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Provincial Grand Lodge Installation Meeting





The Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex Freemasons has joined over 8,000 UK Organisations insigning the Armed Forces Covenant

- The Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex signed the Armed Forces Covenant during an event at Freemasons' Hall in Covent Garden on 24 March
- A senior officer from Colchester Garrison attended the event and signed for the MOD

On 24th March 2022 the Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Paul Tarrant, signed the Armed Forces Covenant with Major Kevin Fitchett, the Deputy Chief of Staff for Colchester Garrison who was given a warm welcome at the Annual Meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge at Freemasons' Hall in London, the headquarters of the United Grand Lodge of England.

The Covenant is a Government policy to help the Armed Forces Community, which includes veterans, bereaved families and service personnel with adaptive needs, in areas such as healthcare, education, accommodation and employment. It is an obligation on the whole of society including voluntary and charitable bodies, private organisations and individuals, all of whom are asked to recognise our Armed Forces and offer respect, support and fair treatment.

V.W.Bro. Nick Franklin, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, explained "Members of HM Armed Forces sacrifice some of their civilian freedoms and put themselves in harm's way in the defence of our realm so it is important that they should receive our support and we have an obligation to ensure that they get fair treatment which is the primary purpose of this Covenant."

Major Fitchett said: "Essex Freemasons have a long and positive relationship with the Armed Forces in Essex, particularly by supporting military charities both through funding and their members' direct involvement. It is a privilege to have been invited to celebrate the Freemasons signing up to the Armed Forces Covenant and we look forward to working together to benefit the Armed Forces Communities in Essex."

One Freemason who did more than any other person to change the unwanted way people used to regard the Services in peacetime was Rudyard Kipling. Never a soldier himself, his Barrack Room Ballads and other poems conveyed the foibles of soldiers to the hearts and minds of a population which began to appreciate far more the dangers and hardships of military life. This change helped foster numerous military charities and welfare organisations, many of which still survive.

Government policy today encourages public appreciation with the Armed Forces Covenant which the 8,000 plus Essex Freemasons will support through their four important guiding principles of Integrity, Friendship, Respect and Charity.

Being genuine, honest and ethical are qualities which show people that Freemasons have the courage of their convictions and have the highest degree of moral character.







Whether agreeing with another person or not, Freemasons do not judge. They respect other peoples' feelings and make them feel valued.


COMMUNITY


FRIENDSHIP

MEET THE NEW PROVINCIAL GRAND CHARITY STEWARD by W.Bro. David Badger

From his beginnings in Dagenham, Chris Hicks left university as a scientist after studying biology with microbiology, with the aim of curing people. But he soon realised he was better at selling the drugs rather than discovering them! This led to a 40-plus-year career in the Pharmaceutical and Healthcare Industry.

Chris was initiated into Thomas Ralling Lodge 2508 in May 1995, the first candidate following the Lodge's Centenary, by his uncle, Bill Emmerson. He has yet to miss a meeting, having notched up 107.

He was Worshipful Master in 2001 and again in 2019, the Lodge's 125th Anniversary, and due to Covid suspensions, he remained in the Chair until this year. He was appointed a Provincial Grand Steward in 2003 and received the Grand Rank of Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies (PAGDC) in 2016.

In the Royal Arch, Chris was Exalted into Thomas Ralling Chapter 2508 in March 1999 and was 1st Principal in the Chapter's Centenary Year of 2007 when he was appointed as a Provincial Grand Steward. He was appointed to Grand Rank as PAGDC in 2020.

In other orders, Chris was Advanced and Elevated in Boleyn Castle 998 Mark and Royal

Ark Mariners (RAM) Lodges in 2003. He was appointed ADC in Grand Mark in 2020 and received RAM Grand Rank in 2016. In Royal and Select Masters, he was Chosen as a Select Master in Langdon Hills Council 208 in 2009 and became a Grand Manciple in 2019. He also holds 30th Degree in Rose Croix via De Vere Chapter 831, and is in the Royal Order of Scotland, Province of North Thames.



As a side note, Chris is involved in the "Ancient and Noble Order of the Mystic Shrine", more commonly known as the Shriners and was the UK Shine Club Recorder. This order is also all about charity, and the Shriners run 27 hospitals free for children in the US, Canada and Philippines. In his "spare time", Chris is a qualified cricket umpire and an average club cricketer.

A Charity Phoenix Arises from the Ashes of Burntwood

n Hutton, on Tuesday 6th April, the new Charity Stewards Lodge arose like a Phoenix from the ashes, to be called Burntwood Lodge (The Charity Stewards' Lodge) No. 8016. And, with 14 Essex Charity Stewards joining on day one, the transformation was complete.

The new joining members were treated to a wonderful Installation from the Burntwood team as Marc Gunnell installed his nephew, Antony Gunnell, into the chair of the newly named lodge. And the ceremony happened under the watchful eye of the new WM's father, Chris Gunnell, the Lodge Secretary. So, a Brother (brother and uncle) Installed Brother (nephew and son) with a Brother (brother and father) watching on!



Now "the Charity Stewards Lodge" can progress and develop, enabling the new Provincial Charity Steward team to disseminate news, information and ideas to their counterparts in Lodges and Chapters right across the Province.

The Lodge will continue to meet at Hutton this year, but in 2023, will start to travel around Essex. At each meeting, there will be opportunities to hear of new initiatives, ideas and ways to raise funds. There will also be presentations from charities, as well as news of the MCF and Provincial initiatives.

The Lodge is looking for more joining members, and there is at least another half-dozen who have expressed a wish to join. Being part of the Lodge will allow brethren to be part of an exciting new initiative in the Province and put them at the forefront of Charity projects.

All Charity Stewards will be invited to attend all its meetings as self-payers. Summonses will be sent to them around three weeks prior, and planned agenda items will be publicised well in advance for any other interested brethren.

The next meeting of Burntwood Lodge (the Charity Stewards' Lodge) will be on Tuesday 7th June at Hutton.

The Provincial Grand Charity Steward, Chris Hicks, will give an update on the 2022 Festival, the Provincial Ukraine Appeal and other initiatives for the year, and there will be a presentation from a local charity.

So keep an eye out for future topics, and Summonses from the Charity Stewards Lodge!

As we come to the end of the very successful Festival 2022, it is time to look at where we are going; what we in Essex will be doing on the Charity front, going forward.

Colin Felton and the team have done a fantastic job in achieving a wonderful total for the Festival and we will have a very successful evening on 18th June, when we celebrate this. I hope you will all enjoy this celebration.

However, Charity work does not stop once a Festival ends and we need to prepare for the next big event and Festival, as well as supporting our local charities and working with the MCF to support Essex-based charities. These may well have suffered badly over the past two years of the pandemic, seeing donations reduce and calls on their services increase.

I know Lodges and Chapters have given some support alongside supporting the Festival, and this is highly commendable and I thank you all. Now you will be able to increase that support and also your financial help for other good causes.

To help you there will be a series of Charity Steward Training Sessions, from September. The plan is to run one a month, each at a different centre around the Province. They will enable new and experienced Charity Stewards to learn or refresh their duties and responsibilities, and about activities that can be carried out.

These sessions will be held in the evenings and, while open to anyone, will be targeted at Charity Stewards in both Lodge and Chapter. Details will be circulated soon.

In addition, the creation of the new Charity Stewards' Lodge, Burntwood Lodge 8016, means another opportunity to learn the "tips and tricks" of being a Charity Steward, as well as hearing from Charities themselves about how we can help them, and from the MCF and other interesting and relevant organisations. The Lodge will become Burntwood Lodge 8016 (the Charity Stewards Travelling Lodge) at the Installation meeting on 5th April, when 14 joining members will swell its numbers. The meeting after that will be at Hutton on 7th June. Details of these meetings will be posted on the usual platforms.

The next two milestones for the future are: the Essex 250 celebrations in 2026, when we will celebrate the 250th anniversary of the creation of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex; and Festival 2033 – yes I appreciate we have just finished one, but the Festival process goes on – which will be launched in 2027.



These two events may be a while away, but the new Charity Team will be planning for them in the background to ensure that they can be launched efficiently and effectively at the appropriate times.

In the meantime, celebrate what we have achieved for Festival 2022, continue to support your local charities, of which the MCF is one, and plan for the future!





EASTERFORD MARKS CONTRIBUTION TO THE 2022 FESTIVAL

The Provincial Grand Master in a private capacity visited Easterford Lodge on 7th July and received a ceremonial cheque for £53,500.

This represents the contributions from Easterford Lodge and Easterford Chapter to the 2022 Festival. The level of contributions entitled Easterford Lodge to be a Grand Patron of the Festival and the Chapter a Platinum Patron of the Festival. Additionally, as the payments are made directly to MCF by Easterford Lodge Benevolent Association the Lodge is consequently a Grand Patron of MCF and the Chapter a Patron of MCF.

Members of Easterford have generously contributed to Festival 2022 through regular payments to the Easterford Charity and include 9 Grand Patrons, 6 Patrons and 16 Vice Patrons.

Charity Steward Keith said "The visit by the PGM Paul Tarrant was an opportunity to mark the contribution by Easterford and its members to Festival 2022 which they have supported in a most generous way."

Thousands of disadvantaged children get boost from Essex Freemasons



Chelmsford based charity 'Families InFocus', currently helping almost 2,000 disadvantaged children across Essex every year, has received a grant of £13,500 from Essex Freemasons to fund their ongoing drive to give young people the best start in life.

The money, donated via the Masonic Charitable Foundation, the Freemason's own charity, will be targeted directly at families in Essex with children and young people with special educational need or disabilities (SEND).

"Children with SEND have health, social and educational challenges which, if not met can impact negatively on health, schooling and social life," said Kirsty Cornell for 'Families InFocus'. "The money from Essex Freemasons will help to continue operating our helpline and one to one support families with education, benefit, health, social care, housing, leisure and transport issues. It will make quite a difference"

The charity, which has a major aim to improve the quality of life for families, runs a weekly activity club for children and parents, providing fun and healthy activities as well as a monthly sibling's support group.

"As a result, family anxieties can be significantly reduced knowing their voices will be heard and they feel more empowered to take control, and cope better with their circumstances and the issues they face," said Kirsty.

And 'Families InFocus' is really making a difference across Essex with 80% of their clients reporting positive educational changes for their children and with at least 70% of families saying they now feel less socially isolated.

"I understand that almost 10,000 families are registered with the charity and in 2019 – 2020 they supported in total 2,000 families with educational and benefits issues," said Paul Tarrant, Provincial Grand Master for Essex Freemasons.

"It's a remarkable charity that is making a huge impact across our County and I am delighted that we have been able to help."

During the pandemic, the charity had to stop working face to face but continued to provide information, advice and support by telephone, email and remotely via skype, FaceTime and zoom. As restrictions are being removed, they aim to restart weekly sessions and monthly siblings' groups again.



Villerica Lodge No 4053 Achieve Platinum Plus status at its Centenary Meeting

On 23rd April at Hutton Masonic Hall, the Villerica Lodge No. 4053 held its Centenary Meeting at which they were honoured by the presence of the Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro Paul William Tarrant, accompanied by Assistant Provincial Grand Master W.Bro. Peter Hollingsworth and supported by a team of 8 Provincial Grand Officers.

After receiving the RW.ProvGM and the reading of the Minutes, a short history of the Lodge was presented by 3 senior Past Masters, W.Bro's Fred Steed, Michael Haynes and Brian Hughes whose family connections to the lodge spanned over 70 years as their fathers had themselves been Past Masters of the Lodge. W. Bro. Fred had also been WM at the Golden Jubilee Meeting in 1971.

This was followed by the presentation of the Centenary Warrant. After its inspection and reading by the Provincial Grand Secretary, W.Bro. Richard Jordan, the RW Provincial Grand Master presented the Centenary Warrant to the Worshipful Master, W.Bro. Trevor Heaps, who expressed his honour and privilege to receive it on behalf of the Lodge.

The Provincial Grand Chaplain, W. Bro. Mick Scotchmer then gave an oration which gave perspective to what the Lodge had achieved by preserving the standards laid down by its Founders 100 years ago and by remaining true to their visions. Set against the enormous changes which had occurred over that period, in world history, science and technology and society in general, it was gratifying that the principles and tenets of Freemasonry had survived intact and were apparently alive and well in Villerica Lodge.

To mark the occasion, the WM then presented the RW ProvGM with a cheque for £4000 as a further donation to the Essex Festival 2022 which brought the total contributions from the Lodge to £60000. The RW ProvGM thanked W Bro. Trevor for the cheque and given that the Lodge had already been accorded Double Grand Patron status, was pleased to present in return, a framed Platinum Plus Certificate congratulating the Villerca Lodge as the only lodge in Essex to achieve this status. He then announced that he was pleased to make another presentation and proceeded to invest W. Bro. Trevor as an Acting Provincial Grand Standard Bearer. This was greeted with applause from all present.

After conclusion of Lodge business the RWProv GM retired in Procession, to bring to a close, a historic and memorable Meeting of the Villerica Lodge No 4053. The Centenary celebration was completed with a most convivial Festive Board where all enjoyed an excellent meal and service and in true masonic manner, united in the grand design of being happy and communicating happiness.





Combat2Coffee, a support organisation for Armed Forces veterans who may be struggling with life outside of the services, is on the road and ready to help thanks to a grant of £34,000 from Essex Freemasons.

The money, donated via the Essex Freemasons Community Fund, has allowed the Combat2Coffee charity to purchase and equip a new van which has been literally turned into a mobile coffee shop.

It will be used in every part of the county to help train ex-veterans in business skills, provide a social network for servicemen suffering from a wide range of mental health issues – and for those that really warm to the coffee theme, the chance to learn how to be Baristas.

Coffee has been the key for Colchester based Nigel Seaman, a former member of the Royal Anglian Regiment. After being diagnosed with PTSD, linked to his army service in which resulted in him losing a foot, he decided to use coffee as a vehicle to help others.

"We are here to offer training and development for veterans who may be under a rehabilitation order or are looking for a little extra support," said Nigel. "We work with former members of the Armed Forces and their families to train them in new skills and assist those who need it with help to find work placements or outreach support where possible."

"The van, which would not have been possible without the help of local Freemasons, will enable us to reach every part of Essex and help many more former veterans. The grant has made a real difference to our work"

After serving with the Army for 12 years and being medically retired from his subsequent career as a prison officer, Nigel began suffering from depression, anxiety and flashbacks from an incident experienced during his time on operations with the armed forces.

He was referred to Combat Stress and after completing a 6-week trauma course, Nigel was further referred to Help

4 Heroes for ongoing support in the community. Since then, the Help 4 Heroes organisation along with Combat Stress have been the backbone of his recovery and their support and encouragement have been the inspiration for the creation of Combat2Coffee.

Colin Felton, Past Provincial Charity Steward for Essex Freemasons, commented: "Freemasons in Essex have signed the Armed Forces Covenant to help and support our servicemen and women, many of whom suffer terrible mental health issues. This is a good example of the kind of support we want provide and represents our determination to be there for our veterans."

"Nigel is doing incredible and inspirational work in the community and I am delighted that we have been able to help this charity expand it critical work across Essex."

Cheques don't come a lot bigger, but this one is telling less than half the story. The figures say £50,000, making it the latest donation by the team at Essex Mason to the Festival 2022 Appeal, but the true amount should really say a whopping £110,000.

That's how much the team have donated so far and it is enough to make them a double Platinum, the first unit in the Province to achieve that accolade – helping to swell the Festival total beyond the original £5 million target.

To mark the occasion, the PGM, RW.Bro Paul Tarrant presented a special certificate and met the nine-man Essex Mason team at their offices in Colchester to thank them for their massive contribution.

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"It is a magnificent amount of money and represents a considerable amount of hard work by everyone who gives up their time to supply and send out regalia to our members across the Province," said the PGM. "Essex Mason has an incredible record for supporting local and Provincial charities which is why it has been good to meet the people who have made it all possible."

The cheque for £50,000 was presented to the PGM by Essex Mason Company Secretary Graeme Lockwood, who explained: "The money represents the profits made on regalia sales so in reality every Essex Mason who has ever purchased anything from us has helped to raise this total."

"All profits are given to charity and this has always been the policy of Essex Mason."

As well as the Essex Mason team, DepPGM Nick Franklin and APGM's Peter Hollingsworth and Tony White were also present and together with the rest of the visitors enjoyed a home-made Victoria Sponge, baked by the official Provincial Cake maker Jeff Cripps.

Essex Freemasons help transport in Castle Point

Essex Freemasons have just completed a £15,000 donation to the Castle Point Social Car Scheme (CPSCS) to provide transport options for the elderly and disabled in Castle Point.

The Scheme, started in 1997, has a fleet of 6 vehicles, 3 mini-buses and 3 disability cars driven by 3 employed drivers and 27 volunteer drivers, along with many more volunteers to help the passengers. With these vehicles and volunteers the "Car Scheme" offers transport and trips for the elderly and disabled in Castle Point. For a small membership fee over 1,000 residents are able to book car journeys at a reduce cost as well as places on minibuses for daytrips around Essex. The journeys can be for hospital visits or even holidays, and the planned trips allow members to visit beauty spots, shopping centres, garden centres etc.

This is an invaluable service to the residents of Castle Point and apart for the small annual membership fee and reduced mileage cost the "Car Scheme" is financed by fund raising and donations. The "Car Scheme" needs around £140,000 per year to support this valuable resource, which supplies around 6,500 journeys per year.

Chairman Alan Beale said that "Now the pandemic and restrictions are over I get a lot of members saying that they just want to get out and visit places. This makes this service even more important for the members, particularly for their quality for life and mental health."

Chris Hicks, Provincial Charity Steward for Essex, said," This is a good example of Freemasons supporting the community in Essex, particularly the vulnerable. The donation comes from the more than £1 Million pounds raised each year by Essex Freemasons through the Masonic Charitable Foundation".

Pathway – a strategy for success

The Pathway Scheme is proving to be a massive success following launch events at all of the major centres – and by Christmas we expect that more than 200 Lodges will have signed up to this programme – an initiative that is set to transform Freemasonry across Essex.

Pathway is not all about attracting new members, although we can now see growing numbers of young men being introduced to Lodges across the Province - and early statistics are suggesting that our overall membership has now stabilized for the first time in 10 years.

As a result of Pathway and individual Lodges reaching out to potential members, we expect to initiate around 325 new Brethren into our Fraternity over the next 12 months. We are also forecasting that we shall continue to attract a further 300 plus members every year for at least the next five years.

But it is not just about new initiates - the scheme is also about retaining members, reaching out to those that have not attended for a while. It's about keeping Brethren interested by encouraging visiting, promoting learning and development and ensuring that no one ever feels left out.

To this end we have redefined the roles of the Almoner, Mentor and membership Officer in line with UGLE recommendations.

The Almoner

The Almoner will now take on more responsibility for retention and retrieval, it will be his role to chase up members who have not attended or have not been seen recently. Full training and support are being provided in this area by the Provincial Almoner team.

The Mentor

The Mentor will now be expected to deliver learning and development and we plan to ensure that a regular flow of information is sent each month via our Comms Team to allow Mentors to make reports and update members. A monthly newsletter using content from Solomon has already been launched to provide Lodge Mentors with the content to deliver during an itemized report or to present in quiet periods during the meeting.

The Membership Officer

The Membership Officer, as well as looking after newer members, will also act as a social secretary to ensure they can visit other Lodges and not be left out of Lodge activities. They will also encourage newer members to consider the Royal Arch where appropriate.

Has your Lodge signed up?

If your Lodge has not signed up then we cannot send you any potential initiates. If you are wondering why, it is because we try to place square pegs in square holes. When you sign up, we ask for Lodge profile so that we can get a better understanding of the type of candidates we can send in your direction.

These candidates are sent to us via the Essex and UGLE websites and are carefully vetted before being passed on to a suitable Lodge. Most are not suitable for a wide number of reasons – only about 10% actually make it through to initiation, but past experience has shown that these are the kind of people we want, keen, dedicated and wanting to know more.

These are the people who simply do not know how to become Freemasons, but have always been interested in joining. To this end we will therefore be launching our own social media advertising campaign from September to reach out to young men based in Essex.

Provincial Membership

Such is the importance of Pathway that the PGM has assigned two APGMs, Colin Felton and Robert Eels to look after and help deliver the scheme at Executive level. They are both supported by incredible and dedicated membership and mentoring teams in every part of the Province.

As already mentioned, they will be placing considerable focus on addressing losses, finding out why people who have previously enjoyed their Freemasonry, have decided to leave and finding solutions to reverse that trend.

Addressing and Preventing Losses

Our figures, taken over a period between 2007 and 2018 and which are very approximate, show that Member resignations for new Masons after just one year is about 12%. Over a two-year period, this loss is 32% and over eight years is 36%. This is clearly a key target area as part of the Pathway scheme, to retain and retrieve and to address this, we plan to work closely with Lodges to find new ways of ensuring that any losses are kept to a minimum.

Much of the programme will be directed towards informing new members about the Royal Arch and other Orders. Statistics show that Masons are more committed when they decide to join other branches of Masonry.

We are clearly going through massive change, Covid has altered perceptions, but Freemasonry still remains a constant force for good. It protects its core values and it's a message that young men want to hear – just as we did when we joined.

On Friday 22 April at the St. Giles Masonic centre in Colchester, the Constantine Lodge of Mark Masters No. 145 celebrated its 150th anniversary of continued working as a Lodge.

The Constantine Mark Lodge was Consecrated on Wednesday 17 April 1872 at the Three Cups Hotel in Colchester and is the oldest Lodge in the Mark Province of Essex.

Constantine is the sponsoring Lodge of the Essex Province, itself Constituted in 1899. The Lodge is also the sponsor for the Essex Installed Mark Masters Lodge No. 1044 and sits at the head of a family of 12 Lodges in Essex from Dunmow No. 527 as the first Lodge to be Consecrated into the Essex Province and Southern Star No. 2026 as the newest addition and 50th Mark Lodge in Essex.

The Consecration of Constantine took place 16 years after Mark Grand Lodge was itself Constituted with the Albert Victor Mark Lodge No. 70, the oldest in East Anglia being the sponsoring Lodge. The Primus Master and then-Secretary of the Albert Victor Mark in 1872, W.Bro. Charles Thomas Townsend, PSGD, was the Consecrating Officer. The 2nd Master of Albert Victor, W.Bro. the Rev. Robert N. Sanderson was the Primus Master of Constantine and would have a busy day ahead of him.

With the Consecration done, the Master and his officers turned their attention to the Advancement of 12 Brethren which was duly completed. One of the Brethren Advanced was Thomas Ralling, who would go on to have a huge impact on Freemasonry in Essex. He would become the Secretary of Constantine Mark the following year, in 1873, and remain in post until his death in 1924 except for the years 1880 and 1881 when the Master. He would be the very first Provincial Grand Secretary for the Mark Province of Essex in 1899, remaining in that post until his death in 1924.

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Additional Orders

Rose Croix District of South Essex Installation of the new Inspector General

The Chapters of the Rose Croix District of South Essex enjoyed the support and direction of V.III. Bro. Paul Tarrant, 330 as Inspector General from February 2017 until his appointment as R.W. Provincial Grand Master and Most Excellent Grand Superintendent for the Province of Essex in May 2021. The Supreme Council were pleased to appoint V.III. Bro. John Hubbard, 330 as his successor. Unfortunately, owing to the disruption to meetings associated with the Covid pandemic V.III. Bro. John's installation was deferred.

On behalf of the members of the District, the new Inspector General then presented V.III. Bro. Following the formal opening, the Brethren were called to order by the Grand Marischal, Bro. Ray King to receive the Deputy Grand Master and Governor, Bro. Alan Dickson. It is interesting to note that the first Grand Lodge of the Order was formed in Edinburgh in 1768 when the King of Scots was made the Hereditary Grand Master.

At the conclusion of all competent business of the Lodge, the Grand Marischal presented the Provincial Grand Master Designate, Bro. Ralph Robertson to the Deputy Grand Master and Governor. After ensuring that the Patent of appointment was in order, Bro. Robertson was obligated and Installed as the 12th Provincial Grand Master for the Province of East Anglia. The Deputy Grand Master and Governor then addressed the meeting, informing the Brethren that this was his third visit to the Province, the first as the Head of the Order with the previous two being in the Office of Grand Marischal, accompanying the then Deputy Grand Master and Governor, the Rt. Hon Earl of Elgin. He also paid tribute to the Past Provincial Grand Master, Bro. John Robertson and thanked him for his chairmanship of the Province during the difficult period of the Coronavirus Pandemic.

The Grand Lodge Deputation then retired from the Lodge which was then closed and the Brethren resorted to the festive board for dinner. The day concluded on a happy and high note, with everyone agreeing it had been a successful and enjoyable meeting.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of East Anglia meets on three occasions in the year; Colchester in April, Newmarket in May, and Lowestoft for the Installation Meeting in September. The Province encompasses Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire, and North Essex as far as Chelmsford.

Qualification for membership requires that a potential candidate must have been a Master Mason for five years and upwards. In practice each Province lays down its own requirements, for example some demand that a candidate has attained 30° in the Ancient and Accepted Rite. In East Anglia candidates are usually limited to brethren who have been Master Masons for at least five years and have shown a keen interest in Freemasonry beyond their craft lodge.

The Province of East Anglia usually "Advances & Promotes" two candidates per meeting and entry may be protracted as there are about two hundred Lodges from which to draw candidates.

It was the late Rodney Bass who first asked Philip to be the Provincial Deputy Grand Secretary (ProvDepGSec) in 2016 and ProvGSec in 2017 in order to restructure the Provincial Office, which Philip did with Paul Reeves. They made a big step forward with computerisation, vastly improving the administration processes with less paperwork and easier access to much more information. Philip explained "Over the last decade Freemasonry has become much more open. With more on the web, one of the biggest challenges is to make sure we keep the enjoyment we



get from our meetings and not get tied down with too much information. Change is inevitable. More recently we have seen the minimum age lowered to 18 years to encourage a younger membership, Freemasonry for women is becoming more mainstream so there could be challenges ahead and our festive boards are becoming more relaxed occasions whilst maintaining the formality we all enjoy."

Learning about Freemasonry from his father, who was a Freemason but who did not go through the Chair, Philip was Initiated in 1981 into the Lodge of Good Fellowship No. 276 at Chelmsford Masonic Hall. Being the Worshipful Master in 1989 for the Bicentenary of the Lodge was a career highlight and one which Philip is very proud of. Another very nice highlight was to Initiate his own son into Freemasonry.

First promoted to Provincial Grand Steward (ProvGStwd) in 1990, Philip progressed steadily to Past Provincial Junior Grand Warden (PPJGW) in 2004 and to Grand Rank in 2014 as Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies (PAGDC). SNAP is an Essex charity for families with children and young people who have any special need or disability. SNAP's aims are to inform, encourage and support parents and carers so that they can grow in strength and knowledge and become better equipped to give the best possible help to their children.

From its Brentwood base, SNAP offers a helping hand to thousands of families in need of support. No formal diagnosis or professional referral is necessary to access SNAP services, which are available to families with children and young people aged up to 25 who live under Essex County Council, Thurrock, and Southend.

Facilities at the centre include a training room, multi-purpose activity hall, multi-sensory room and specialist IT suite.

SNAP needs around £750,000 a year to fulfil these services and their aims, and at the end of the presentation, the Lodge made a donation to help SNAP carry on the good work.

This was the first Burntwood meeting under its new format and, even with a few hiccups, proved very successful. In addition, over £150 was raised in the raffle.

Monkhams Chapter No. 4161

1946 – 2021

They give inspiration and remind us how special the Royal Arch is with over 40% of Craft Freemasons being members. Most Excellent Zerubbabel (MEZ) Keith Wood of Monkhams Chapter No. 4161, which meets at Harlow Masonic Hall, merits special attention.

Firstly, when Keith was Installed as MEZ in October 2019 by Excellent Companion (E Comp) Tim Holland, Keith demonstrated to all present that he was going to be a remarkable First Principal. Also attending the Lodge meeting was the Very Worshipful Paul Reeves PGSwdB PDepPGM




Hockley Lodge No. 6204 75th anniversary

Respect for Wildlife

An experienced professional photographer had an enjoyable photo shoot on a visit to Hanningfield Reservoir Nature Discovery Centre in Essex.

Mike Barrett is the official photographer for the Essex Freemasons Provincial Communications Team and a member of the Provincial Charity Team. He works hard as a volunteer and travels many miles each year to take photographs of masonic charity endeavours and other special events involving the 8,000 plus Essex Freemasons.

On 4th July, Mike accompanied the Provincial Grand Master of Essex, Paul Tarrant, and the Provincial Grand Charity Steward, Chris Hicks, to discover how a £6,000 grant made through the Masonic Charitable Foundation one year ago is helping Essex Wildlife Trust in their conservation work. Colin Felton, an Assistant Provincial Grand Master Grand Master, explained "The Trust has used the money to help protect bees and other endangered insects."

Like many Freemasons and their families, Provincial Grand Master Paul Tarrant and his wife Jenny are very keen on environmental issues. They are Wildlife Trust members as well as the RSPB. Paul said "We are concerned that man-made climate change is having



an impact on wildlife, the country and the world which is why we are supporters of Wildlife Trusts in general."

Essex Freemasons share their respect for wildlife with Freemasons across England and Wales. Durham Wildlife Trust received £3,600 to raise awareness of wildlife during lockdown which led to 23,846 new online users. A £50,000 Wildlife Appeal has been launched by Surrey Freemasons to help transform an impoverished 20-acre floodplain meadow into a nature reserve with a purpose-built wildlife hospital for the Wildlife Aid Foundation.

Not just the respect for wildlife but also the overall charitable impact of Freemasonry is much understated by its supporters. In 2020 alone over £51.1 million was contributed to local and national charities and deserving causes and more than 18.5 million hours of volunteer work is undertaken every year.
