the Covid wards at Broomfield Hospital, near Chelmsford, just a few miles away. A paramedic in the queue behind David confirmed this was indeed the case. So, David bought 10 snack bars there and then.

Being the Charity Steward for Rosslyn Lodge No 1543, which meets in Braintree, David immediately posted what had happened on his Lodge's WhatsApp page. The story was picked up by all the Lodge members and within a week they had chipped-in £25 each, raised £500 and bought 240 snack bars and 120 cans of energy drinks which David delivered to Broomfield Hospital on Friday 8th January 2021.

Received by Nurse Lauren Dicker and her colleagues on Heybridge Covid Ward, David and his fellow Essex Freemasons from Rosslyn Lodge were thanked by Lauren for all their efforts and support.

Just 22 years old, Nurse Lauren, who has had Covid herself and returned to the front line, completes 12 to 14 hour shifts and had worked every day for the last seven consecutive days. After her shifts she distributes food and helps raise charitable donations online for PPE and other equipment and so does not get a lot of sleep before going back onto the Ward.

"An absolute superstar" were the words used by Stewart Nardi of Rosslyn Lodge when he told BBC Essex about Lauren and continued "We will be doing this again very soon". Lodge Secretary, Mike Hall, is proud of the support of the Lodge members saying that they were all 'chuffed to bits' especially when Lauren said "We thought we had been forgotten!"





NHS Donation by Orsett Lodge

The members of Orsett Lodge have raised funds to purchase goods for the NHS nurses, who are currently working with PPE during this pandemic. We were able to supply energy drinks and energy bars for nurses on Covid wards as they are suffering from fatigue due to the long hours.
