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
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W.Bro Paul William Tarrant Investiture



Born in Leigh-on-Sea in 1954, Paul Tarrant became a Freemason in 1983, having been proposed by a close friend, David Badger, from the Little Theatre Club in Westcliff. He joined the Lodge of Fraternity No 5916, which now meets at Saxon Hall in Southend, and became the Master of the Lodge in 1994. Educated at Westcliff High School and Southend College of Technology, where he gained a diploma in Business, Paul has had a distinguished career working for Racal Electronics, HM Customs and Excise and the Department for Environment and Rural Affairs (DEFRA).

Describing his biggest personal success as meeting Jenny, his wife, with music, theatre and the arts playing an important part in their lives. Whilst at the Rug Opera in Southend they helped raise over £80,000 for charity. Paul has also been the South Essex representative of the National Operatic and Dramatic Association and served as a Trustee of the Freda Parry Scholarship Fund helping young people follow a career in singing. With a keen interest in conservation, they are also supporters of the RSPB and Wildlife Trusts and enjoy walking three to four miles each day.



This new appointment as the twentieth PGM for Essex comes at a pivotal time as public perception has changed favourably over the last year or so towards Freemasonry. Positive local press includes Essex Masons winning the 2020 Pride of Essex Awards and now "Engaging with the Community" in partnership with Braintree Museum is one of the most recent. Paul is determined to build on this positivity and attract more members not only to enjoy the friendship Freemasonry offers but also to help with all the charitable works and good causes in Essex which the Freemasons support. Over £7 million has been pledged by the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemasons charity, for Essex alone.





Paul Tarrant explained "We are all in together with a wide-range of different beliefs and religions. Since the Age of Enlightenment, Freemasonry has never become a melting-pot producing one religion, as some people think, and it never will. It is a wonderful organisation in which every member has a healthy respect for each other. Being a member of Freemasonry is the best decision made in all my years. I have never been ambitious. I simply love seeing members enjoying themselves with a focus on charity, which is a good thing". David Badger said "I'm sure that the Brethren of Essex will see more clearly what a great choice has been made, and that's not just because he is my friend. I'm certain Paul Tarrant will be remembered as one of the great Provincial Grand Masters of our time".


Daniel Broyd also explained how the new Members' Pathway is successfully progressing in Essex and elucidated the key messages of:

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Young cancer patients across Essex

'we have your back'

Six-year-old Chloe Chandler from Little Dunmow has courage stamped through every inch of her young body. From the age of two she has been fighting a rare form of cancer, a debilitating disease which has caused painful lesions to form on her spine and every part of her skeleton – and that battle is still not over.

Chloe, a pupil at Fitch Green Academy, is facing another year of intensive treatment and during that time she will spend many days and weeks just sitting in a hospital bed in common with hundreds of other young people from across Essex.

It is the boredom and the mental anguish of being away from home that makes fighting disease even harder, but that's about to change at all five of our major hospitals across the county thanks to a ground-breaking initiative by Essex based the Lennox Children's Cancer Fund and Essex Freemasons.

Hundreds of young people facing their own personal challenges with life changing diseases and receiving treatment at our major hospitals in Colchester, Chelmsford, Basildon, Southend and Romford will now receive back packs from the Charity, valued at around £100 each and loaded with everything they need to make their stay a little easier and slightly less stressful

Essex Freemasons have provided some £23,000 in grant funding to ensure that the service can be maintained for at least the next two years.

Vicky Nash, Family Support Officer for the Lennox Children's Cancer Fund, commented: "When children are diagnosed with cancer, they are often immediately whisked from their local hospital to their nearest Principal Treatment Centre. This happens so quickly that they and the parents are totally unprepared for what happens next which means they have understandably failed to bring with them essentials such as toothpaste and toiletries and much more."

"In many cases the children and parents will be in hospital for a long time and with Covid restrictions there is little or no access to community areas making it more, mentally challenging for young people and their families. Our 'We have you back' packs are designed to help overcome those problems – ensuring that the child patients and their parents have the essentials they need and something to do to beat the boredom."

The 'We have your back' packs are loaded with dozens of items from drink containers to board games, from colouring books and journals to luxury blankets, socks, gloves, headphones, chargers and much more. According to Chloe's mum Victoria they have will really make a difference, helping to change lives of young cancer patients for the better.

"Essex Freemasons and our 8,000 members are very much part of the diverse local community which is why we were pleased to support this initiative which will be operating at all of the major hospitals across the county," said Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons.

"The Lennox Children's Cancer Fund are doing some wonderful work and I am delighted that between us we will making lives easier for hundreds of local youngsters faced with fighting this dreadful disease."





Wivenhoe Masonic Hall Celebration Meeting

A Special Meeting at Wivenhoe Masonic Hall

Wivenhoe, mentioned in the Domesday Book in 1086, on the banks of the River Colne has a rich maritime and Masonic heritage. The Essex County Standard in October 1893 describes the interest, excitement and how the town and shipyards were gaily decorated with bunting and a large crowd gathered at the railway station to greet the distinguished guests for the Consecration of Colne Lodge, the first in the town.

Just 28 years later, on 17th October 1911, Wivenhoe had its own new Masonic Hall. The then Deputy Provincial Grand Master (DepProvGM), His Honour Judge Frederick Philbrick QC, was the guest of honour at the first meeting. One hundred and ten years later on 29th September 2021 at the same Hall, a Celebration Meeting was held and the guest of honour was the incumbent DepProvGM, Nick Franklin.

This special occasion was a cluster meeting of Colne Lodge No 2477 and Ostrea Lodge No 8209 to celebrate having taken advantage of the cessation of meetings during the pandemic to carry out an extensive refurbishment of the Masonic Hall including work to the inside of the roof, new insulation, re-installation of the lighting system, the secretary's and treasurer's table, honours boards for other Lodges, the pillars and re-painting throughout.

Nick Franklin was accompanied by Tony White, an Assistant Provincial Grand Master (APGM) and several Provincial Officers including Geoff Turpin, the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies (ProvGDC), Paul Thurgood, the Deputy Grand Sword Bearer (ProvDepGSwdB), a Provincial Senior and Junior Grand Deacon and two Provincial Grand Standard Bearers. The Brethren were treated to a presentation by Colne Lodge Secretary Bob Needham entitled "The Establishing of Wivenhoe Masonic Hall" followed with an illustrated presentation by Paul Fell, the Secretary of Ostrea Lodge entitled "The Refurbishment of Wivenhoe Masonic Hall". Paul also commented "it was the first full meeting for the two Craft Lodges since lockdown ended and everyone had a wonderful time"

Many of the Brethren had undertaken much of the work themselves and were praised by the DepProvGM who said he "was very impressed with what had been done especially as it was all completed within budget". Nick surprised and delighted everyone by quoting a poignant piece about "a mighty Masonic structure within whose precincts we stand today" as written in the booklet 'Colne Lodge First 100 years 1893 to 1993'. The DepProvGM was presented with a £1,000 donation by Colne Lodge to the Essex 2022 Festival for the Masonic Charitable Foundation which has pledged £7 million to help charities and good causes in Essex.





well-known secret about Freemasonry is that as well as maintaining their own premises, numerous local charities are helped by Essex Freemasons volunteering their time, equipment and skills to refurbish or enhance facilities at buildings which charities use. With skilled craftsmen such as Bob Needham, who is proud of his paintwork, and Paul Fell, who is slightly biased towards his attention to detail on ornamental work, it is beyond doubt that Freemasonry in Essex has a lot to offer those who enjoy volunteering, doing charitable work and supporting good causes.



ew state of the art CCTV cameras will ensure that eyes will always be on the sea looking out for people in distress and saving lives around the Canvey coastline, thanks to a series of grants from Essex Freemasons.

The money, totalling some £3,600, has been donated to the Coastwatch charity situated in the grounds of Canvey Island Yacht Club. It is one of the busiest areas in the country for call outs to rescue people in difficulty, which means that CCTV has become a vital tool to assist volunteers on the ground.

Grahame Harris, Station Manager at the Canvey HQ, explained: "Because of the tidal situation which can catch out unwary visitors and the large numbers who enjoy being on the sea the Coastguard record more incidents around the Canvey and Southend area establishing the Southend RNLI Station as the busiest in the country."

"This is why we needed to install CCTV to ensure that we always had eyes out to sea to provide a record of incidents and ensure that rescue teams can reach those in distress as quickly as possible. This is why the money from Essex Freemasons will make such a difference."

The £3,600 needed to fund the new TV system was made up from donations from St Katharines Chapter which meets at Rochford, a direct grant from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund and additional donations from St. Katharine's Lodge and from Counos Lodge which meets at Southend.

"One of the members of St. Katharine's Lodge, Bill Blissett, is a volunteer at Coastwatch, Canvey," said Keith Frost, Charity Steward for St Katharines Chapter. "He told us of the need to raise money to pay for new CCTV equipment and once we knew how it would be used, our members were pleased to authorise a donation."

Members of St Katharine's Chapter and Lodge and Counos, together with other senior Essex Freemasons turned out in force to see how the money had been spent and the difference the new CCTC system will make. Charity Freemasons Challenge

W.Bro. Andy Mapperson who is one of the founders of the Wheel of Fellowship Lodge 9016 in Maldon is part of the 3 man Committee of THE FREEMASONS CHALLENGE, who are organising the whole event with the assistance of the University Scheme Reps and hope to culminate the walk at the Quarterly Communication on September 8th when the David Kenneth Williamson Cup (DKW) will be taken into the meeting by a group of University students. They are raising money for the Duke of Edinburgh

It is an open event and they have already had lady Freemasons take part and Sir David Wotton did one of the legs over a week-end.

The Objectives of the Challenge are

- To promote Freemasonry
- To promote engagement and fraternity between Scheme lodges
- To raise charitable donations through sponsorship during the journey all donations will go to the Duke of Edinburgh Memorial Fund

The Challenge will start and finish at Great Queen Street and be completed between the Quarterly Communication meetings in June (original date) and September. It will take the form of teams from each lodge carrying a replica of the DKW Trophy – a trophy claimed by one Scheme lodge visiting another – from the centre where it meets to the next nearest Scheme lodge. The Cup will be passed on in turn until the centres of all Scheme lodges in England and Wales have been visited, a total distance of over 2021 miles.

The DKW Cup arrived from Norwich to Wivenhoe Masonic Hall on the 28th August where Ostrea Lodge 8209 received the Cup. From there, on the 29th August the cup was taken to Chelmsford Masonic where many Essex Brethren from Ostrea Lodge (Wivenhoe Masonic Hall), Wheel of Fellowship Lodge 9016 and Lodge of St. Peter 1024 (Maldon) joined in the walk at Hatfield Perveral/ Boreham. Once we arrived at the Chelmsford Masonic Hall we were welcomed and received by the Deputy Assistant Provincial Grand Master in charge, W. Bro. Peter Hollingsworth PSGD where the cup was handed to the Secretary of Boswell Lodge 7759.





Freemasons Donate £1140 to Maldon Saints Youth Football Club Defibrillator Appeal Hav



Having seen Maldon Saints YFC appeal for funding to purchase Defibrillators, the Brethren of Mitre Lodge No 9307, (many of whom live in Maldon), decided to donate £500 towards the cost. However, this amount was not sufficient to purchase all that was necessary, so the Secretary of Mitre Lodge asked the Brethren of the Maldon Masonic Lodges if they would join in and also support Maldon Saints YFC with their appeal.

All were pleased to join in, and they were, Lodge of St Peter, Beeleigh Abbey Lodge, Daen Ingas Lodge, Wheel of Fellowship Lodge, Frederick Leistikow Lodge, Coromandel Chapter, Frederick Leistikow Chapter, and Plume Chapter.

The Grand Total was increased from £500 to £1140 which therefore allows Maldon Saints to buy the Portable Defibrilator and the Training for the members who will operate it.

£34,000 grant will give a voice to those with learning disabilities facing end of life care in Basildon and Thurrock colin.felton@essexpgl.org



Essex Freemasons have given £34,000 to St Luke's Hospice in Basildon as part of a ground-breaking initiative to give a voice to those with learning disabilities who are facing end of life decisions affecting them and their families.

The grant, donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF), the Freemasons own charity, will enable the Hospice to work with this vulnerable group and those involved in their care.

Sarah Linzey, Head of wellbeing and information and supportive care services states 'there are more than 30 care homes across the Basildon and Thurrock areas which support people with Learning Disabilities. Taking into account those people living in private homes and apartments, there are potentially large numbers of people unaware of the end of life and palliative care services that can be offered by a Hospice such as St Luke's. The initiative aims to encourage early referral in these situations, working in partnership with staff and agencies involved to help facilitate this.

"We are so very grateful to Essex Freemasons who provided this grant to support this important work," said Sarah. "It is urgently needed for both people with learning disabilities and their parents or carers. Those working with people with learning disabilities, including care home staff, and their carers need support and advice in end-of-life care situations.

"We have had cases where parents or carers have died and the person with a learning disability who is left may struggle with not knowing how to organise a funeral for their loved one. If it is someone with a learning disability facing their own end of life care, they need help and support to make their wishes known."

The £34,000 grant from Essex Freemasons is part of a £100,000 package which has seen support for three Essex Hospices -St Luke's, St Helena in Colchester and Farleigh in Chelmsford, who have all received more than £30,000 each.

"I am delighted that we have been able to make such a difference in the local community," said Lee Taylor, Assistant Provincial Grand Master, after visiting St Luke's new Thurrock Hospice.

"It is important that people with learning disabilities have equitable access to advice, care and support in end of life care and I am confident that St Luke's, by working with individuals and alongside partner agencies in hospital and the community, will help provide this."



Chelmsford Freemasons pledge support for Mencap



reemasons from Chelmsford based Lodge of Integrity have pledged their support for a local charity, City of Chelmsford Mencap, with a £1,000 donation to help it get back on its feet after the COVID pandemic.

The money, £500 directly donated by Lodge members and the balance provided by the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, will help to make up a major shortfall in events income which has resulted in a significant downturn in the services the charity has been able to provide.

Anthony North, Chair of Trustees at City of Chelmsford Mencap, explained: "Local fund-raising events would usually have contributed to the cost of classes every day for up to 30 students with learning difficulties."

"This has not been possible because of Covid and our classes have had to be significantly reduced, with many moving online, which in turn has impacted on what we can do for our 80 plus registered members in the Chelmsford area."

"Like many similar organisations we are still facing restrictions and social distancing measures but cannot wait to get our classes back up to full strength and this donation from the Chelmsford Freemasons will make a huge difference."

Knowing the problems faced by City of Chelmsford Mencap, which is a standalone independent charity, Lodge of Integrity Mason Chris Davy and Charity Steward Ian Weller spoke to their members who immediately agreed to make a donation. This was immediately supported by the Essex Freemasons Community Fund.

Assistant Provincial Grand Master and a Trustee of the Essex Freemasons Community Fund Revd. Martin Howse, commented: "We were delighted to match fund the donation from Lodge of Integrity and support a charity that does so much for the local community and sincerely hope that they will soon be able to operate a full service once again."

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£50,000 grant from Essex Freemasons to help children in hospices,



Advanced technology, helping lifelimited and disabled children using hospice services across Essex to play, communicate and achieve things they never thought possible, has been secured for at least the next four years thanks to a £50,000 grant from Essex Freemasons.

Developed by Lifelites, one of the country's most innovative charities, the grant will help children, many of whom are suffering with complex cognitive and physical impairments with technology which has been described as 'simply magical', giving young people opportunities to join in with the world around them, irrespective of their disabilities.

"This grant will make a massive difference with our work across Essex allowing us to fund the technology needed to enhance the lives of life-limited and disabled children using hospice services," said Simone Enefer-Doy, Chief Executive of Lifelites.

"Essex Freemasons have been a huge supporter of our charity allowing us to provide a wide variety of assistive and inclusive equipment such as virtual reality and sensory tents. Most importantly this technology allows children to communicate, in many cases just by using eye movements."

Essex hospices do not pay a penny towards the equipment and services donated by Lifelites and the charity continues to maintain the complex technology to ensure it is kept in good working order for the children for whom every second counts. The equipment together with ongoing technical support and training at each hospice costs Lifelites around £50,000 over four years and is paid for entirely through donations.

"We have been very aware for some time of the magnificent work carried out by Lifelites," said Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons. "Their work in the community changes lives for children with life-limiting conditions and their families. The technology they donate is awesome and makes such a huge difference which is why we were pleased to make this grant."

The technology and services donated by Lifelites is literally changing lives. It gives children in hospices the opportunity to do so many things that they never thought possible, such as paint a picture, create music, play a game, or communicate with their family – and that service can now continue across Essex until at least 2025.



Men's Health Day



eighteen months of pushbacks due to the pandemic, a determined Essex Freemasons Provincial Almoner's Team partnered with CHAPS, the Men's Health Charity, and the NHS to hold the latest of their health check days. These events have become popular among Freemasons with their families and friends. A range of screens and tests are offered, free of charge, to determine overall personal health status and give help in seeking early treatment should any anomalies be found.



On Wednesday 27th October 2021 at Essex County Cricket Ground in Chelmsford over 300 individual PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) tests were undertaken, 200 combined tests for heart, skin cancer and overall health, plus more than 400 attendees, with over 20% who were not Freemasons, were able to learn about a range of associated issues with health professionals on hand to assist.

Paul Tarrant, the Provincial Grand Master (PGM) of Essex Freemasons, was one of the first to register for the event. On behalf of everyone who attended, Paul conveyed his appreciation to the Provincial Almoner's Team for all their hard work in making sure the event took place and was so successful.

The PGM pointed out "The value of the health checks cannot be under-estimated. The work undertaken by all involved on these important days enables everyone who attends an opportunity to catch any problems early, seek treatment and move on in a positive direction. There is no doubt that these events help ensure that one year ahead some of those who attend will be in a far healthier state than had they not attended. I would urge everyone to go along whenever the opportunity is provided."



Gary Hostler, the Provincial Grand Almoner, added: "It's been a long time coming but I am delighted that the event has gone so well. The success of the day is inspiring and I should like to pay tribute to my Team and especially those who have worked so hard in the build-up and on the day. We must also thank everyone at CHAPS and all the healthcare professionals who partnered with us for their valuable input."

The Essex Men's Health Day 2021 was sponsored by the Essex Freemasons Community Fund with the cost of every PSA test at approximately £20 each being covered by the fund. The Freemasons gave over £51 million in 2020 for charitable and community work and do more than 18 million hours of volunteering each year. Other similar events are being considered for those who were unable to attend on the day and the Provincial Almoner's Team will be in touch with further details when they are available.

ESSEX ROYAL ARCH MASONS GETTING BACK ON TRACK



longside the railway track, a short distance from the famous 'Frinton Gates' level crossing, stands Kirby Masonic Hall which hosted the Installation Convocation of Essex First Principals Chapter No 3256 on Thursday 23rd September 2021. It was the Chapter's first convocation since the lifting of restrictions and an appropriate location to get back on track since the last meeting two years ago.

Tributes were paid to departed Companions, including the late Rodney Bass whose valued support for the Chapter and its work will long be remembered. Proceedings were enhanced with 19 new members joining but as Bruce Mapson, an Assistant to the Provincial Grand Principals (APGP), said "the surprise of the evening was that the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent (MEGS), Paul Tarrant, presented Elliott Chevin with his Patent as the Deputy Grand Superintendent (DepGSupt)".

Following the Installation of David Branch and David Jones as Second and Third Principals, the 89 Companions in attendance watched as their Past First Principal of 1995, Dennis Baum standing in for Frank Sharp who was unable to be present, Installed Richard Mead, according to ancient custom, as the First Principal of the Chapter.

The newly appointed First Principal delivered an oration to the Companions entitled 'Thomas Dunckerley – A Freemason of Great Renown', in which he gave many facts to demonstrate how Thomas Dunckerley (1724-96) was a prime mover in the expansion and development of English Freemasonry. Some interesting analysis was presented pointing out that Dunckerely was a decisive man and capable of acting on his own initiative.

It seems appropriate for such an address to have been given on this occasion for two reasons. Firstly, as explained by Prestonian Lecturer Tony Harvey in the latest edition, Issue 55, of Freemasonry Today, the earliest record of a Royal Arch degree itself in England was when Thomas Dunckerley was made a Royal Arch Mason in Portsmouth in 1754. Secondly, the Grand Superintendent for Essex from 1776 – 1796 was Thomas Dunckerley and his present-day successor, Paul Tarrant, is the 14th to lead the Essex Royal Arch Masons.

As the First Principal of Essex First Principals Chapter, Richard Mead will be a great advocate for Royal Arch Masonry in Essex. He commented "Because Royal Arch Masonry follows on from Craft Initiation, Passing and Raising, the members tend to be more established Masons and because of that are generally more committed. I personally find the ceremonies very impressive and easy to understand. The story following on from the Obligation is very interesting and is a fantastic ceremony to participate in whether as the Candidate, an Officer or as a Principal. In addition, there are three great lectures, which add further to the ceremony of Exaltation".

With so many passionate Companions in Essex, such as Paul Tarrant, Elliott Chevin and Richard Mead, it looks like the 4,200 Royal Arch Masons of the 120 Chapters which meet at 25 Centres in the Province did 'Get Ready' and are now 'Getting Back on Track'.



A 'Freedom Day' Exaltation: Victorian Chapter No. 2184

The Chapter was Consecrated, 9th December 1895, by His Honour F.A. Philbrick Q.C. (too many high masonic and other honours to mention here) in The Phoenix Hotel Rainham. Among the founders, the licensed vituallers profession was very well represented; this happy trait developed further with exaltees and joining-members during the early years. Chapter meetings continued to be held in hotels and COIs were in public houses until the move in 1947 to Chingford Masonic Centre.

Interestingly in July 1896, the Chapter was granted a dispensation to hold a 'Masonic Service' in 'Masonic Clothing' at Rainham Church in support of its Restoration Fund. From the conclusion of WWI to 1922, there were forty-six Exaltees! Thereafter, most years required dual exaltations until the 1970s. (Perhaps post-contagion, we should be looking for increased numbers.)



In Victorian Chapter's first hundred years, 325 joined or were Exalted from 105 different chapters and lodges; this included 67 from the namesake Mother Lodge.

Exaltee Dave Weightman joined Freemasonry in 2010. His para-medic colleagues included Freemasons; he had noted their gentlemanliness,

purposefulness and integrity. This created a respectful intrigue and thus welcomed an invitation, from a colleague, to join. At his Initiation into Sancto Claro Lodge No. 9486, he was delighted to see colleagues in attendance.

Now, Dave is unable to imagine not being a mason it offers him:- friendship, a sense of family, belonging and community – "magical". He chose to concentrate on progress to the Chair and now, successfully achieved, has become a Royal Arch Companion; this fourth step he sees as a natural, logical, progression to enhance the benefits of Freemasonry and the contribution he can make to it.

A book could be written about Dave's nigh thirty years as a paramedic, instructor, air-crew and the awards received: this vital life-saving work is greatly valued by the community and the Air Ambulance has received the enduring support of Essex masons. However, both the highs and lows of this profession are, enduring traumatic – it's not a case of just

logging-out in the evening. Whilst this work attracts caring interest and appreciation, it must be appreciated that their 'days at the office' are often, something about which they would rather not speak.



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In July 2017 at Felsted School, Lodge of XV was Consecrated by RW Bro Rodney Lister Bass in the presence of over 300 Founders, friends and visitors of the Essex rugby lodge.

1556 days later and some 579 days late, The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, Paul Tarrant was pleased to Consecrate the Chapter of XV, the first rugby based Chapter in the history of the Supreme Grand Chapter of England. It was also the first Consecration of a Chapter in Essex for almost 10 years.

The Founders of the Chapter have had to tackle many obstacles in the build up to the event. Covid has conspired to postpone the Consecration for some 579 days and it is a testament to the resolve of the petitioners that over 100 Companions gathered from across country to witness this unique event and to enjoy an outstanding Festive Board at Saxon Hall, Southend.

Following a faultless Consecration overseen by the Provincial Director of Ceremonies, E. Comp Joe Shearer, E. Comps Mike Hall, Dave Hawtin and Michael Fleet were installed as the primus Z, H and J respectively and a full installation and appointment of officers followed.

In his first act as Z, E. Comp Mike Hall announced that the Chapter would adopt 3 unattached widows via the Almoners Team which was received well by all present, including the Provincial Grand Almoner.

The Festive Board that followed was conducted in good order, although Companions should be aware that future meetings will include a Festive Board similar to that of the Lodge of XV with 'fines' payable and the monies donated to local rugby clubs and associated charities.

In his response MEGS Paul Tarrant said he was delighted to witness the 'conversion' of the Lodge to a Chapter and that with the level of support shown to the whole XV project that they wouldn't need to 'try' too hard to emulate the success of their Craft brothers.

Primus Z, E. Comp Mike Hall was overwhelmed by the day and commented: "It's been a long time coming but we got there in the end. I can only thank the Province and the Founders for their patience and all

those who attended under difficult circumstances".



After much deliberation, a decision was made to make it the Combined Stewards Lodge, No.1628. It was repurposed to accept, Provincial Stewards, or their equivalent, from ALL of the recognised Orders represented in Essex.



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LIVING STONES

The inextricable link between Craft, the Holy Royal Arch and The Degree of Mark Master Mason, the allegorical construction of a mason as a "Living Stone"

From the very moment of our Initiation, all Masons are told that they represent builders and stonemasons, and that the allegorical act of "building" a structure does, in its own way, represent the continuing improvement of ourselves from that rough ashlar placed in the north east part of the Lodge to "that stone, perfect in its parts and honourable to the builder".

In the Craft we assume the role of Temple builders, working from Entered Apprentice, the lowest class of workman receiving only food and drink for wages, through Fellowcraft who is paid for his skilled work (of which we learn more in the Mark Degree) to Master Mason and, ultimately, to Master of the Lodge where we preside over others.

In the Degree of Mark Master Mason, we return to the role of a Fellowcraft before being made a Mark Man and, ultimately, rewarded for our skills and efforts in being made a Mark Master Mason. It is also of historic interest that Mark Master Masons are introduced to a character known only to Installed Craft Masters of whom no explanation is given as to his importance.

In the Holy Royal Arch we represent Journeyman builders, who, by good fortune, exploration and adherence to ancient customs we make a discovery of great importance and are admitted as favoured people.

So, it is clear that in the Craft we learn the great import of the worthy mason working with stone blocks to turn the rough ashlar into the smooth to build the Temple.

In Mark we are taught to take our skills to a new level, to become experienced, and to produce the finest piece of work. We fashion a special stone, one that allows us to complete the sacred arch.

In the Holy Royal Arch, we are journeyman builders. During what may be termed "menial work" we make a discovery as we lever away a key stone (or stones) in the ruined Temple and discover a hidden vault which leads to a discovery of great import. This may also be said to be allegorical of the fact that no good work is "menial" and that, if we strive always to do our best, then great riches await us.

We can, therefore, make the connection between all three of these different Masonic Orders in the common theme of the allegorical reflection of all men as "living stones". It should be obvious, however, that there is a change in each stage of the construction of our "living stone" but there is also an inextricable link in all of these allegorical rituals, step by step, in constructing that "spiritual edifice" that Temple built to the glory of God.

So, to recap, in the Craft we are figuratively worked on, hewn from a rough state to become a smooth ashlar, experienced and worthy, ready to go on and produce better work.

In Mark we represent the finest work in God's House, the ultimate product of our trade, ready to take our place in that spiritual stone edifice.

In the Holy Royal Arch it can be said that we have "removed" that "earthly stone" and finally been rewarded with reaching that "spiritual edifice" and finally fulfilled our true relationship with God. At the same time, however, we realise that all our earthly building efforts have produced the finest stonework that has protected the Holy of Holies from the conflagration (earthly destruction) and protected the Sacred Word for evermore.

Ultimately, we are builders for eternity, we have finally become that living stone that we mentioned at the start, "perfect in its parts and honourable to the builder".

ESSEX MASONS WIN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

An eagle-eyed Essex Masonic Clay Shooting Team has won the National Masonic Clay Championships with a score of 252 to finish two ahead of the runners-up, a team from the Province of Surrey, in an exciting finish to a tough contest.



Teams from 21 Masonic Provinces and five non-masonic teams travelled from all over England and Wales to take part in the National Championships held at Barbury, near Swindon, on Saturday 18th September 2021. The final Provincial Team results included West Lancs in third place with 242 and the Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London team with 241. Wiltshire, the host team, came fifth with 237.

Team scores were decided by taking the top three shooters' scores from each team. Neil March of Saint Cedd Lodge was awarded 'High Gun' as 'Top Shot' for the Competition with a score of 90 and fellow Lodge member Mark Lambkin totalled 82. David Purches, who came second in the Super Veteran Class, shared the same score of 80 as Clive Fry, both from Thames Estuary Lodge.



Team members representing the Province also included Mark Woolard, Siebert Lodge; Terry Attewell, Canon Stafford Morris Lodge; Gary Jones, Comrades Lodge and Essex Masonic Clay Shooting Association Chairman, Rob Hollier of Eureka Lodge. Formed 21 years ago, Rob is very proud of the team's current success but they are already focussing on the next event in October 2021 which is the International in Falkirk, Scotland, with teams travelling from as far as India and the rest of the world.

A delighted Provincial Grand Master (PGM), Paul Tarrant, conveyed his personal congratulations and those on behalf of all Essex Freemasons to the Team on their success in representing the Province. Paul also wished the Team Captain, Mark Inns of Benfleet Lodge, a speedy recovery as he was booked to shoot but was unable to attend due to illness.

On learning of the achievement, the PGM added "Freemasonry helps its members develop their self-confidence and this is reflected not only in their eagerness for charitable giving and helping the community but in a number of sporting activities as well. Making friends with different people and all pulling together as a team go hand in hand with the timeless traditions which we all value as Freemasons".



One of the Most Unheard-of Inspirational Stories in Essex Freemasonry

Malcolm Robinson BEM PPJGW



In 1951 Malcolm was initiated into St Margaret's Lodge No. 5168 which met in Leigh. He recalls "As soon as the door was opened the whole place took off with the first verse of "Lead, Kindly Light" (a hymn written in 1833 by John Henry Newman as a poem entitled 'The Pillar and the Cloud'). With a big attendance it sounded like a Welsh male voice choir singing from above."

On getting a job in the drawing office with Marconi in Chelmsford it made it difficult to get to Leigh in time for the Wednesday afternoon meetings. His father was well known in Chelmsford as a Fire Chief in WW2 and had become the first Assistant Secretary of East Saxon Lodge. He arranged for Malcolm to join East Saxon which was just a walk across the road from the Marconi drawing office which made life considerably easier.

"The Lodge of Instruction (LoI) in those days was unbelievable compared to now" exclaimed Malcolm "the Preceptor thought he was on a parade ground with raw recruits and one senior City bank manager said that even his directors had never spoken to him like that".

Despite that Malcolm has thoroughly enjoyed all of his 70 years in Freemasonry and reflects on the many things that have happened and

in meeting the range and variety of people he became acquainted with whom he would otherwise have never known. He particularly remembers going to Maldon with his family one Sunday to watch Sir Neil Thorne horse riding.

For his charitable work on the Committee and as the Secretary of the Marconi Charity Fund for several years, Malcolm was awarded the BEM. Having been made redundant in the early 1990s he took whatever work he could to make sure his family were always provided for. "I am sure everything happens for a reason" he said "I used to play football but in one game playing for Chelmsford City B Team I broke my leg and was taken to hospital. Whilst there I first met Pamela who was a nurse and became my wife. We are still happily married today."

Still regularly driving himself to LoI and Lodge Meetings, Malcolm is one of the most 'continuously-for-70 years' active Craft Freemasons in Essex, if not in UGLE, but he has not taken the fourth step into Royal Arch even though he would have liked to had circumstances been different.

"My reasons for not joining" he explained "are because both my children were born profoundly deaf. This had a big effect on the family knowing they will never hear. Envisaging the problems they would encounter in life, I decided to devote all my spare time to help them prepare for life ahead." All the love, devotion encouragement and teaching of Malcolm and his wife Pamela has come to fruition as both children graduated with Honours degrees from Oxford University. David is a Senior Scientific Officer in the Meteorological Office and Jane specialises in environmental sciences.

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

Essex Freemasons helping PICC Pals make medical history



A group of 15 Southend based volunteers are helping to make medical history from a simple idea that has turned into a cottage industry and a potential life saver for patients at hospitals and medical centres across the country.

They call themselves PICC Pals, a dedicated team of 'sewing bees', packers and delivery drivers producing a very special range of armbands for people aged from two upwards. The bands are designed for patients who have to wear a PICC (a Peripherally inserted central catheter), which covers the catheter helping to protect it from accidental knocks or similar trauma.

Such has been the success of PICC Pals in just nine months, that they were in danger of running out of funds until Essex Freemasons stepped in with a £1,000 grant which will keep the charity continue its work for at least the next year. The money from the Freemasons Shoeburyness Royal Arch Chapter and the Essex Freemasons Community Fund will cover the cost of materials and meet demand from hospitals as far away as Sheffield and Exeter.

PICC Pals was launched by Nikki McCarthy, herself a cancer patient. She quickly worked out that the cotton tube supplied by the NHS did not protect a catheter that well and rapidly became soiled and unusable – so she created her own armband cover.

"We sourced our own materials and designed them so they would appeal to the user – bright colours for children, plain designs for men and fashionable designs for women," said Nikki. "Friends soon heard about the scheme and in just a few weeks they were producing more bands and we had turned into a cottage industry."

"The NHS approved the design and packaging and these are now supplied free of charge and with demand growing by the day I cannot tell you how grateful we are for the money from Essex Freemasons. It will keep us going for nearly two years"

In just nine months PICC Pals have produced more than 4,000 armbands. The collection of covers has increased to include a lighter weight summer range, children's and teenage covers and special occasion covers.

PICC Pals are currently producing a Christmas range and have made special covers for weddings. One of the best additional effects of this work is that the nursing teams, without exception, have reported that they enjoy having something positive and novel to discuss with their patients, and something that can swiftly calm what is a very emotional and scary experience.

David Wilson, representing Essex Freemasons, commented: "This is clearly a fantastic venture and we are delighted that we can help. This was first drawn to our attention by members of Shoeburyness Chapter and once we learned what PICC Pals were doing were delighted to make a grant possible." The Essex Freemasons Community Fund won the Pride of Essex 'Team Pride of 2020' Award for its supply of equipment to help frontline workers and volunteers in Essex during the pandemic.

For those still unsure what a PICC is – it's a Peripherally inserted central catheter - a thin, flexible tube that is inserted into a vein in the upper arm and guided (threaded) into a large vein above the right side of the heart called the superior vena cava. It is used to give intravenous fluids, blood transfusions,



chemotherapy, and other drugs. It is widely used by the NHS to treat a wide range of different conditions from cancer to diabetes.

Thousands of patients have PICCs inserted each year which is why the Southend Group will just continue to expand. Abbots Hall Chapter The Root, Heart and Marrow of Masonry

Abbots Hall Chapter No. 6205 is back in business. It was Consecrated in December 1948, the year when the cheese ration was cut but the milk ration was increased from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ pints per week. Hugh Gaitskell, the Fuel Minister, rationed motorists to 90 miles per month and a dock workers strike caused the meat ration to be decreased to 6d ($2\frac{1}{2}$ new pence) a week for both fresh and tinned meat. The Government declared a state of emergency deploying the Army to control and operate the docks and the National Health Service was born.

Moving on 73 years, an Assistant to the Provincial Grand Principals (APGP), David Wilson, was delighted to be at Upminster Masonic Hall on Tuesday 16th November 2021 when 27 Companions of Abbots Hall Chapter held their first Convocation in almost two years. Whilst the Agenda was mainly administration based the unspoken item was to get back together, honour their late departed Companions and enjoy meeting once again followed by a sumptuous Chapter Banquet to put back on some of the pounds lost during lockdown.

David Wilson said "the meeting typified what our Fraternity is about. Coming together as friends, enjoying each other's company, renewing friendships, giving to good causes and parting with smiles and handshakes."

A ballot proved in favour of two joining members including Bob Baldwin, a Provincial Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies (ProvAGDC), who was immediately appointed DC. A Supreme Grand Chapter Certificate was presented by David to the Chapter's newest Exaltee who had been waiting two years to receive it. He will find plenty of inspiration from his fellow Companions including John Helliar, a Past Assistant Grand Sojourner (PAGSoj), A New Chapter For An Essex Mason (essexroyalarch.org.uk) and APGPs John Crudgington and Bruce Mapson.

In addition to everyone enjoying themselves there is a profound focus on Charity among the Companions having raised £6,933 for the Essex 2022 Festival for which David Wilson was delighted to present a Platinum Certificate to the Chapter and commented "This is an outstanding achievement as the Chapter has continued to support the Festival as well as local Charities and the Companions are donating through their Lodges as well".

Abbots Hall Chapter is fortunate in having an exemplary Charity Steward who leads from the front. Frank Sharp, also a PAGSoj, helped set up the Yvonne Jean Stewart Charitable Trust (YJS) which has raised in the region of £500,000 to help the British Lung Foundation, the Helen Rollason Cancer Charity and the Saint Francis Hospice. Although these days Frank is no longer involved with the YJS, he raises around £10,000 each year, thanks to the generosity of mainly Essex Brethren, selling unwanted Masonic items online for the Saint Francis and Farleigh Hospices.

Frank Sharp thoroughly enjoys the whole Royal Arch ceremony. He explained: "Its colour, its story line, the interaction between the First Principal and the Principal Sojourner and the fact that the three Principals work together as a team is what makes it to me the highlight of pure ancient Freemasonry". Frank summed up by saying that he could not be as succinct as Laurence Dermott, the Grand Secretary of the Antient's Grand Lodge, who described the Royal Arch in the 1750s as the "Root, heart and marrow of Masonry."



Seven Kings Lodge No 2749 once again hosted the Boar's Head Meeting this year at the Square in Upminster on the 10th December 2021. The event has been run for 25 years and raised in excess of £200,000 for the Michael Charles Adams Trust (MCA) during that period. The MCA is a charity that assists children with brain related cancers.

Everyone attending the meeting was asked to bring with them a toy, to be donated to children in various hospitals, and this year four hospitals were chosen - the Southend University Hospital, Princess Alexandria Hospital, Queens Hospital and Basildon University Hospital. All the toys were taken to the hospitals by the dedicated elves of Seven Kings Lodge and the MCA; and were most gratefully received.

In all, over 500 toys were donated by the brethren and £2,800 was also raised for charity.

At the meeting a double initiation was carried out in a splendid manner by visiting Assistant Provincial Grand Master, W Bro the Rev Martin Howse PSGD, who actually used a seldom heard version of the ritual! Worthy of note is the fact that, as the Boar's Head initiates 2 candidates at each of its meetings, it has now brought in 50 new members to Freemasonry since its inception. Martin was one of four APGMs to attend the meeting, who can all be seen in the following photo with the Deputy PGM, W Bro Nick Franklin PSGD and the Chairman of the Square, W Bro Peter Banks PAGDC.




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Essex Freemasons fund new mini bus to help carers in south Essex

A new mini bus, fully equipped to help transport vulnerable people across south Essex to allow them to access vital day care services and to give their carers, many of whom are young children, some much needed rest, has been delivered to a Benfleet based charity with the support of funding from Essex Freemasons.

Carers Choices, set up to improve the quality of care and support for people in Essex through provision of respite solutions, has received £16,000 from the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, which was further match funded by another £16,000 from the MCF, the Freemason own charity, enabling them to buy the bus outright.

It has now joined the fleet of mini buses used every day to bring vulnerable adults and people with learning difficulties to their Centre in Kiln Road, behind the Castle Point Borough Council offices, where they can be looked after by trained professionals.

Paul Ramsden, Chief Executive of Carers Choices, explained: "Our buses are essential tools to transport our clients to and from our centres, which means that we can free up more time for their carers. We also support Young Carers who are children under 18 looking after a relative with a disability, illness, mental health condition, or drug or alcohol problem.

"This might be a parent, grandparent or sibling. They frequently do extra jobs in and around the home such as cooking, cleaning or helping someone get dressed and move around and this is where we can help with training, building

confidence and helping to provide these young carers with the skills they need."

"We were delighted to be able to find the £32,000 needed to fund the new mini bus," said Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons. "It will clearly make quite a difference across south Essex helping dozens of families."

"I have also been impressed with the incredible range of work Carers Choices provides for vulnerable adults and children. It is certainly the kind of community charity that our members in Essex like to support."



Online Supplement

Children's mental health charity Place2Be has launched additional support for both children and parents at six schools in Harlow, thanks to a £25,000 grant from Essex Freemasons, donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Parents across six schools in Harlow will now have access to a dedicated Place2Be Family Practitioner, who will be on hand to support with any concerns they have about their child's behaviour or wellbeing.

The Family Practitioner will work alongside parents to support and strengthen their confidence and parenting skills. This, in turn will reap benefits for the mental health and wellbeing of the children.

This builds on the existing work of Place2Be, which already delivers mental health support to children and young people in schools facing a whole range of issues, including anxiety, stress, low mood, bereavement and even self-harm or suicidal thoughts.



Place2Be has been working with schools in Harlow for many years, providing permanent staff to work with teaching professionals to provide support and counselling for young people. The service continued during Covid via online Zoom and phone sessions and was said to be "a lifeline by many parents" during lockdown.

It's also a service which has been welcomed by Harlow schools. James Hollinsley, Executive Head of Longwood Primary Academy in Paringdon Road, explained: "In 2015, this was a failing school with large number of children with additional wellbeing needs. Four years later we were described as the happiest primary school in the UK."

"While our team made considerable changes to improve and turn around the school, I cannot underestimate the support we have received from Place2Be who have helped to change the lives of many children with mental health issues. The service is a fundamental part of all of our NET Academies schools."

Kate Armstrong-Taylor, Area Manager for Place2Be added: "Based on our experience of working with schools in Essex and across the UK, we understand the vital role that parents and carers play in building their children's resilience. With the support of the Family Practitioner, parents can improve their own confidence and strengthen family relationships, all of which will ultimately have a positive impact on their children's wellbeing. This grant from Essex Freemasons will enable us to continue to develop our work in Harlow, supporting even more families through the work of the Family Practitioner."

"This is very much a community project helping vulnerable children and parents," said Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons. "With 8,000 members, many of whom live and work in the Harlow area, we are very much part of that same community which is why we have been delighted to help such a fantastic charity."

"We the quardians of are traditions. We take great pride in our antiquity and in that way render a great service to the Community. Tradition is the accumulated wisdom of those gone before and the tendency of modern progress is to lose sight of tradition. We are one of those Institutions which preserve tradition".

Less than two months before the late Pro Grand Master, Lord Ampthill, addressed the 150th Annual Convocation of the Grand Lodge of New York with the above words, Essex Freemasons formed a new Lodge to keep alive the memory of William of Colchester, the Chief Mason of the works of the Nave of Westminster Abbey in the 1400s. On 26th March 1931, the Provincial Grand Master (PGM), Brigadier Sir Richard Beale Colvin - see Monkhams Centenary was the Consecrating Officer.

Ninety years later, on 25th November 2021, the Brethren of William of Colchester Lodge No. 5255 clearly demonstrated to their guests and visitors that the former Pro Grand Master, Chief Mason and PGM would be deeply satisfied that their Lodge is preserving tradition. In between a model Opening and Closing the Lodge gave an impeccable demonstration of the First Degree Ceremony in preparation for an Initiation of a new candidate at the next meeting.

With a focus on Charity the Lodge agreed to donate £1,000 to the local Night Shelter and the 25 Brethren at the Festive Board raised £250 with the raffle and football scratch cards. The visitors included two Brethren from Nore Lodge No. 3610, Mark Gurteen, a Past Assistant Grand Standard Bearer (PAGStB), the Charity Steward and Mentor, with his mentee, Fellow Craft Kevin Ebbs, on his first ever visit to another Lodge. Both Mark and Kevin were decidedly impressed to say they will be returning for the next Meeting.

Other visitors included Provincial Senior and Junior Grand Deacons Andy Hastings of Old Parkonians' No. 4709 and Keith Bartlett of United No. 697; John Print, a Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden (PPSGW), of Meridies Colcestriae No. 9715; Andy Hardie, the Immediate Past Master (IPM) of Grey Friars No. 5169, proudly wearing his Locomotion Lodge of Mark Master Masons lapel badge of which he is a Founder Member.

Paul Skiffington, the Master of Pyefleet No. 8913 responded to the Toast on behalf of the Visitors. Paul was extremely appreciative and succinct with his response. Having served for many years in an Army Corps with the motto 'Nil Sine Labore' which translates as 'Nothing Without Work', Paul knew that such an enjoyable and successful Lodge meeting and festive board with its focus on Charity does not just happen but takes hard work and dedication which the Brethren of William of Colchester Lodge No. 5255, like the vast majority of Freemasons, do so well as the guardians of traditions.

Paul Tarrant, the Provincial Grand Master (PGM) made an Official Visit to the Lodge of Beneficence No. 7978 at Orsett Masonic Hall on 18th November 2021. The meeting was an illustrious occasion for Michael Spencer, a Past Junior Grand Deacon (PJGD) as it marked his 50 years in the Craft. Michael is a Past Provincial Grand Master for Essex, in the Mark and Royal Ark Mariner Degrees.

Consecrated in 1964 by The Earl of Warwick, at Southend in 1967 the Lodge of Beneficence moved to Grays following the opening of Thurrock Masonic Hall and in 1971 moved again to its present venue at Orsett. In May of that year the Immediate Past Master (IPM) had the pleasure of initiating his son, Michael George Spencer, to become the first father and son in the Lodge and began a trend which has served the Lodge well over the last fifty years.

There are huge obstacles in the way of many of those everyday things we take for granted for our children. Having an organisation like the Norrie Disease Foundation to raise awareness of these challenges and to provide vital support can make all the difference to the children and families affected. I'm happy to be able to support a worthwhile charity."



The Lodge Secretary of Grey Friars, Graeme Lockwood, a Past Grand Standard Bearer (PGStB) is also well known among Essex Freemasons for being part of the editorial team of the Essex Mason Magazine and as the team leader of the ten volunteers who work hard for the Essex Mason Shop on behalf of the Province. Sales of Masonic regalia generate important income, mainly from Essex Freemasons, especially twice a year when the Craft and Royal Arch promotions are announced but the shop also sells a wide range of masonic paraphernalia and gifts such as cufflinks etc. for presents at Christmas and other special occasions.

The valuable work the Team do is reflected in the £50,000 donation made to the Essex 2022 Festival for the Masonic Charitable Foundation which has pledged £7 million for Charities and good causes in Essex alone, so by supporting Essex Mason you are directly supporting local Essex Charities. Kids Inspire launch new mentor training

Chelmsford based charity, Kids Inspire, set to train dozens of new mentors – dedicated volunteers able to provide one to one help for children with mental health issues – thanks to a £3,000 grant from Essex Freemasons.

The money, donated via the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, will enable one of the county's most active charities, to increase its support offering to children who have been overwhelmed by negative feelings and a wide range of other issues which are now impacting their lives both at home and school.

"In 2021 we have had nearly 3,500 children referred to us so far from every part of the county, as far away as Clacton and Southend," said Paula Ashfield, Head of Fundraising for Kids Inspire. "It means we desperately need new mentors trained to offer a 'step-down service' to young people in need of extra support from us following a course of therapy. This grant from Essex Freemasons will enable us to train up to 30 more volunteer mentors who will each be allocated a child facing mental health issues."

"Mentoring is a vital part of our work at Kids Inspire which has seen a demand for our services increase over the last two years due to Covid. Each child receives one to one attention and this service is particularly valuable for boys who can be assigned a male mentor who can act as a positive role model."

The charity provides mental health and trauma recovery support for children and young people from 4-21. Their qualified, experienced team have been trained in a broad range of therapies and work creatively to encourage body and mind reconnection. The focus is on the strengths of the child, their uniqueness, family and other relationships.

"Kids Inspire was founded in 2007 and is now a vital part of the Essex Community," said Colin Felton, Provincial Charity Steward for Essex Freemasons. "It is the kind of charity that our members like to support. Kids Inspire do a fantastic job and we have been pleased to help."

Fund, providing voluntary and charitable services to Sick and Disabled Children' but the investiture had to be delayed due to the pandemic restrictions.

During lockdown many of the planned initiatives to send chronically ill and sick children had to be cancelled. Instead, the focus was moved to support Homecare Team Nurses who were supplied with new laptops. Essential medical equipment was also purchased for two of the children. Steve said "The S.A.M. team have continued to do great things and proved that every little helps".

The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent (MEGS) of Essex Royal Arch Masons, Paul Tarrant, in conveying his congratulations on behalf of all Essex Royal Arch Companions, said "I am delighted to learn that being awarded the BEM has given Steve and everyone at S.A.M. a huge lift. As a great believer that in every Lodge and Chapter members should enjoy themselves and have a mission to help charity and contribute to society, Steve has led by example. With over 18 million hours each year given by Freemasons in volunteering this reflects well on the type of person attracted to Freemasonry and his recognition by HM The Queen is truly deserved."

Steve retired as a Business Analysis Manager in 2015 having worked for 41 years for British Telecom. Attracted to the principals of integrity, friendship, respect and charity which Freemasonry offers, Steve began his Masonic journey in 1988 when he was initiated by his brother who was the Worshipful Master in the Spirit of Friendship Lodge No 8061 in which his other brother was the Senior Warden and his father was a Past Master.

A Royal Arch Mason since 1998, Steve made several visits to Ixion Chapter No. 2501, which meets at Harlow Masonic

After attending the investiture ceremony in Westminster Abbey, Steve and Theresa celebrated with their two sons and their families with an enjoyable restaurant meal making it a special day after two decades of hard work giving happiness to children. On this occasion the tables were turned and it was an Excellent Companion, who loves being a Royal Arch Mason, to have his own smiles and memories.





Essex Freemasons fund new Hospice service to care homes

Farleigh Hospice in Chelmsford has launched a major new programme, funded by Essex Freemasons, to support residents at care homes across mid-Essex with critical end of life and palliative care.

The programme will cost £33,000 to deliver, money donated by Essex Freemasons via the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) and is urgently needed to support the care home sector which has been badly affected by the Covid pandemic.

Debbie de Boltz, Fundraising Manager for Farleigh Hospice, explained:

"We knew there was an urgent need to extend the Hospice service into care homes but until now we never had the resources to make this happen. This grant from Essex Freemasons has made all the difference and will allow us to strengthen our team enabling us to launch this new programme, which in turn will provide the critical support needed for residents and staff at care homes."

In practical terms care homes can now work more closely with the Hospice, helping to identify residents approaching the end of life who can choose to remain where they are or be transferred to the Hospice for specialist support.

The £33,000 grant is part of a £100,000 package of donations from Essex Freemasons and the MCF for Hospices across the county. Similar grants of £30,000 plus have been given to St Helena at Colchester and St Luke's in Basildon.

"Hospices have always attracted support from Freemasons," said Peter Hollingsworth, Assistant Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons. "I am delighted that we have once again been able to fund vital new projects to ensure that they can keep up their fantastic work in the community."

Farleigh Hospice provides care for any type of illness that is considered life-limiting, including cancer, neurological diseases, and chronic heart, lung, and renal diseases, both in their Inpatient Unit or in a patient's home environment. This service has now been extended to care homes as a result of the Grant.

In addition to MCF Grants of more than £450,000 donated to Hospices nationally, Essex Masons traditionally support local hospices across the county with combined donations exceeding more than £50,000 each year.

Chill zones to help hundreds of disadvantaged children

A Basildon based charity, dedicated to creating the best start in life for disadvantaged children and young people, is ready to create its own "Chill Zones" to provide vital respite and support for hundreds of parents and carers across south Essex, thanks to a major grant from Essex Freemasons.

The money, £14,874 has been donated to BOSP, short for Brighter Opportunities for Special People, via the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemason's own charity and will be used to fund outdoor sports and other activities for young adults for at least the next three years.

BOSP provide a range of leisure and respite services to young people with complex disabilities or life-limiting illnesses in Basildon, the same activities and opportunities as their peers, allowing them to develop independence, self-esteem and social skills. Equally as important, their families also benefit from the vital breaks offered by these respite sessions.

Jodie Connelly, BOSP Chief Executive, explained: "We help families lead an active and ordinary life and aim to prevent crisis by keeping families together and children in their homes. The charity provides 12 different regular clubs and activities with care at evenings, weekends and during school holidays for children and young people from birth to 25 years, plus two parental support groups."

"We identified a large gap in our services where we wanted to provide more outdoor activities and this grant from Essex Freemasons will enable us to run these or what we call chill zones. The money has really come at the right time when young people are facing increased mental health issues as a result of lockdown"

BOSP regularly supports 110 local children and over 400 parents and siblings who experience improved confidence and self-esteem, improved speech with use of signing plus emotional development, improved social skills, group participation and reduced isolation.

Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons, commented: "It is charities such as BOSP that make such a difference in the community and who really need our support. I have been very impressed by their work and have been pleased that we have been able to help."

Brian Chenier is the Prosthetics Support Officer for 'Blesma, The Limbless Veterans', an Armed Forces charity helping those who have lost limbs or sight live independently. His article entitled 'The lowdown on the Freemasons' in the latest issue of Blesma Magazine I Blesma, The Limbless Veterans Charity at pages 12-13 is especially informative and well worth reading.

Emphatic that the Members' Pathway event was a great success, Brian immediately returned to the Centre at Colchester and put up a Provincial Membership Team poster on the notice board. At the Colcestria Lodge meeting that evening he reported to fellow Brethren that "It was extremely pleasing to see the enthusiasm of all those who attended and the support from the very top which is appreciated" he added "I will do my best to help our Lodges attract and benefit from more members."

Earlier in the meeting, Brian had given the Charge after Initiation to Colin Branch, a Support Hub Manager for Help for Heroes, whom he had proposed. Colin had his leg amputated following an operational infantry assault while serving as a Corporal with 1 Royal Anglian Regiment in Afghanistan in 2007. He has a wonderful positive philosophy about being alive with his wife and children as they grow up. The First Degree ceremony was performed by Mark Ingram, the Worshipful Master, who was the seconder and an accomplished Explanation of the Ceremony was given by Tony Brewers, the Director of Ceremonies.

The Chairman of Teddies for Loving Care (TLC) in Essex, Robert Whittingham, a Past Assistant Provincial Grand Master (PAPGM), was presented with a £1,000 cheque for TLC which was started 20 years ago by two Freemasons in Essex. Since then, more than three million bears have been given to children in hospitals in England and Wales with over

500,000 in Essex. Central support and administration for regional TLC charities is provided by the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemasons' charity which gave over £51 million to UK Charities and deserving causes in 2020

Within one week of his Initiation Colin Branch and his wife enjoyed their first Colcestria Lodge Masonic Ladies Festival Dinner and Dance at the St Giles Masonic Centre in Colchester on 4th December 2021. Over £1,000 was raised by the 42 guests for the children's mental health charity 'Place2B' which had also received a £25,000 grant from the Essex Freemasons for additional support in the Harlow area just a few days before Essex Freemasons helping to improve mental health in Harlow.

As the Platinum anniversary of Colcestria Lodge No. 7123 approaches, the Brethren can celebrate being a Lodge that welcomes Heroes and, with a focus on charity, gives, gives and gives.

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BROTHERS IN ARMS

uring the English Civil War, Royalist Generals Sir Charles Lucas and Sir George Lisle fought bravely whilst enduring hardship and famine in the three-month siege of Colchester. Following surrender to the Roundheads they were executed in 1648 by a firing squad at Colchester Castle and laid to rest in St Giles Church which is now Colchester's Masonic Centre where Lucas and Lisle Lodge No. 8456 meets.

The Essex Freemasons were approached with a special request from The Queensman Lodge No. 2694, which meets at Freemason's Hall in Great Queen Street, the London Headquarters of the United Grand Lodge of England. Based on the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment which includes the former Queen's and Hampshire's Regiments, in 2018 over 1,000 watched Johnson Beharry VC and Daniel Keighran VC undergo their joint Initiation into Freemasonry.





With a waiting list of new members to Initiate, the Queensman Lodge asked Lucas and Lyle Lodge if they could perform the Third Degree, also known as the Ceremony of Raising, for Reece Snowball to be made a Master Mason in this historical building where the two Royalist generals lay buried in the vault.

At the regular meeting of the Lucas and Lisle Lodge the Worshipful Master, Michael Lappage, invited the current Master of Queensman Lodge, James Burgoyne to perform the Ceremony with the help of Queensman members Paul Dove, Ian "Chelsea" Hall and Nick Savin together with Dave Barrett and Eric Sigsworth, who are also members of Claudius Lodge No. 8700 which also meets at St Giles, as is James Burgoyne.

The Ceremony held on Friday 12th November 2021 was described by one visitor as "a 'Festival of Freemasonry' with an outstanding performance by the Queensman Lodge members and complemented with the equally word-perfect and sincerely delivered 'Traditional History' by Tony Flint, the Secretary of Lucas and Lisle Lodge."

The presentation of the Certificate had been delayed by the COVID pandemic and the APGM also commented that it was an unusual certificate as it was produced at the due time and was therefore signed by Paul Reeves who was at that time the Deputy Provincial Grand Master (DepProvGM) in Charge for Essex. This was particularly appropriate as the PDepPGM is a member of Earl of Warwick Chapter which is also Ken's Chapter.

After the meeting all the Brethren enjoyed a Christmas Festive Board which included carol singing.







Masonic Secret Santas Meet at Loxford Lodge

Instead of an alms collection the Brethren brought presents for children needing specialist care at Addenbrookes Hospital spending Christmas away from home. At the request of the Hospital's Charity Trust the presents were not wrapped so that the staff could give an appropriate present to each child who would gain the most, as some have limited mobility and/or special needs and needed toys that have music, sound or lights.

A huge 'Thank-you' by the hospital was extended to all the Essex Freemasons who donated presents and money during a special 25 Days of Christmas Fundraiser in honour of the late Alexander Badman who was Master of the Lodge in 1995 and 2011. Alex's son and Lodge Steward, Harry, explained:

"The appeal is looking to become a yearly event, growing each year, and, Covid permitting, allowing more people to join in with direct fundraising. However, the recipients of the funds will look to change each year so more and more children are supported. In 2022, the fundraising is looking to fund Christmas presents for Children in shelters across Suffolk, Essex and Cambridgeshire, depending on funds. The target is going to be raised to £2,500 off the back of an incredible year. If anyone would like to join the team, please contact me and I would be more than happy to help!"

John Cannon, the Lodge Secretary, said the Meeting was also successful in that Mustafa Ibrahim Mustafa was welcomed back as a re-joining member and Alex Dring was fervently initiated into Freemasonry by the Worshipful Master, Richard Capener. John Cannon delivered the Charge and an Explanation of the First Degree Tracing Board was given by Paul Scothern.

The grateful appreciation of the Province was conveyed by the Assistant Provincial Grand Master (APGM) for the Lodge, Martin Howse, who was delighted to confirm Loxford Lodge had also qualified with Platinum status for the Essex 2022 Festival.

Charity Steward, Mike Moisley, said "We had a very busy meeting and as you can see from the pictures there were plenty of presents donated for children at Addenbrookes Hospital. In addition, the raffle monies were topped up to £500 from the Lodge of Instruction funds and also put towards buying presents".

The children who were at Addenbrookes in special care over Christmas may not know about Freemasonry or the £51 million given to deserving causes in 2020 alone, but for the 27 Masonic Secret Santas who met at Loxford Lodge on 14th December 2021 all the presents were known but the children who received them were a secret.

Saturday, 13th November, saw the Northern Star Lodge honoured by a visit from Right Worshipful Brother Terence Douglas Sheern, Provincial Grand Master. Friday, the 12th November saw the dedication of the Combined Stewards' Lodge banner. Many years ago the Langdon Hills Mark Lodge was in dire trouble and considering surrendering its' Warrant. After much deliberation, a decision was made to make it the Combined Stewards Lodge, No.1628. It was repurposed to accept, Provincial Stewards, or their equivalent, from ALL of the recognised Orders represented in Essex.



It was rather wet and dreary on the morning of Wednesday, 10th November 2021 at The Square in Upminster as the Brethren gathered to be a part of another landmark moment in the history of the Mark Province of Essex; the birth of a new Lodge, The Southern Star Lodge of Mark Master Masons, No. 2026. Landmark because this Lodge brings us to an impressive "first" fifty in the number of Lodges in the Mark Province a testiment to the energy, drive and commitment of the Provincial Grand Master, his Executive and all the Mark Men in Essex to our Order especially given the "challenges" of the recent past.



Wednesday 13th of October 2021 was a gloriously sunny day in Southend and a good day for an early start to witness the rebirth of an Essex Mark Lodge that had fallen into darkness 12 years previously. The Isthmian Mark Lodge had handed back it's Warrant in May of 2009 and was the only Essex Mark Lodge to remain closed. The Provincial Grand Secretary read the Warrant of the Isthmian Combined Services Lodge, the Petitioners were arranged before the PGM and the Ceremony of Reponement was carried out, to bring this Lodge back to light with a new purpose, that of catering for those Brothers who are volunteer, Retired or Serving members of the Emergency, Civil, Crown or Public Services.



Friday 25th of November saw 90 Grand and Provincial Grand Officers gather at The Hutton Masonic Hall Mount Avenue, Hutton, Brentwood, Essex. It was the first Officers Mess in two years due to Covid Restrictions. The President, W.Bro. Norman took the opportunity of addressing the Brethren and then went on to propose the toast to our Provincial Grand Master which was met with acclaim. The Prov.G.M., in his response, reminded all of the ongoing initiatives in Essex as well as updating all on upcoming events. As is the usual custom, he also took the opportunity to announce the names of the next Provincial Wardens as well as his nomination for Grand Steward.
