W.Bro Paul William Tarrant A Man for all Reasons

Provincial Grand Master and Most Excellent Grand Superintendent DESIGNATE

"I will have to think about this and have a long discussion with Jenny first" By Tony Hales Provincial Communications Team

Bringing a feeling of hope and the start of a new growing season, Spring is the favourite season of the year for Provincial Grand Master and Most Excellent Grand Superintendent Designate (PGM/ MEGS Des) of Essex Freemasons, Paul Tarrant. When Graham Redman, the Deputy Grand Secretary (DGS) of the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE), called him to ask whom he thought the next PGM might be, Paul happily gave three or four names. The DGS then said "What about you Paul?". Feeling astounded he replied "I will have to think about this and have a long discussion with Jenny first". The next step was a Zoom meeting with the Pro Grand Master, the Grand Secretary and the DGS. Jenny, Paul's wife, was also invited to make sure she would be happy for Paul to accept the Mastership of the second largest Provincial Grand Lodge in UGLE.

Born in 1954 in Leigh-on Sea, Paul first knew about Freemasonry from his father, Colin, a member of Thames Mouth Lodge No. 6994. His mother Ann also became an Essex Freemason, but it was David Badger, whom he met at the Little Theatre Club in Westcliff, a local amateur dramatic (am-dram) society, who proposed him into Lodge of Fraternity No. 5916 in 1983. Famous for its 'Fraternity Working', David and Paul were part of a team that first put the ritual in writing. Never considering himself to be a 'career-mason' Paul said "Being a member of Freemasonry is the best decision made in all my years. I have never been ambitious, I simply love seeing members enjoying themselves with a focus on charity, which is a good thing". In addition to his love of Freemasonry, there are many other reasons why Paul was selected.

Educated at Westcliffe High School for Boys (Grammar) and Southend College of Technology, where he gained a Diploma in Business, Paul began a distinguished career which led to senior roles at Racal Electronics managing the Government Data Network, at HM Customs and Excise in technical architecture management including that for the DirectGov website, in programme and development management, including the multimillion pound redevelopment of Government Banking facilities. From being a 'tax-collector' Paul was posted to DEFRA, where he coordinated the work of a diverse and federated structure of over 70 agencies to reduce

costs in IT by 33%. Paul's final career move was to Mark Masons Hall as Grand Secretary which also started with a drive to reduce waste, increase efficiency and give a better service to all members with IT systems developments including the rewriting of KeyStone Online.

With Mark Master Masons alone accounting for over 43,000 members and Mark Masons Hall being responsible for the administration of many of the Masonic Orders in which Paul holds Grand Rank he found the whole experience "wonderful and marvellous" giving him a valuable understanding of other Orders which will be a significant advantage in his new role. Seven years ago, Paul had a stroke and took the brave decision to stand down as a Grand Secretary. He is proud of the 'fatherly-advice' given by Jack, their son, who was then 21. With his father worried about what he would be able to do in the future, Jack was adamant that 'getting better was all in the head'. He was right and inspired Paul to come to terms with life when things were really bad and make a successful journey back to recovery. Today, Jack works for the Royal Society of Chemists and Paul is a role model for all stroke sufferers.

As with us all, Paul thought highly of his immediate predecessor, the late Rodney Lister Bass OBE, who Invested him as an Assistant Provincial Grand Master (APGM) in 2017, saying "It is a real shame he has passed on; I was surprised in many ways by Rodney's breadth of ideas and will do my best to emulate him".

In 2017 Paul was Installed as Inspector General of the Rose Croix District of South Essex, which is larger than some of the smaller Craft Provinces, and stepped down as an APGM in 2018 to focus on the District. On their website the members convey their most hearty congratulations to Paul but "will miss his warm and friendly presence". Paul does consider himself gregarious and pleasant to people but has a serious side when discussing the job in front of him saying "The Grand Secretary has laid out areas we (UGLE and the Provinces) should do together. They are not all the same and for some we will have our own identity. I believe we are looking at all the right things including how we are viewed by the public".

Rose Croix is Paul's favourite Order. Perfected in 1989, he says "It has a depth of ritual which is both gentle and interesting giving a different perspective. Managing a number of units has given me more experience and encouragement to take on the work ahead". When he was an APGM, there was a Lodge which surrendered its Warrant, "I gave all of myself in making the closing ceremony poignant and with feeling, especially when talking about the Lodge history and I helped in finding new Lodges for some of the members". Without doubt, the biggest Masonic career highlight that Paul is proud of in all Orders was his tenure as Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies (PGDC) in Royal Arch from 2008 to 2012. Having started in am-dram at 18 he said "the skills do help with ritual and being a DC. By performing as though in a small play, it helps impart the meaning better, especially for a new member coming into the Lodge". Paul also enjoys singing the Master's Song and does not rule out singing to a newly Installed Master in the future, possibly at his Mother Lodge.

Two Brethren who have had the biggest impact on Paul's Masonic career so far are the late Peter Holland, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master from 2005 to 2015 and his predecessor at the Rose Croix District of South Essex, who was also his Mentor and Ray Fretten *"who is someone I have always looked up to and is a real gentleman in every way"*. As well as belonging to Essex Masters No 3256 and Essex Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge No. 8665 Paul joined Laconic Lodge No. 9711 in Ipswich when Jenny and he moved to Suffolk in 2017 to be closer to Jenny's family. He is also a joining member of one of the three remaining 'time-immemorial' lodges, the Royal Somerset House and Inverness Lodge No. 4, and would have taken on the Office of 'Master of The Wardrobe' role at Freemasons' Hall but kindly declined the offer on being appointed as PGM/MEGS Designate for Essex.

Outside of Freemasonry, Paul is a Freeman of the Worshipful Company of Poulters whose motto is 'Remember Your Oath' and a Freeman of the City of London. Music, Theatre and Arts have always played an important part of Jenny and Paul's lives. They have been members of various choral, opera and musical groups in Essex including the Rug Opera in Southend where Paul was a founder. Formerly Paul was the South Essex representative of the National Operatic and Dramatic Association and a Trustee of the Freda Parry Scholarship Fund which was established to assist young singers intending to follow a singing career. The winners are awarded £1,500 to assist with fees. This is very similar to the Sponsor a Nurse scheme which the Essex Freemasons Charity Fund (EFCF) is now promoting and match-funding across the Province. Paul says "This is a great idea and I am pleased, as an Honorary Member that, Old Westcliffian Lodge No. 5456 is going to sponsor an apprenticed nurse along with fellow Federation of School Lodges in Essex".

Paul is a great believer that every Lodge should have a focus with a mission to help charity and contribute to society. The change in demographics is bringing in far more young people who are interested in Freemasonry, "I was invited to attend a recent Cornerstone Zoom committee meeting. There was a noticeable 'buzz' among the members making it obvious that there are some really useful and enjoyable things about Freemasonry such as friendship, meeting new people from all walks of life who, regardless of age, discovering enjoyment from ritual followed by a good meal". He believes more young people will come in and offers some initial advice "Please, please enjoy and don't get worried. Think about the ritual and what it means, most of it is about bettering yourself. And don't jump into everything straight away, take it easy".

"Before then I had always coasted along but there, I realised that working hard is a good idea and applying this simple truism has helped me considerably throughout life." Paul's definition of success is 'Happiness'. The maxim of 'More happiness not more bling' has been a guiding principle. His biggest personal success was meeting Jenny. Together, at the Rug Opera they helped raise over £80,000 for charity. His second personal success came at HM Customs and Excise.

"Before then I had always coasted along but there, I realised that working hard is a good idea and applying this simple truism has helped me considerably throughout life." Also winning the Best Actor award at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival, at Buxton Opera House, is a personal success which will always be a happy memory. If ever anyone was to play Paul in a movie of his life, his choice would be Mark Rylance, a former artistic director of The Globe in London. "I choose him because he is one of the greatest Shakespearian actors and in lots of his films he underplays himself".

Jenny and Paul usually walk three to four miles every day. They are very keen on environmental issues and are members of the local Wildlife Trust and the RSPB. The swallow is his favourite bird but he also likes the crow family as they are the most intelligent of all birds. "We are concerned that man-made climate change is having an impact on wildlife, the country and the world which is why we are supporters of Wildlife Trusts in general". The wife of a Mason once told Paul she wished Freemasonry would do more for animals and wildlife. Paul concurs saying "This is another public perception which may need to be looked at in the future if we are to change the minds of the public and the view that Freemasonry is a serious secret society, which is perhaps our biggest challenge but fortunately we are moving in the right direction." Paul cannot say he has a favourite charity but those working for wildlife, stroke and cancer are in his own top three charity sectors.

In addition to walking, Paul's favourite way to spend a day off is watching cricket, going to the theatre or anything to do with nature or the arts. An allotment at Bucklesham provides both much pleasure and produce. A pint of Southwold Bitter is one thing which can make his day instantly better but most of all he enjoys being with his family at the dinner table just sitting, talking and eating. Christmas Day is extra special as

Jenny's family always have a traditional dinner which everyone looks forward to. If the tree fairy were to grant Paul three wishes this Christmas, he would ask for World Peace, ridding the world of illness and Southend United getting back into the Football League!

As well as local history and folklore, Paul has a particular interest in the Crusades, Byzantium and medieval history and has all three of Sir Steven Runciman's books, The Last Byzantine Renaissance, The Byzantine Theocracy and The Medieval Manichee, which is a study of Christian dualist heresy, so it is no surprise that if he could go back in time, he would like to meet the Byzantium emperor at the time of the First Crusade, Alexis Commenus, to ask how he felt after seeking military support from the Western powers but only receiving a rabble of an army arriving from all over. Paul would also take as much medication with him as possible to help the ordinary citizens.

Other places to visit back in time are Aarhus in Denmark in the 70's and Liverpool in the time of the Beatles, who made a lasting impression on Paul throughout his teenage years along with rock band Jethro Tull. With an appreciation of music across all genres, the Handel Operas are top of Paul's classical music list "even Mozart once said Handel is the Master" said Paul "but I also enjoy the works of Britten, Verdi and Puccini. Being widely travelled in America, Europe and Asia, Paul enjoyed Chennai, formerly Madras, and would have liked more time there learning the local culture. Munich is another favourite city. Realising there is still so much to see in the UK, Jenny and Paul mostly take self-catering holidays in properties cared for by The Landmark Trust. Whilst staying in Scotland they walked over 40 miles along the West Highland Way. Train Holidays through Europe are also on the bucket list including to Venice and other European destinations.

Paul has come a long way since wanting to be a fireman as a child because his father was a part-time fireman and there was a big alarm bell at the top of the stairs which would go off every time there was a 'shout'. Facebook has also been a good way to connect with some people Paul has not seen for many years "I have a number of Friends on Facebook and use WhatsApp but do not use Instagram or Twitter". Of all his traits, Paul hopes his ability at being able to get on with people is the one most appreciated by others "It is something I have worked hard at, especially when coming back from the stroke."

As his Investiture on 9th September 2021 draws closer, we can rest assured the PGM/MEGS Des is grateful for all that has been done in the past by everyone in the Province. He also is sensitive to the many changes taking place: "Over the years membership has reduced and the focus is now on those worthy of membership. We are definitely more open which is far better. Members are becoming more laid-back with their view of Freemasonry as opposed to times past when things were done in a military fashion. Also, for many, their view of life is changing and we are all in together with a wide-range of different beliefs and religions. Since the Age of Enlightenment, Freemasonry has never become a melting-pot producing one religion, as some people think, and it never will. It is a wonderful organisation in which every member has a healthy respect for each other".

In making their decision, the 'Rulers of the Craft' have carefully considered the attributes needed in the new PGM/MEGS for the Province of Essex and for one who is worthy of the Masonic protocol to be addressed as 'Sir'. In Paul William Tarrant they have wisely chosen 'A Man for all Reasons'.

Essex Freemasons have donated £30,000 to independent sight loss charity Southend in Sight to help it continue and develop its "Talk and Support service". It means that the project, which first began during lockdown, now has sufficient funding for the next three years.

The money, donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemasons own charity, will help ensure that this unique scheme which offers support with the help of the charity's visually impaired volunteers, will continue to grow.

The scheme works using volunteers who make regular phone calls to those members who are more isolated in the community. These volunteers have particular insight into the challenges faced by Southend in Sight's clients on a daily basis, and a working knowledge of the support and advice the charity can supply.

Living with sight loss can be isolating in itself but during the lockdowns imposed over the course of the pandemic, that isolation has been even greater. A phone call from someone who understands a visually impaired person's situation can change that.

The charity's staff and volunteers currently make calls to more than 80 local visually impaired people on a regular basis, many of whom are vulnerable and isolated. The grant from Essex Freemasons will allow Southend in Sight to develop this service, connect with more people isolated because of sight loss and train more volunteers. When restrictions allow, staff at the charity hope to offer coffee mornings and local meet ups for small groups to help them stay connected and begin to mix with people again, as many will need to build up confidence.

Lucy Martin, CEO of Southend in Sight says:

"We are delighted to receive this three-year grant from Essex Freemasons which will allow us to continue and develop our project for older visually impaired people in the local community. I am very proud of everyone involved with our Talk and Support service and I know that the regular chats with our staff and volunteers have provided a lifeline for many over the last year."

V.W.Bro Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master in charge, commented:

"We have more than 2,000 members who meet in the Southend area and they are very much part of the local community. It means we are delighted to be able to support a charity which is doing such excellent work."

The charity's base at 117 Hamlet Court Road is now open for pre-booked appointments and it is able to make some deliveries of essential equipment and even offer advice on the doorstep if the need arose. The charity's shop is also open again at the Hamlet Court Road site and welcoming shoppers keen to grab a bargain. Teddies for Loving Care celebrates 20 years

On 12th March 2001 an extraordinary, and unique, scheme was launched by Essex Freemasons: it was a simple idea – to raise funds to provide Essex A&E departments with Teddies for the medical staff to give to children brought into their care to help relieve their distress.



Back in October 1999, Freemason Ian Simpson took his wife, Angela, to Southend Hospital's A&E unit after an allergic reaction caused her windpipe to swell and block. After finding themselves so anxious and frightened, the couple decided to do something to say thank you to the A&E staff and, with the help of Ian's lodge, the Teddies For Loving Care appeal was born.

And, ten years after what started so successfully as a purely local scheme and which was later extended to all the A&E units in Essex, Neil Beverley, a founder of TLC, marked the gift of the one-millionth teddy bear. However, where that happened, nobody is entirely sure, because TLC had been so successful that it had been taken up not only by masonic provinces all over England, but had gone global.

Now, two decades after its launch, TLC is still going strong. Three million teddies have been cuddled by children in hospitals in every country under the Grand Lodge of England's banners. Medical practitioners everywhere agree on the benefits the teddies bring.

"It means so much to the nurses,' one says. 'It makes our lives easier and the children feel safer, and it's not so traumatic for them. The teddy system works so well because it's such a simple idea. It's something the children love and makes them feel special. The parents see that you really value their child, they're not just another number and they're being seen as an individual."

And the teddy bears aren't just employed to comfort the child either; nurses will quite often use them as a diversion technique as they work, like using the teddy to mimic the injuries the child has, perhaps putting a sticky plaster on the teddy's arm if the child has hurt theirs.

And now the scheme has taken another step forward. Current Chairman Robert Whittingham explained: "Last year, the fund presented a grant of $\pm 10,000$ to the Child Death Review Team.

"The team is based in Harlow, Essex and is made up of former nurses and other medical practitioners. They respond to all child deaths reported in Essex, ranging from cot death to teenage suicide, support the families at the time of death and after, and make introductions to other support agencies. They also attend Coroners' inquests to give evidence and further support the families, and liaise with other agencies such as the Police in any formal investigations."

Robert added: "The donation is being made to enable them to purchase books and other specialist materials given to bereaved parents and siblings at an awful time. The literature enables parents to explain to surviving siblings what has happened and help them to understand."

Today there are 47 regional TLC programmes across England and Wales that provide teddies for their local A&E departments. Once a hospital joins the scheme they can replenish teddies on request through their local TLC representative. Some TLC programmes also donate a portion of their TLC funds towards teddies for minor injuries units, children's wards and hospices; there are even teddies flying on air ambulances!

Recent months have seen the introduction of a new model of teddy and Essex, as the founder of the scheme, is proud to have been the first Province to receive supplies for its hospitals, medical units and air ambulances.

The Addenbrooke's Charitable Trust has thanked Essex Freemasons for their "incredible support and wonderful generosity" in donating £3,000 for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at the hospital. Serving the Eastern region, Dr Kelsall and the dedicated NICU team do their utmost to save premature and new-born babies with complications so that they can survive to live full lives.

Twenty years ago, a grateful Walden Lodge No 1280 donated £1,000 to NICU, after sharing in the pain and anguish of W Bro Graham Newman and his wife when their daughter was born prematurely and had to spend several months in intensive care. Thanks to NICU, baby Imogen has grown up and completed a degree at Reading University so Walden Lodge decided to mark this milestone with another donation.

The Provincial Grand Master of Essex Freemasons, the late Rodney Lister Bass OBE, visited Walden Lodge in November 2019 for the 150th year celebrations which included a quiz night raising £1,200. A further £1,300 was raised by the Brethren, including Graham Newman, and with £500 from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund in matched-funding, the total of £3,000 was achieved.

Dr Kelsall at NICU said that once he is allowed, he is happy to visit and say thank you again in person to all the Brethren whilst sharing more about the department. The money will go towards maintaining and upgrading:

- a video system so that during lockdown, parents can still talk to and see their babies while apart
- Incubator covers that allow the right level of sound and light in creating a cocoon-like, safe environment for sick babies.
- Books for siblings of babies on the unit, allowing parents to prepare their children for the often-overwhelming experience of visiting the NICU and their baby brother or sister for the first time.
- The refurbishment and design of a calm, tranquil room for parents to take a break from the unit and make themselves a hot drink.

Based in Saffron Walden and bearing the Borough motto of Deo Adjuvante Floremus (By God's help we flourish), Walden Lodge has a fine tradition of charitable giving which began 150 years ago, in 1871, with two guineas each for the Relief of French Peasants in the Franco-Prussian War and the Saffron Walden General Hospital.

In April 1912 five guineas was donated to the Lord Mayors Fund for the Titanic disaster. As today's Lodge Treasurer and Charity Steward, Richard Peet, said speaking on behalf of the 23 members of Walden Lodge "We are a Small Lodge with a Big Heart".

To honour HRH Prince Philip, who passed away last week, the Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex with circa 9,000 Freemasons and 300 Lodges has joined the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) campaign inviting their 200,000 members to raise funds for charities that the Prince dedicated his life to.

is Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh had been married for 73 years and was a Freemason himself having been introduced to Freemasonry in 1952 at the age of 31 by his Father-in-Law King George VI. Throughout his 99 years, he was associated with some 992 charities, either as president, patron or as an honorary member.

The Prince supported charitable organisations in the fields of scientific and technological research and development, the encouragement of sport, the welfare of young people, conservation and the environment.

Paul Reeves, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master In-Charge of Essex Freemasons, said "Although HRH Prince Philip retired officially from royal duties in May 2020, after 22,219 solo engagements, his lifetime of duty and service is an inspiration to everyone who is a Freemason." Paul Reeves continued "HRH has been an example to us all for over 70 years during which time many people of all ages throughout Essex have benefitted either directly or indirectly from The Duke of Edinburgh's initiatives and charitable patronage."

Dr David Staples, chief executive of UGLE, said: "Prince Philip was well known for his charity work, having been involved with numerous organisations. He was devoted to philanthropy and therefore the best way to celebrate his life is by supporting the charities that the Prince himself supported.

"For us, this was an easy decision as Freemasonry's core values are charity, integrity, respect and friendship. The Freemasons have been quietly getting on with making society and the lives of those less fortunate better for more than three centuries," said Dr Staples.

Freemasons worked some 18.5 million hours each year as volunteers in a range of different areas, including driving vulnerable people to hospital, preparing meals, taking care of people at risk, organising care packages, and producing scrubs, personal protective equipment (PPE) and hand sanitiser.

They also donated more than £1m last year to the Covid effort, with the funds being used to help communities in various critical areas, including foodbanks, support for unpaid carers, PPE, supplies for hospitals and hospices, support for women's refuges, and funds for NHS workers, ambulances and equipment.

As a Freemason, the Duke of Edinburgh was initiated into Navy Lodge, No 2612, on 5 December. On 6 March 1953, HRH Prince Philip progressed to the Second Degree of Freemasonry, before advancing to the Third Degree on 4 May 1953. The UGLE issued his Grand Lodge Certificate on 7 May that same year and he remained a member up until his death.

The Duke of Edinburgh was born in Corfu on 10 June 1921, the only son of Prince Andrew of Greece and Princess Alice of Battenberg. He therefore also held the title Prince of Greece and Denmark.

Freemasons can also count other members of the Royal Family among their number, including HRH the Duke of Kent, who is the longest-serving Grand Master of the UGLE.

Clacton Hospital

Its what makes us stand out



It started with a Facebook appeal from Clacton District Hospital then went viral - and it worked after the message reached local Freemasons - members of Clactonian Lodge, who responded to the urgent request to help patients isolated by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The person behind the appeal, Emma Blowers, Paediatric Services Lead and the rest of her team were called in to help when the virus began to change lives, but for the patients, many of whom had been transferred from nearby Colchester Hospital to recover from non-covid related conditions, it meant lockdown and isolation.

Access to TV and other communal rooms stopped overnight leaving "patients to look at four walls" and that was when Emma acted and asked the question – is there anyone out there who can supply us with old TVs or radios?"

Steve Peperrell, who saw Emma's appeal on Facebook, responded immediately with members of Clactonian Lodge agreeing to donate £500, a sum match funded by the Essex Freemasons Community Fund – a total of £1,000 and enough to buy three new TVs and stands for patients at Clacton Hospital.

"The members agreed to help immediately," said Steve, "Clacton is our local hospital and we as Freemasons are very much involved with the local community, so we were pleased to help and hope it has made a real difference to patients who had to put up with their own particular kind of lockdown."

Brenda Heywood and Diane Davies, currently recovering at Clacton Hospital, were in full agreement – the new TVs have made a difference. They are seen pictured with Emma Blowers, together with members of the nursing team and Clactonian Lodge and Assistant provincial Grand Master Graham Dickerson and Colin Felton, Provincial Grand Charity Steward at a special presentation ceremony.

"We are very grateful to Clactonian Lodge," said Emma Blowers. "The TV's have given some normality to patients who had to be kept in isolation in groups of six to protect them from the pandemic. It was especially good because they had a connection with the outside world. The biggest thing was that it enabled them to watch historic events such as the Duke of Edinburgh's funeral, which they would have missed."

Essex Freemasons donate more than £1million each year to help local charities. In the last 12 months an additional £100,000 has been used for Covid related support and helping local Lodges such as Clactonian support dozens of different causes across the county.

The ladies wear regalia the same as the men and buy from the same shops. Their ritual is identical and, like the men, there are a number of different workings. Lodge Diligence No 179 supports events at Loughton Masonic Centre and the OWF supports County shows, Freshers' Fairs and had a stand at the Open House event at UGLE, "It's all about getting involved" said Elaine who also works hard to encourage new and young members to join the OWF stating "They are the future of Freemasonry".

The Most Worshipful Brother Zuzanka Daniella Penn is the Grand Master of the OWF which explains that Freemasons are taught to be tolerant towards all people and behave with kindness and understanding towards all. This should resonate with all Essex Freemasons, as her namesake and former pupil of Chigwell School, although not a mason himself, founded a city named from the Greek words for love and brother, phileo and adelphos. William Penn chose the name to embrace the 'whole of society'. It is, of course, Philadelphia, meaning the city of "Brotherly Love".

"It's a seven day a week job" said Gary "there are emails and telephone calls coming in all the time". Gary's wife Gill is understanding and supportive. Married for 38 years, with a son and a daughter who are both married and two grandchildren, they have themselves faced anxiety and loss so helping and caring for others in difficult times comes naturally.

It was on the playing fields of Essex that Gary first became aware of Freemasonry. Listening to other team members at a local hockey club he gathered they were Masons. Liking what they did to help other people and the community he asked how to join. "Ask you father-in-law" was the reply to a much-surprised Gary! Gill's father, the late WBro Joe Stannett, made sure his candidate understood what Masonry was about, proposed Gary into Janus Lodge No 4456 in 1987, encouraged him to attend Lodge of Instruction, became his mentor and guided Gary forward. "Joe was old-school - even his wife did not know there was a blue book until I told her," said Gary. If WBro Joe could look down from Grand Lodge Above he would have every reason to be proud of his protégé.

Janus Lodge is tee-total, and still is, but in 1995 when Gary was Worshipful Master a vote was proposed in open Lodge for this to end. The vote could have gone either way but, being in the Chair, Gary had the casting vote and thought long and hard as to which way he would cast, if necessary, but it did not come to that as the ratio was 5:1 to remain. The only casting Gary now enjoys is when freshwater fishing if time permits. Gary and Gill are also the Festival Secretaries of Janus Lodge so are busy planning the next Ladies Festival at Five Lakes Resort for Saturday 20th November 2021 at which all are welcome.

Other Masonic highlights include: his Royal Arch (RA) exaltation into Danehurst Chapter No 4541 also in 1995, where he has since been Ist Principal three times; becoming a Provincial Grand Steward when E Comp Paul Reeves was responsible for the RA Stewards and his Craft promotion to Past Provincial Assistant Grand Registrar in 2001. Gary's advice to any newly initiated Brother or exalted Companion is to enjoy becoming a member and do what you can without over stretching.

Gary understood there were two nominations for PGA when he received a call from the Provincial Grand Secretary, Phil Lovelock, asking if he would accept the appointment if it were offered him and he was delighted three weeks later to receive confirmation of his promotion. With the experience of being the Deputy PGA for the last five years Gary is well qualified to take on the challenges ahead, the biggest of which he sees as making sure we do not lose too many members as we return to the new normal. "Everyone in the PGA Team will be encouraging all Almoners to establish how Lodge and Chapter members have managed during the pandemic and whether we can provide more support as we return to meetings".

Gary explained that through the 'Call to Action' campaign, which ran from March 2020 to the end of June 2021, the Province had made 380 grants so far totalling over £73,000 to Essex Masons and widows and then directed them to the Masonic Charitable Association (MCA) for longer term support, adding "My grateful thanks go to the 159 brethren who donated over £77,500. Of course, we are continuing with new claims but not under the 'Call to Action' banner."

Loyalty is important to Gary who recalls joining Paul Cohen's PGA team in July 2015 and was the newest member of the team when Nick Clarke became PGA, so he immediately agreed to stay on the team to help. Born in Romford in 1955, Gary joined Midland Bank before it became part of HSBC. Having specialised in IT he held a number of senior project management roles in the IT department looking after non-UK clients during his 40 years at the bank.

This financial project management experience has proved valuable for his favourite charity since it was registered in March 2019. Because of suffering and loss in the family he has donated to cancer research but Gary is a huge supporter of the Essex Provincial Almoners Fund (EPAF), pointing out that it exists to help all Essex Masons, their dependants and widows. He said "We aim to give relief to those suffering with health or financial problems, often within 24 hours of a request. Just £100 from each Lodge in the Province every year would help make such a significant difference to so many Brethren in their hour of need." The Provincial Grand Master (PGM) Designate, Paul Tarrant joined the recent EPAF Annual General Meeting.

The Assistant Provincial Grand Master (APGM) on the Provincial Executive Team with responsibility for Welfare which includes the PGA and his team is Tony White. Gary is looking forward to getting to know Tony better whilst working hard for Essex to have one of the most successful PGA teams in the UGLE. Gary's definition of success is "Achieving what you aim to do" and in his own words Gary wants to prove success by:



- The continued support of the PGA team to help our Almoners deliver our messages enabling the right levels of care and support to their brethren and widows
- Seeing the continued growth of the numbers attending our major events our Almoners Conferences, Training Workshops and Men's Health Days
- Our reputation as a team to be held in high esteem by all Essex Masons.

The PGA team consists of 20 Officers: Deputy PGA: Ray Heathfield; Finance: John Mansfield; Communications and Equipment: Chris Lee; Social Welfare: Gary Neilson; Men's Health: George Young; Almoner Grants Officers (AGOs): George Young, Phil Bruce, Peter Thorpe, Keith Wheatcroft, Jim Wheeler, Stewart Topley, Andy Jones, Alan Jory, Paul Cash and Paul Hacker; Almoner Liaison Officers (ALOs): Ray Heathfield, John Engledew, Glenn Mayes, Steve Drury, John Mansfield, Stephen Cochrane and John Hardisty. Any Brother can call Gary if they would like to go on the reserve list for when a vacancy occurs.

The first major success for Gary and the team was the virtual on-line Almoners Conference held on 6th May 2021 with 182 attendees. During his introduction the DepPGM in Charge, Paul Reeves, surprised many by saying that he had become an Almoner in two Lodges since becoming DepPGM and "never realised how busy the role is". Jade Gibson and Agnieszka MacDonald talked about Prince Edward Duke of Kent Court. Jade recently wrote "We would like to thank Gary for his invitation to present at such a fantastic virtual event. We have had a huge influx in enquiries as a result and to date have admitted, or plan to admit, eight new residents as a direct result of the Conference."

Looking ahead there are a number of other projects and events set in place.

- With between 40 to 50 changes of Lodge Almoners every year, it seems sensible to hold the Almoners Conference bi-annually alternating with the three Training Workshops held in the north, south and central areas of the Province.
- The one-to-one visits by the AGOs on behalf of the MCF, which were suspended during lockdown and handled remotely by MCF staff, are likely to resume soon which will relieve the MCF of this additional burden. The aim is for all applications to the MCF to have a decision within 40 days of the AGO submitting the paperwork.
- Following the successful project overseen by Gary Neilson, most of the 120 plus widows in 2020 have now been 'adopted' by Lodges and other Provinces. Gary would like to hear from the Almoner of any Lodge which feels it can help with a placement or two for the current 21 unattached widows.

With concerns that the pandemic has prevented many from getting their health checked at local surgeries and clinics, a special Men's Health Day has been arranged for Wednesday 27th October 2021 at the Essex County Cricket Ground, Chelmsford. This includes a CHAPS, the Men's Health Charity, PSA test plus four other health tests all for free, as the Essex Freemasons Community Fund (EFCF) is sponsoring up to 400 tests which usually cost £20 each. Brethren are encouraged to bring along non-masonic family members and friends who will be entitled to the free tests as well. There will be donation buckets and the

funds collected in them will be given to the EFCF. Booking will only be available on-line about one month before.

If there is one thing which Gary would like to accomplish in the next year it is to save a Lodge. Ray Heathfield and over 30 others have indicated their support for a Lodge in difficulty by making it a Lodge for all past and present Provincial, Lodge, Chapter and Deputy Almoners. The details are being worked on with possibly three meetings a year at different centres. In addition to the Installation meeting, two other meetings would have lectures of interest to Almoners from both masonic and non-masonic guest speakers.

Gary believes that although the people in Freemasonry have changed over the years, the majority of the membership is content with the way ahead and that every Lodge should now consider having a Deputy Almoner. This is not an Office but a valuable role in which younger members can assist now and be ready to take over when their Lodge Almoner steps down. Such experience will help them learn and develop the necessary skills to identify those less fortunate than ourselves, provide them with pastoral care to deliver relief from loneliness, suffering and need whilst treating them with humility, confidentiality and compassion.

Being very approachable, Gary is happy to talk with any prospective Deputy Almoner about this new role which has the support of both UGLE and the Province which selected him to be their new Provincial Grand Almoner. Chosen not only because he has the necessary experience and skills to do the job but because he also has built-up a proven track record over many years which clearly demonstrates that 'Eight days a week is not enough for Gary Hostler to show he cares'.

The money donated by Essex Mark Masons allowed the charity to purchase a new activity table for the children's cancer ward at Broomfield hospital, it will also allow them to keep it stocked for a whole year. The £29,600 donated by the Mark Benevolent Fund enables the Charity to restock all 74 trolleys in 43 hospitals throughout the country, for the whole of 2021.

Also in attendance was Donna Byrne the charity Development Officer. Donna commented that after needing to sit down when she heard the news of the MBF grant, she was so overcome with emotion that she began to tremble and cry, however when the trembling subsided, the tears gave way to the biggest smile, Donna explained how that day brought something that will stay with her for a long time to come. Donna went on to say

"Just how many smiles this news will bring, who knows. These two donations mean that every single hospital ward that we support is now secure for their trolley stock refills for a whole year. For me, I know it was the highlight of the year and has definitely put a different spin on the awful year of 2020, the year when Essex Mark Master Masons first made contact".

Mark Masons in Essex Donate £45,000 to Festival 2022





At the June meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of Essex, the Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro Terence D. Sheern, presented a "virtual" cheque in the sum of £11,000 to Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge, who himself is a Mark Master Mason in Essex. This brought the total contribution from Essex Mark to Festival Essex 2022 to the magnificent sum of £45,000!

After the Craft and Royal Arch, the Mark Degree is the third largest and one of the most popular degrees in Freemasonry, containing some 1500 Mark Lodges in the English Constitution with Essex being one of the largest Provinces, comprising 50 Mark Lodges with almost 1300 subscriptions and 39 Royal Ark Mariner Lodges with over 900 subscribing members.

The Mark Benevolent Fund is the main charity of the order, with the Essex MBF having local responsibility. The Essex fund has donated to many local charities and good causes, including our own "Meals on Wheels" campaign. Currently we are processing up to £50,000 of donations to local hospices in recognition of the late Duke of Edinburgh's lifetime of service.

Known as "the friendly degree", all Master Masons are eligible to join. The Degree is slightly less formal than The Craft and there is no doubt that among Mark Master Masons you will ever find friends.

Like Craft Freemasonry, the Mark Degree conveys moral and ethical lessons using ritual based around the building of King Solomon's Temple.

Initiation into the Mark Degree is termed as "Advancement" and, in a chronological sense, the ceremony follows that of the second degree in Craft - the Fellow Craft.

The Ceremony of Advancement follows the fate of an ambitious Fellow Craft seeking promotion in his trade by demonstrating his skill and ability and each candidate, is provided with a mark peculiar to himself. This mark enables the Overseers (or Mark Masters) to identify the work.

It is a wonderful ceremony containing elements of drama and humour, and, above all, strong moral lessons.

Halstead Day Centre DONATION

The Halstead Day Centre has thanked Joshua Nunn Lodge, and Freemasons in general, for their continued support and generosity over the past few challenging months as it continues to drive on with its effort to provide independent living for people over 60 who are isolated.

Joshua Nunn Lodge 2154 has donated £1500 to The Halstead Day Centre so far this year, including a £500 match funding from the Province of Essex. W.Bro Braham Djidjelli (Worshipful Master) and W.Bro Jim Gage (Charity Steward) made the most recent donation on behalf of the members on 28th April, which was gratefully received by Veronica Harman (Centre Manager).

Many of the beneficiaries who receive assistance from the centre are completely unaware of what is happening in the outside world and are therefore finding it a very confusing and lonely time.

The centre offers a friendly environment for people to socialise and be included in a range of low intensity services that reduce isolation and encourage activities that promote physical, mental and emotional well-being while maintaining a degree of independence in their own home for longer. Their services include transport, daily movement to music classes, shopping, bathing, board & card games, debates, speakers, bingo, craft and a two course lunch and beverages during the day.

During her thanks to Joshua Nunn, Veronica said "This is really, really kind of the Freemasons. The centre has not received any special financial support from the government during the pandemic and is working with a skeleton staff due to restrictions. Of our team of 8 staff and 30 volunteers, only 4 are allowed on site at any one time. This really helps and reminds us there are good local people out there."



Members of Orsett Lodge have raised funds to purchase goods for the NHS nurses, who are currently working with PPE during this pandemic. We were able to supply energy drinks and energy bars for nurses on Covid wards as they are suffering from fatigue due to the long hours.

Along with hand cream, moisturiser, and lip balm due to the cracking of hands and lips due to the constant use of sanitizer, and the wearing of gloves and mask.

Along with a £100 donation from Costco West Thurrock we were able to supply 280 care packages to nurses and staff at our local hospitals, with 2 wards at Orsett, all wards at Basildon and 2 wards at Brentwood hospital.

Hamilton Court's East End Centurion



It seems that throughout life, we always seem to enjoy the number 100 and celebrate it whenever it appears. Things like, a century in cricket, a centennial lodge meeting, a birthday of course and indeed any aspect of life which involves this magic number.

At Hamilton Court we recently had our own opportunity to celebrate this inspiring number when one of our residents, Lily, attained her 100th birthday and I had the pleasure of spending an hour with Lily learning about her interesting life. The occasion was marked by a small gathering of friends and family in the resident's lounge at Hamilton Court (in line with restrictions of course) where Lily has lived since 2003 and also with a visit from, VW. Bro. Paul Reeves (Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge). Paul presented Lily with some flowers and best wishes from Essex Freemasons. Lily thought it was wonderful that "The Mayor" had interrupted his busy schedule to wish her a happy birthday.

Lilly was born in April of 1921, in Custom House, London, E16, at a time when the country was still recovering from the devastation and privations of the First World War. Lily's mother (Mary) and father (Frederick) lived with Lily and her six siblings, four brothers and two sisters who made a fuss of their youngest sister. The family home was a large Georgian house in Custom House where Frederick was a crane driver in the docks. Lily recalls that Sundays were mostly spent in church and she would attend her father's Catholic church in the morning and her mother's protestant church in the afternoon. Sadly, Lily's mother died prematurely at the age of 44 when Lily was only 9 years old but she remembers with great pride how her father continued to bring all of the children up on his own.

The family continued to live in E16 for a while but eventually moved to Becton to a smaller house where she lived until she married Henry in 1941. Henry was away in the navy for the duration of the Second World War and he arrange for Lily to go to live in Abingdon, Oxfordshire to escape the blitz. Lily recalls, "I landed a plum job there working for the Air Ministry". After the war, Lily returned to live in Ilford, Essex, where Henry and Lily were blessed with two sons, Michael and Russell and Lily took up another "plumb" job working for Ind Coupe Brewery in Romford. Eventually, the two boys off hand, Lily and Henry moved to a large bungalow in South Woodham Ferrers which she remembers fondly. However, after Henry's death, the bungalow became too much for Lily to manage and her brother, Victor, who belonged to a lodge in Barking, told lily of the Masonic Housing flats in South Woodham Ferrers and in 2003 Lily moved in to her "delightful" little flat (one of forty four) overlooking the gardens.

Lily says she felt at home immediately and was delighted with her new home and she relished the companionship of the other residents and the security felt by having an onsite warden present should those unexpected things in life occur. In those early days, Lily said she was more able to join in with the social life at Hamilton Court organized by the residents and the committee and she attend outings and events regularly but these days her attendance is not so frequent although Lily still tries to put in an appearance in the resident's lounge for the Christmas party.

We wish you many happy returns Lily and it has been a delight to have had you amongst us for so many years and to continue to be of service to you. God bless.

He lived respected and died regretted

A birthday card from H M The Queen is always a momentous occasion for any centenarian and on 25th March this year W.Bro. Clifford Barry Wyatt celebrated his 100th birthday. A splendid accolade for such a dedicated and highly respected Freemason.

Sadly, he was not able to enjoy the euphoria for long as he passed to the Grand Lodge above on 25th June 2021

Cliff grew up in Southend and was initially educated at a local private school before progressing to Southend High School for Boys in 1931 and he left when he was in the 6th form in 1938. His father also taught at the same school from 1921. Cliff enjoyed reminiscing about his time there when he had to buy his own text books (at £3.10s per term) and lunch with dessert which cost 11d! The food was not very appetising so together with some other boys he used to abscond to Garons nearby, where it was cheaper too!

On leaving school, Cliff was mobilised into the RAF as a Sergeant Pilot and while there he had a flying accident. After failing a 'height test' he was sent on a six week 'Air Ministry Inspection Directorate' (AID) course in London. Later, he started work at Short Bros at Rochester where they made flying boats. While there he met his wife Ethel and they were married in 1945.

It was always Cliff's vocation to teach, so after the war he embarked on two years of study at Cheltenham College. His first teaching post was at Shoeburyness High School for 2 years and then in 1951 he joined the teaching staff at his old school. During his stay there he was appointed the first teacher/governor and he eventually retired in 1981 after 30 years of service.

Cliff always had quite an impressive memory and could still recall the names of notable members of staff and some (well known) Essex masons he taught at that school including one pupil who failed all his exams! After retirement, Cliff obtained a City & Guilds Certificate in computing at Southend College.

Up until his sad passing, Cliff was virtually housebound in his bungalow at Thorpe Bay. He was cared for by his devoted wife, Ethel. They had been married for 76 years and have one son, Richard who was born in 1950. Earlier in his life Cliff enjoyed many interests including cricket, hockey, golf and bowls. He had been a keen member of Rotary and Probus.

Cliff's masonic life spanned 77 years and he had been a Grand Officer for 46 years. He was initiated into Old Southendian Lodge No. 5403 on 17th November 1944 at the Palace Hotel in Southend. All three ceremonies were conducted as doubles with his father Billy. He was Master of the Lodge in 1961 and 1992 and he was Secretary for two periods totalling 26 years. In 1969 he was appointed to the acting ranks of ProvSGD, progressing to ProvJGW in 1988. In the Royal Arch, he was exalted in Old Southendian Chapter No. 5403 in 1958, First Principal in 1964 and was again appointed to the acting rank of ProvGSoj in 1969, progressing to PPGSN in 1978. He was made an Honorary Member of both his Lodge and Chapter in 2012 and 2014 respectively.

Cliff was also a member of Essex Masters Lodge No. 3256 and Southend Daylight Lodge No. 9723. During his lifetime, he had proposed 18 candidates into Freemasonry. That must be a record!

In recognition of his distinguished service to Freemasonry, he was awarded Grand Rank in both the Craft and Royal Arch. In 1975, at the young age of 54 years, he was appointed PAGDC in the Craft and promoted to PJGD in 1985. In the Royal Arch he was appointed PGStB in 1988. Those worthy appointments were topped by him receiving the prestigious award for Distinguished Service to Essex Masonry (DSEM) in 2009 and final promotion to PPSGW.

Cliff had an impressive knowledge of masonic history and was an enthusiastic researcher. He prepared and gave many lectures on subjects of interest to Lodges throughout Essex. He was a Founder of the Southend Masonic Study Circle and its President for many years. He was actively involved on the Board of Directors of Southend Temple in Woodgrange Drive.

Cliff's contribution to Freemasonry enlightened the lives of many and inspired countless junior brethren in their pursuit of masonic education. It was a magnificent achievement of reaching a century and he just made it! He lived respected and died regretted. By Terry Lockhart PJGD

Congratulations to Villerica Lodge No 4053

The February meeting is always a special occasion for the Brethren of Villerica Lodge No 4053. It is the Installation Meeting. As is the custom in Masonic Lodges, at the Installation Festive Board, all the Brethren look forward to singing the 'Master's Song' and raising their glass to toast the Worshipful Master for the ensuing year. This year's February meeting would have been even more special as Villerica was Consecrated in the Grecian Temple at the Abercorn Rooms of the Great Eastern Hotel by the RW the Provincial Grand Master of Essex Lord Lambourne on 19th February 1921.

Together with those Essex Freemasons whose Lodges and Chapters should have commemorated their Centennials during the last 12 months, Villerica Brethren must wait until time and circumstances permit such celebrations to be restored. During this time, they will no doubt reflect that 102 years ago some of the Founders were talking on Billericay Station with one saying that he remembered a Vicar who once said Billericay was derived from the Latin 'Villerica' meaning 'Clean Town' and so the name was adopted. The Lodge now meets at Hutton Masonic Hall.

> Whether it is a potential new candidate or an experienced Brother, fortunate enough to attend the postponed Centennial celebrations, both will find Villerica to be a typical Masonic Lodge with about 40 members where the rich, the poor and those in-between, meet together, use the same idioms, abide by the same etiquette, eat, drink and joke together, all united in a sincere love of Freemasonry and its three grand Principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

> > This is exemplified through one Villerica Lodge member who was awarded a C.B.E. on the same day in 1958 as a certain Matthew Busby (of Manchester United and England fame). George Frederick Chaplin was born in 1900 and Initiated in 1929. After being the Worshipful Master of the Lodge, Almoner and Treasurer, he was installed as an Assistant Provincial Grand Master in 1957. Serving the Community as a JP, a Deputy Lieutenant and an Alderman, W Bro Chaplin also proposed Malcolm, his son, into the Lodge and

devoted his life to the people of Essex. He became a Chairman of Essex County Council and was Knighted in 1962. The late W.Bro Chaplin may now be looking down from Grand Lodge above and wishing the day may soon come for all the Brethren of Villerica Lodge to celebrate their Centennial whilst joining all of the present Provincial Leadership Team and every Essex Freemason in congratulating Villerica Lodge No 4053 on reaching their Centenary.

Essex Freemasons make the right move for CHESS



W.Bro Mark Jones and Bro. Graham Cornell made a delivery of bottled water, snacks, soft drinks, treats, toiletries and items of clothing to the C.H.E.S.S centre in Chelmsford. These items where donated by the brethren of The Wheel of Fellowship Lodge 9016 in Maldon, Essex.

Barbara Buxton the manageress of the C.H.E.S.S centre in Chelmsford was waiting outside to greet W.Bro Mark Jones and Bro. Graham Cornell who presented Barbara with the donations She thanked the Brethren and explained that the outreach service covers Brentwood Chelmsford, Braintree Maldon and Rochford. The donated gifts are distributed by volunteers and are much appreciated by the homeless people.



CHESS has several facets, but the overall goal is to help people move on in a positive way with their life. CHESS is about change, about supporting someone to identity and resolve issues that have caused homelessness. Usually this involves not only the immediate issue that led to homelessness but factors prior that have caused issues for the person. They therefore take a holistic approach when working with someone and look at all areas of like not just housing.

They will go and see someone who has been referred through Streetlink to see what help and support they need. It might be initially practical issues like food / water / sleeping bag / tent / local services that are available but also identifying what support is needed. This maybe accessing emergency accommodation, helping access longer term accommodation and support services. The accommodation is initially for 3 nights to get the person off the street and then renewed for up to a month whilst seeking more suitable accommodation whilst they work with people intensively. This may be within the CHESS shelter or outside us if appropriate. They have a 9-bedroom initial property and a 3 bed for those entering CHESS through the Outreach team both of which have been opened during the pandemic.

They have a shelter (the original one opened in 1996) which was only at night but since we reopened in November 2020 (they were shut down at the end of March as a result of the pandemic) they have opened on a 24/7 basis with staff on site providing help and support to residents plus acting as an on-call facility to their move on houses. The shelter provides an initial stay of 28 days whilst they get to know someone and identify the issues that need to be addressed. They did have 9 residents but as a result of the pandemic they have had to reduce this to 4 as they were only allowed to reopen with a bathroom per person and we only have 4. We are currently looking at ways to get the numbers back up. They have however got 7 other move on houses accommodating up to 34 people where residents move onto from the Shelter / Outreach whilst they are addressing their issues and pending more permanent accommodation.

Two of the 7 houses (8 additional beds) have been added since the pandemic started to help offset the reduction in beds at the shelter and expand capacity. We usually have volunteers helping at the shelter but this has been suspended in the current circumstances.

Families on brink of famine in South Sudan receive emergency support funded by Essex Freemasons

Hundreds of families on the brink of famine in South Sudan will be receiving emergency support thanks to a grant of £35,000 from the Freemasons to Plan International UK.

Freemasonry, through the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) and Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF), is responding with Plan International to support communities at this critical time. £35,000 is enough to provide cooking kits to 525 families. Plan International is on the ground in Pibor, one of the worst affected regions, delivering vital programmes for nutrition, education, livelihoods, and child protection.

The UN has described South Sudan's food crisis as its "worst on record", with children and communities facing multiple threats at once. Late last year, heavy flooding affected over a million people in the country, destroying homes, devastating livelihoods and displacing thousands of children and their families. On top of this communities are still reeling from the pandemic, as well as political upheavals, escalating conflict and a stagnating economy.

With the country in the middle of its 'lean season' - the time between harvests when households run out of stored food - there is now a critical window to prevent the onset of famine. Lasting from March until August, the lean season will see 7.2 million, or 60 per cent of the population, pushed into extreme hunger. 1.4 million children under the age of five and almost 500,000 pregnant and lactating women are expected to be left severely malnourished. It is crucial that aid reaches these communities before the floods come again, further hindering access to support for some of the world's most vulnerable children.

Essex Freemasons contributed to the grant, from the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales

Rose Caldwell, Chief Executive of Plan International UK, said:

"We're very grateful for this generous grant which will allow Plan International to reach families and young children in those parts of South Sudan most badly hit by the food crisis. It's critical that we act now to distribute food and other vital support to those most at risk"

VW.Bro. Paul Reeves, Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge said:

"I'm very pleased we've been able to help Plan International, who are distributing food to the most vulnerable families and children in South Sudan. This is a desperate situation and Plan International and the other organisations helping on the ground need all the help and support we can offer."

Essex Freemasons have donated £31,000 to St Helena Hospice to help it to better reach and provide end of life support for patients and families living in deprived communities in Colchester and Tendring.

The money, donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemasons own charity, will be primarily aimed at reaching communities who do not traditionally access hospice care, including those from Black, Asian and minority ethnic communities (BAME) and deprived communities.

There has historically been a lack of understanding of how hospice services need to adapt in order to meet the cultural needs of all communities they serve. This project will enable connections to be strengthened and the grant will help fund initiatives to explain what end of life support means and how help is available to cope with issues around death and dying.

Nicola Button, Head of Partnerships at St Helena, explained: "Through the collaborative work with colleagues at Community 360 and CVS Tendring, we have identified the number of patients from BAME and deprived communities accessing end of life support is lower than other sectors of the community.

"We need to address this matter and improve outcomes for people living in communities who do not traditionally access hospice care. This means working with community leaders and healthcare professionals to ensure they are more aware of the support we can offer; whilst also looking at ways in which the hospice must adapt to meet the needs of the whole community. This grant from Essex Freemasons will enable us to do this."

This project demonstrates true collaboration: St Helena is working in partnership with Community 360, CVS Tendring and the Essex Faith Covenant. Two Social Prescribers will be employed, one in each geographic area and their role will be to work specifically within local communities, supporting families and their carers at end of life.

St Helena Hospice provides specialist palliative and end of life care to local people facing incurable illness in north east Essex, supporting them, their families, friends and carers at home, over the phone via a 24/7 advice line and at the hospice in Colchester. It also help adults in north and mid Essex to cope with grief following the death of a loved one, regardless of where or how they died.

Peter Hollingsworth, Assistant Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons, commented: "Our members have traditionally supported hospices in every part of the county for many years and we are delighted that once again we can make a difference for St Helena and the people of Colchester and Tendring.

"Freemasons are very much part of the local community and this is another way of saying thank you to the team at St Helena who do so much good work. We wish them every success with this latest initiative and are glad that this grant has made a difference."

The £31,000 to St Helena is part of a £450,000 package of support for hospices across the country from the Masonic Charitable Foundation. Of that total, some £100,000 has been awarded to the hospice movement in Essex.
